There are already some people in the parish who are in isolation as they have underlying health issues and there may be many more in the days to come.

Lyndsey Jenkins has volunteered to coordinate help for those in isolation. A card has been delivered to every house asking those in isolation and those who are willing to help to contact Lyndsey Jenkins on 0779522090/01233 758152. All information provided will be kept confidential. Please keep her contact details at hand.

Remember those in isolation may require the obvious prescription collection and shopping, but it may include a regular chat or something more specific. Just contact Lyndsey who will help you, no matter your age. There is no need to feel alone. The community is working together and some volunteers have already come forward. As we do not know how many people and families will have to isolate, please volunteer if you are able.

Please be wary of people you do not know turning up at your door unannounced offering to help you. There are some nasty rogues taking advantage trying to steal from you.

Residents are reminded to wash their hands thoroughly and regularly. Some basic advice can be found on the back of the card. You can find **the latest information and healthcare advice on the Government Website and NHS website**. The advice will be regularly updated so you may need to check every few days.

Dear Parishioners & Sportspeople

Coronavirus

On behalf of the **Appledore Recreation Ground Management Committee**, I write to explain the actions we are presently taking to help cope with **COVID-19** and the effects this is obviously having on our families and on us as individuals. Health and local authorities are appealing for people to follow national Government guidance to prevent further spread of the illness and limit the numbers affected. This guidance includes taking basic hygiene precautions as the best way of significantly reducing the chances of spreading any virus: sneeze or cough into a tissue, bin it, wash your hands frequently and don't touch your face unless you've just washed your hands.

The Committee has no other option but to make a responsible decision and drastically limit activities on the ground and, as a result, the following has been implemented as from 16th March **until further notice**.

Committee Meetings

Our Annual General Meeting planned for March as well as regular committee meetings of the Appledore Recreation Ground Management Committee have been postponed until further notice. I hope to recommence meetings when it is seen to be sensible to do so, in the not too distant future. The running of the recreation ground will continue as normal, although without normal group meetings.

Football

There has been a directive from the **Football Association**, via the leagues, that all football is to cease until further notice. This does effect both our senior team and our junior teams – again we will be informed when it is appropriate to play again but, for the foreseeable, there will be no football matches played on the ground, as well as any other formal events.

Car Show

I appreciate that this year's show is not until 19th July but we are well along the time line in terms of planning, receiving entries and organising things for the day. We do need to consider if it is both appropriate and feasible to hold the event. About now we start to pay for events, contract services, cash entrant fees and spend on advertising etc. Although July is a long way off, we start to incur expenditure now and there is no guarantee that the effects of the virus will have disappeared prior to the day. I therefore, with regret and after 38 years, inform you that this year's show has been **cancelled**. If, as I hope, the situation changes the Committee will consider having a similar or alternative event and I will keep you informed.

Immediate future

The Committee recognises the need for regular exercise, particularly at this time, and the Recreation Ground can still be used for sensible and responsible activity, but not for group events. Please be assured that when the situation changes and we are back to our normal routines and regular patterns of life, it will be my pleasure to inform you that the Recreation Ground is fully usable once again.

Appledore Station



On Thursday, 12th March 2020, at the Methodist Hall, Stuart Searle presented a very interesting talk on Appledore Station. Stuart supported his talk with a slideshow of photographs from his personal collection and others he has gathered over the years. The talk was delivered in an enthusiastic and informal style, engaging both those with no prior knowledge of the history of Appledore Station and those who are railway enthusiasts, with a particular interest in the Marshlink Line.

The talk covered the establishment of the railway line and route connections, the design and construction of the station buildings, platforms, signal boxes, manually operated crossing gates and staff residences, through the changes, developments and transformation to where we are today.

The Station Hotel reportedly played an important part in the lives of those who worked at Appledore Station, as well as those who worked at Dungeness Power Station and the many commuters who used the Marshlink Line.


Reference was made to the skeleton discovered at the time building works were taking place at the station. Following a Police investigation, it was found to be non-human, but a model used for medical student tutorials.

A Hippie protester (in the 1970s), who objected to the nuclear waste being transported from Dungeness, was described as having sat on the tracks, facing an oncoming train, until it was evident that the train was not slowing down, whereupon he quickly got out of the way, thereby avoiding his own demise.

The derailment that occurred on 14th March 1980 was described in some detail. Sadly, the driver died as a consequence of the incident, but fortunately the Guard survived. Stuart took over as Relief Signalman that evening, so witnessed the after-event activities in person.

The talk was organised by Appledore Local History Society and Friends of Appledore Station who wish to express their sincere thanks to Stuart who gave freely of his time and presented an informative and highly entertaining talk. Gratitude is also expressed to the Village Hall Management Team for allowing additional seating to be borrowed to accommodate the 38 attendees. The generous donations made by those who attended the talk are also much appreciated. As always monies will be spent on village-specific projects.

APPLEDORE PROUD OF ITS CHURCH MAGAZINE

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(Newspaper report : 3rd November 1961)

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Not only are the villagers of Appledore proud of the fact that their Parish Magazine is prepared and published in the village, but they believe their monthly issue could set a new trend in magazine publication in the larger villages in the country.

Comparing the present magazine with the old, the villagers are confident their editorial team has now perfected a publication which is cheaper, larger, and brighter than the previous one.

The possibility of a new magazine was first put to the Church Council by the Headmaster of Appledore Primary School, Mr G J Sweetman, in May last year. It immediately aroused interest because he suggested this should be distributed, without charge to every home throughout the village.

Since then a team of 20, comprising an Editor, Production Manager and Designer, Stencil Typist, Stencil Checker, Committee, Assembly Assistants, and Distributors have met regularly and produced 18 monthly editions, which have gone to 260 homes in the Parish, as well as several in other parts of the country.

Monthly Conference

Between the first day of each month, when the current edition is published, and the 20th, articles and reports are written and submitted by residents; the cover picture, a pen and ink sketch of a scene from the village, is being prepared by Mr Sweetman, and the editorial staff is editing and arranging work to be published.

On the 20th the Editor, Mr G A Foster, and Production Manager, Mr Sweetman, go into conference and between them agree on the layout of the 18 pages. Copy is then passed to the Stencil Typist, Mrs Iris Bourne, and afterwards the stencils are checked and returned for printing off the requisite number of sheets required.


Within three days of the month the printing is completed, and the Team meet and put together the separate sheets into complete copies.

They are then checked, stapled, counted, and passed to the Distributors.

Donations

Although the magazine is supplied free, more than half of the villagers make annual donations to the magazine.

The £80 worth of equipment used to produce the publication includes only a duplicating machine, stapling machine and stationery. This equipment was originally bought with Church Council funds, but now the Team intends repaying the money.

2 AN INTERVIEW WITH CARLY BRYANT

CHOIR-MISTRESS EXTRAORDINAIRE!

You went to Brunel University-did you study music?

Yes, classical composition

How many instruments do you play?

Piano and guitar are my main instruments but I can get by on a few others!

How old were you when you started playing your first instrument and what was it?

Wy Mum was a piano teacher, so I was fiddling about on the piano from around age 2. She started giving me actual lessons at about 7, though I spent most of the lesson wanting cuddles!

You sang in the car with your sister-when did you realise you had a good voice? I don't remember realising anything much but I did just love having someone I could harmonise with, it was all just fun!

What took you to Paris and when did you live there?

I lived there for 4 years from 2012. I got a job as a pianist/singer with an artist who had a top 10 album and as the label and all the musicians were based in Paris it just made more sense for me to make that my base too.

What took you to Brazil?

I was a massive fan of a band from the 60's called Os Mutantes, who are Brazilian and the epitome of rock and roll! They reformed and were touring in Europe and I was put as their suppor act for a show they did in Paris. They liked what I did and ended up taking me on their world tour and eventually putting me in their band. So off I went to Brazil!

How was your time in LA?

In all honesty I'm not a fan of LA, hahaha! But I did play some great shows there in my time with Os Mutantes.

You speak French-did you do it for A level? Beyond?

I learnt French when I was 7 years old because my family moved temporarily to Normandy, so my sister and I went to the local primary school, and at that age you sponge up language in a flash.

How many languages do you speak-you mentioned Portuguese at your concert?

I had to learn all the songs in Portuguese for the Brazilian band, and of course touring with them meant I needed to learn the language. Fortunately, once you have one Latin language the rest are much more simple to learn.

When did you start song writing?

I made a band with my best mate when we were 9 years old called the Gruesome Twosome! My first song was called 'Sorry'. I was enormously inspired by the song 'Wonderful Tonight' by Eric Clapton and I just couldn't stop writing songs. I am constantly writing songs, every day, and have been for decades. It's an obsession!

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Has anyone famous sung one of your songs?

The Brazilian band (who are akin to The Beatles in South America) did sing some! There is also a 🎝 great singer in South Africa who covers a song I released in 2009 called 'What You Say'. I love hearing other people sing my songs.

What brought you to Lydd?

I wanted to be closer to my family who are all in Kent and Lydd came up on a property search, then as soon as I arrived I just felt like it was where I wanted to live!

How many Marsh Choirs are there?

There are now 7 groups. I like to call them the 7 wonders of the fifth continent! St Mary's Bay, Appledore, Dymchurch, Hythe, Rye, Lydd and a group called SiNG for adults with special needs, which also takes place in Lydd.

How did you choose which towns to approach and what was that approach?

J I started with Lydd (because I lived there) and Appledore (because my family wanted to join and that .7 was a good halfway meeting point for us!), then the demand came in for the other places.

When did you have the idea of a Marsh Choir?

It was at a Brunel University event in October 2018. I had just finished an extensive world tour and I Was invited to speak on the subject of touring, and I was so exhausted that I found it hard to muster I any enthusiasm. On the drive home I had a sudden flash of inspiration that I was going to change Image: The second start a network of choirs. Once the idea hit me I couldn't get rid of it and I was so excited 7 by it that I knew it had to be good!

Tell us about the Special Needs choir

The group for adults with special needs is called 'Marsh Choir SiNG', with 'SiNG' meaning Special Needs Group. We started by request of a young lady named Jodie! I started the group in June 2019 and 4 people showed up, and we now have 30 people! They are a truly exceptional group of people who encourage each other no end.

Gerald Sweetman 13 November 1926 – 23 March 2020

Many long term older residents of the village will remember Mr Sweetman as their Headmaster whilst at Appledore Primary School in the 1950s and 1960s. Recently he was suffering from dementia and moved into a Care Home, his health deteriorated and sadly on the morning of 23rd March 2020 he passed away aged 93 years.

Below are two articles giving information about his life.

Extract from the Dorset Echo Newspaper Wednesday September 20th 2017

A couple who met during the final days of the Second World War are celebrating 70 years of marriage.

Gwen, 93, and Gerry, 90, first met at an Army camp at Bridestowe on Dartmoor during the last days of the war. Gerry was a Grenadier Guard and Gwen served in the NAAFI.

They were married on September 20, 1947, at All Saints Church, Whipton, Exeter.

After demob, Gerry followed a teaching career that took him from primary school teacher in Hemel Hempstead to headmaster of Appledore Primary School and eventually to principal lecturer in educational studies and director of educational resources at Weymouth College after moving to Dorset in 1968.

He retired in 1980. Gwen also worked at Weymouth College in the Library.

They had two sons, Michael and Peter. Peter moved to Dorset with his parents but sadly passed away in 2000.

The couple moved to their present home in West Stafford in 1981, following their retirement.

Extract from a letter Mr Sweetman wrote to the editor of the Parish Magazine 6/3/2018

So, this is a little account of my present way of life. Since leaving Appledore in 1968 I have enjoyed a busy life. I started work at Weymouth College of Education in 1968 to take up duties as a Lecturer in Education. It was quite a contrast to my previous job as Head of a Village School. When I was leaving Appledore one of the school staff remarked that I would find it difficult and that I would miss the children. Well she was right, of course, but I continued working with children and students in schools throughout Dorset and beyond as students undertook their "Teaching Practice" and one of my duties was to supervise and advise. As promotion took me to the role of "Senior Lecturer" and then "Principal Lecturer", the job became more and more exacting but enjoyable. I finally ended my days at the College as an external examiner for the University of Southampton visiting many schools to assess student-teachers on their final School Practice. But I still miss the times I enjoyed in Appledore. Happy Days!

With changes in the organization of Teacher Education, Weymouth College of Education became part of Dorset College of Higher Education. Like many of my colleagues, I seized the opportunity and opted for early retirement in 1980 and worked as a volunteer lecturer for the National Trust, giving 378 talks and audio-visual presentations throughout Devon, Dorset and Somerset. I also acted as an advisor and lecturer for Osmiroid Pens on the subject of the teaching of handwriting. By 2000 I had presented 378 talks and slide shows and brought that little episode in my life to an end.
