**PEACE CELEBRATIONS.**

**JULY APPLEDORE. 1919**

The day's programme was commenced with an assembly at the church gates where a procession was formed and headed by the service men proceeded to Mr. Terry's meadow, where a short open-air united service was conducted by the vicar, the Rev. A. O. Scutt, and the lesson was read by Mr. T. H. Pendray. Immediately after an illuminated address of welcome and thanks on behalf of the parishioners was presented to all those who had served by Mr. E. B. Terry and Mrs. Scutt. At 5.15 a splendid programme of sports was carried out. At 4.30 a meat tea was given to the children, and at 5.30 every parishioner partook of a sumptuous repast. Later a fancy dress parade including decorated prams was held. A goal running match between the ex-service men and the local club and a first-rate Pierrot troupe gave a concert. Mrs. E. B. Terry presented the prizes and at the close an excellent display of fireworks was given.
