To the Children of Gaza

Dear child.

It is past midnight. I am flying at hundreds of miles an hour in the darkness, thousands of feet over the Atlantic Ocean. I am traveling to Egypt. I will go to the border of Gaza at Rafah. I go because of you.

You have never been in a plane. You have never left Gaza. You know only the densely packed streets and alleys. The concrete hovels. You know only the security barriers and fences patrolled by soldiers that surround Gaza. Planes, for you, are terrifying. Fighter jets. Attack helicopters. Drones. They circle above you. They drop missiles and bombs. Deafening explosions. The ground shakes. Buildings fall. The dead. The screams. The muffled calls for help from beneath the rubble. It does not stop. Night and day. Trapped under the piles of smashed concrete. Your playmates. Your schoolmates. Your neighbours. Gone in seconds. You see the chalky faces and limp bodies when they are dug out. I am a reporter. It is my job to see this. You are a child. You should never see this.

The stench of death. Rotting corpses under broken concrete. You hold your breath. You cover your mouth with cloth. You walk faster. Your neighbourhood has become a graveyard. All that was familiar is gone. You stare in amazement. You wonder where you are.

You are afraid. Explosion after explosion. You cry. You cling to your mother or father. You cover your ears. You see the white light of the missile and wait for the blast. Why do they kill children? What did you do? Why can't anyone protect you? Will you be wounded? Will you lose a leg or an arm? Will you go blind or be in a wheelchair? Why were you born? Was it for something good? Or was it for this? Will you grow up? Will you be happy? What will it be like without your friends? Who will die next? Your mother? Your father? Your brothers and sisters? Someone you know will be injured. Soon. Someone you know will die. Soon.

At night you lie in the dark on the cold cement floor. The phones are cut. The internet is off. You do not know what is happening. There are flashes of light. There are waves of blast concussions. There are screams. It does not stop.

When your father or mother hunts for food or water you wait. That terrible feeling in your stomach. Will they come back? Will you see them again? Will your tiny home be next? Will the bombs find you? Are these your last moments on Earth?

You drink salty, dirty water. It makes you very sick. Your stomach hurts. You are hungry. The bakeries are destroyed. There is no bread. You eat one meal a day. Pasta. A cucumber. Soon this will seem like a feast.

You do not play with your soccer ball made of rags. You do not fly your kite made from old newspapers.

You have seen foreign reporters. We wear flak jackets with the word PRESS written on it. We have helmets. We have cameras. We drive jeeps. We appear after a bombing or a shooting. We sit over coffee for a long time and talk to the adults. Then we disappear. We do not usually interview children. But I have done interviews when groups of you crowded around us. Laughing. Pointing. Asking us to take your picture.

I have been bombed by jets in Gaza. I have been bombed in other wars, wars that happened before you were born. I too was very, very scared. I still have dreams about it. When I see the pictures of Gaza these wars return to me with the force of thunder and lightning. I think of you.

All of us who have been to war hate war most of all because of what it does to children.

There are very brave Palestinian journalists. Thirty-nine of them have been killed since this bombing began. They are heroes. So are the doctors and nurses in your hospitals. So are the U.N. workers. Eighty-nine of whom have died. So are the ambulance drivers and the medics. So are the rescue parties that lift up the slabs of concrete with their hands. So are the mothers and fathers who shield you from the bombs.

But we are not there. Not this time. We cannot get in. We are locked out.

Reporters from all over the world are going to the border crossing at Rafah. We are going because we cannot watch this slaughter and do nothing. We are going because hundreds of people are dying a day, including 1 60 children. We are going because we have children. Like you. Precious. Innocent. Loved. We are going because we want you to live.

I hope one day we will meet. You will be an adult. I will be an old man, although to you I am already very old. In my dream for you I will find you free and safe and happy. No one will be trying to kill you. You will fly in airplanes filled with people, not bombs. You will see the world. You will grow up and have children. You will become old. You will remember this suffering, but you will know it means you must help others who suffer. This is my hope. My prayer.

We have failed you. This is the awful guilt we carry. We tried. But we did not try hard enough. We will go to Rafah. Many of us. Reporters. We will stand outside the border with Gaza in protest. We will write and film. This is what we do. It is not much. But it is something. We will tell your story again.

Maybe it will be enough to earn the right to ask for your forgiveness.

Minister's Letter

Dear All,

At the time of writing, we have experienced sustained wet weather for what is beginning to feel like eternity. I have no doubt that, in a few short weeks, perhaps even by the publication of this magazine, we may well find ourselves complaining instead of unseasonal heat and looming hosepipe bans. In any case, the current downpours and saturated ground aren't things which exactly encourage many people to get outside.

However, longer and warmer days tend to tempt many out of their winter shells as we make the most of the great outdoors while the weather is pleasant. Most people enjoy being outdoors for a variety of reasons – walking, running or cycling, gardening, trips to the play park, the list goes on, but how often do we go outside simply just to appreciate the natural world and to just be present within it?

Our society is one which demands activity and rewards productivity and achievement. These of course are not bad things to strive for, but the danger is that we lose sight of the value to be found in stillness and inactivity. Taking time to intentionally stop is important. Many of us will rarely stop to keep a space in which there is intentionally no agenda, regardless of whether it is one which is considered work or play. Doing so is valuable for our mental and spiritual health and to do this outdoors is even better. Taking some time to be outside for no other reason than being outside can enable us to become so much more present within our surroundings, so much more attentive to the detailed beauty of what is around us, and feel so much more connected with the life of our planet.

Some might be familiar with Forest School, an initiative which can be run independently but which has also been adopted by many schools and pre-schools with the aim of providing children with the benefits of learning outdoors. Similarly, Forest Church gatherings are held up and down the country, also with a focus upon all the benefits of spending time outside, but also with the intention of being curious about the connectivity we can find with wider creation and to seek spiritual enrichment through that.

Last year, there were several monthly Forest Church gatherings held locally, and March saw the first of this year's gatherings take place amid the beauty of Rolvenden churchyard and the vast landscape of the fields beyond it. Each gathering starts with some time of mindful attentiveness before a theme is offered and individuals are invited to explore the natural world around us, simply being present within it. Those attending then gather back together for a time of sharing if they wish and an activity for all ages. If this sounds like something you or someone you know might like to be a part of, the dates and times of future planned gatherings can be found on page 9.

I pray that you find a sense of belonging and connection in the great outdoors this spring and in any time you choose to spend outside. Just remember that, even if it is just on the odd occasion, it is good to spend that time without an agenda and instead to simply be!

Citizens Advice: Cllr Kinsley and Cllr. Johnny Shilton have arranged finance so that Citizens Advice can be held on a regular basis in the Village Hall: This will be in the Small Hall on the 2nd Thursday of every month.

Antiques Advertising Cart in Station Car Park: Complaints have been raised about the positioning in the centre of the car park- a hindrance and dangerous. The Parish Council is attempting to get the cart positioned in a safer part of the car park.

Parish Council Notice boards: These are in a sorry state: Heathside board needs replacing: and the Post Office board is in a poor state. Simon Honnor is working hard, as a volunteer, to repair and upgrade the notice board in the middle of The Street. Many thanks go to Simon for this public spirited and generous contribution.

Wooden Posts around lawn borders in The Street. These are now purchased and over the coming weeks will be erected where required. The Parish council is aware that attention is required.

School Road Pavements: Complaints have been raised about weed and algae in front of some houses in School Road. This, together with overgrown hedges, is making use of the pavement difficult, particularly for those with disabled transporters. KCC have a Landscape Team who treat pavements regularly and their schedule for School Road has been supplied. Most householders have cutback hedges: The cooperation of everyone is required to avoid accidents.

Signs to the Carpark in Court Lodge Road: Despite regular communication with KCC Transport and Highways, we are still waiting for directional signs to this car park. Assurances have been given by KCVC that they are chasing their contractor to finish the job.

New Parish Clerk for Appledore: We were fortunate to have 5 excellent candidates for the position of Parish Clerk: Following interviews by our Personnel Committee, Steve McIntyre is our new Parish Clerk and Anico Szocs, our Responsible Finance Officer. We wish them all success in their new responsibilities.

FROM THE SHOW COMMITTEE



Although it has been very wet and we are somewhat limited as to what we can do in the garden, we can think about and prepare for various classes in the Village Show!

Our potatoes at home are currently spread out in trays on the spare bed where they are happily 'chitting'!! This is the term used for letting the potatoes grow shoots which will give you a slightly earlier and bigger potato crop. The Village Show is on September 7th so probably a Maincrop potato would be advisable as these would be planted in April and harvested from August to October. Potatoes could be entered in classes 9, 10 and 50.

There are also classes for tomatoes and so now is a perfect time to sow tomato seeds. Sowing the seeds indoors allows you to start the growing year much earlier than if you are sowing outside. Plant the seeds in small pots or trays and keep them in a warm place. Courgettes, Peppers and Cucumbers can all be sown now too. Make sure you keep the compost moist and if on a windowsill turn regularly to prevent the plants growing towards the light and becoming distorted. Pot on when they are big enough to handle.

Hopefully the weather should soon improve and then the soil in our garden will start to dry out and warm up. This will allow us to get planting carrots, parsnips, leeks, beans and cabbages which can then be entered into the various vegetable classes.

If you don't have much luck raising your own plants then make sure you go to the plant sale, organised by Appledore Garden Society, in the Village Hall on June 8th from 10.00 am. This is their main fund raiser of the year and several of us are frantically growing plants for the event. You can buy your vegetable plants at the sale, grow some amazing produce and then enter into the Village Show in September!!

The Repton Charity Mobile Shop

The pop-up shop is delighted and so pleased with the level of interest from residents who want to help. Appledore Ramblers 15th March 2024

Today we woke up to heavy rain, but in true ramble style, by 1.00 pm it had stopped and the sun was trying to shine! Eleven of us and Brodie the dog left the recreation ground by the back gate walking along the top of the first sheep field and then cutting diagonally across on the AT119 to the wooden bridge in the corner. The path then goes across a small field to a kissing gate into one of Gusbourne's Vineyards. This gate currently has a broken hinge, which has been reported, so it is awkward to open! We now walk up to Mill Hill, sheep graze in between the vines on our right and are kept in the vineyard with electric fencing. The footpath then goes diagonally across a field which is currently planted up with corn, so we follow a Gusbourne track which also means we can avoid a lot of mud! We cross a stile and a bridge and are then in a grass field with lovely views looking over Hornes Place and Gusbourne Farm. The footpath continues over another stile and then twists through an area that looks like it is someone's garden. We cross over another stile and the path goes through a small wooded area where wild primroses are blooming and reminding us it really is Spring. The end of the path pops out on the Kenardington road by the white Appledore village gates near to Gusbourne, it is marked by a post with the sign missing! It's funny because I have often driven past this post and wondered where it went and now I know!!

We walk along a short bit of road and then turn right onto the Snargate road which passes the entrance to Gusbourne. We get a bit muddled up with a big convoy of cars all making their way into the Vineyards for a tour or wine tasting and a couple of the ramblers wonder if they could sneak in too and forget the ramble!! We walk along the road which is very quiet and obviously easy walking. After about half a mile we turn left up some steps and are now on the AT177A. This goes through another vineyard and then there is another stile and steps down to a wonderful old looking lane that could easily feature in a television period drama. Tracy knows this lane and explains to us that it is a byway and it links the Kenardington Road to Snargate Road. It runs almost parallel to the path leading from Sly Corner into the fields leading towards the Saxon Shore Way. We cross this and go up more steps and into a field, as we start to cross the field we see and hear a very unusual bird and wonder if it is a skylark. Following research when we get home, we learn it was a Meadow Pipit, who like arable croplands and the saltmarshes and use elevated perches like fences or electricity wires to watch for predators.

We arrive at a very muddy kissing gate where someone has laid logs in the mud for walkers to balance on! The path continues on across some arable fields and comes out on a small road quite close to Kenardington Church. We admire the view over to Dungeness Power Station and then turn right, again walking along the road which drops down the hill. We take a left at the bottom of the hill and after a short bit of road reach the gateway by Highham Farm and can now pick up the footpath AT 127 which is next to the Royal Military Canal. We now have about a 2 mile hike back along the canal. Apart from one grey heron, the wildlife is staying well hidden. We do notice though that the water level in the canal is very high and the water is quite muddy looking which is probably because it has drained off the fields.

We finally make it back to the village where some of us need to get home but some decide a quick drink at the Black Lion is needed! The drink is very welcome but we can't dally for too long as some of us need to get ready for this evening's St. Patrick's Day dinner at the Village Hall. At least with all our walking we have earnt our Irish stew tonight!!

Blast from the Past

Appledore Parish Magazine—September 1960

APPLEDORE CAMEOS FROM THE PAST. 1

"NO CHILDREN CAME AND THEREFORE NO SCHOOL"

This phrase, copied from the headmaster's entry in the Appledore School Log Book, dated 1st.July 1897, seems to sum up, in a few words, the biggest problem which teachers had to face in the days before the first world war. Children stayed away from school on the flimsiest of excuses and any form of had weather sent the attendance down with a bang. Girls were kept at home because mother went out to work, boys would stay away to go "beating in the woods", to help with cherry picking or, as these entries show —

"Feb 23rd. 1899. Very few present on account of fox hunt"
"Nov. 5th. Many absent, as usual on this date"

Holidays were shorter in those days. They had one week at Christmas, a few days at Easter and Whitsun and four weeks for "hop picking" although, when school was re-opened, the hop-picking was often still in progress and they would close down again for a further week. All the same, they didn't do too badly, for odd day and half-day holidays were granted with surprising frequency for such things as Appledore Flower Show; Club Day; Sunday School or Chapel outings; to attend the funeral of a well-known local person or in order that the schoolroom could be prepared for a concert.

As if to put a curb on all this, we find the following -

"July 29th 1896. The Vicar said that there was to be a holiday on Monday, (Bank Holiday), but no more Bank Holidays to be observed, also expressed a wish for school to be open Good Friday".

Judging by later entries, however, the Vicar was unlucky, for Bank Holidays went on as usual.

In those days a grant was paid to the school which depended upon a favourable report by Her Majesty's Inspector. In 1895 the report said -

"Order has improved, but is not yet perfect. As, however, there was much to distract the attention of the children on the day of the inspection, a sham fight being in progress in the neighbourhood, I feel myself justified in recommending the higher grant for discipline."
