WHEN APPLEDORE HAD NO POST OFFICE

In 1637 the inhabitants of Appledore made a petition that they might be provided with a post office, for sometimes "as many as thirty letters a day," were received. Until then the letters were sent to any neighbouring town, such as Tenterden or Rye, and brought from there by the carriers, often causing a delay of nearly a week.

The inhabitants even offered to pay their own postman to carry the mail to and from Tenterden if a collecting place were provided. After much dispute, Mr. Ashfield, landlord of the Swan Inn was appointed postmaster with his inn as the office.

This was one of the many interesting things told by Dr. G. Ward, in the fifth of his lectures on Local History, at Tenterden, on Tuesday.

Other matters with which he dealt included the pottery which used to exist at High Halden, his information on this subject having been supplied by the last survivor of those who worked there.

Speaking of local benefit clubs the lecturer read extracts from the rules of "The United Brothers" of Tenterden, one of which stated that "for no kind of reason whatever" was the club ever to be wound up, and another which barred from membership anyone having charge of a steam engine as being presumably too hazardous an occupation.

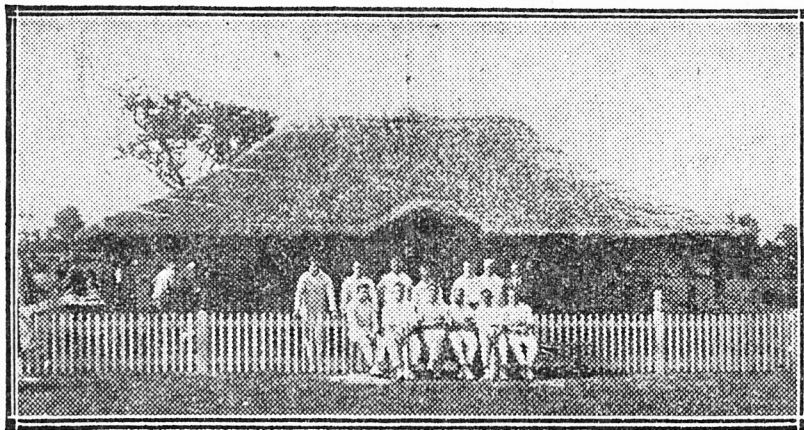
The lecture was illustrated with numerous documents and exhibits, including sets of hop-pickers tokens from Ashenden and Rolvenden.
