VESTRY MEETING.—The annual Vestry meeting was held on Wednesday, when there were present:—The Rev. A. O. Scutt (vicar), the Rev. E. T. Wright, Messrs. E. Bachelor Terry, T. G. Wright, F. S. Brown, A. J. Trewren (treasurer), G. Sutton, R. G. Grant, H. C. Terry and A. Johnson. Mr. Bachelor Terry presented the churchwardens' accounts, which showed the receipts to be £60 12s. 5d., and the expenditure £64 5s. 6d. The receipts showed an increase upon the previous year, but on the other hand some unusual expenditure had been necessary. The Vicar stated that the total amount received from offertories in church during the past year was £67 9s. 9d., an increase as compared with the previous year of £10 12s. Mr. T. G. Wright was again nominated Vicar's warden and Mr. E. B. Terry was elected parish warden for the twelfth year in succession. The former scribesmen were re-elected, with the addition of Mr. Ernest Pearson.

A SAD TRAGEDY.—That she drowned herself during an attack of temporary insanity, was the verdict returned by Dr. A. McMillan (Deputy Coroner for the Liberty of Romney Marsh), at the inquest respecting the death of Mrs. Emily Boorman (39), wife of Mr. James Boorman, of 3, Court Lodge-cottages, who was found in the pond of Court Lodge Farm, on the opposite side of the road, on Tuesday. Mr. Boorman said that his wife had been depressed since the birth of a child in December last. When he discovered that his wife was missing, he informed Police-Sergeant Marshall immediately. A search was made and the sergeant discovered her body, clad only in a nightgown, in the pond. Dr. F. N. Holden, of Wittersham, said he had attended Mrs. Boorman since the birth and had seen her several times since. She was very depressed and melancholic, and in a run-down condition.
