Welcome to the August issue of the Parish Magazine.

On Tuesday 18th July, I attended a very lively meeting of Heathside residents and interested parties with representatives of the Ashford Borough Council regarding various issues affecting Heathside.

I came away quite angry about the lack of care that the local political systems take of some of its poorer citizens and with a lot of unanswered questions about the way decisions have been made regarding development on the estate.

Since then, little has made me doubt my original feelings. I decided to do some digging. Some real investigative journalism!! So now I have 2 very different reports on the meeting; a set of minutes from the council staff and another set of suggested amended minutes; various details about

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planning committee meeting; minutes of our parish council meeting and the Ashford Planning Committee meeting; and other odd pages from the internet.

Where to start?

As a logical person, I decided to start at the beginning and work through the facts, the rumours and hearsay to try and find some answers.

The planning application from BPTW, the developer working with Ashford Borough Council, was made on 8/4/22 and the interested parties had to return their reports by 1/11/22. Beside the usual consultees, 12 of the properties in Heathside were invited to comment. There were 4 comments from the village to Laura Payne, the Planning Officer—from 2 residents, the parish council, and a concerned villager.

The objections raised were—the general unwritten opposition of the residents to any development, the area concerned is in a flood plan and regularly floods every winter; it is the only green space for children to play in Heathside, who are too young to go to the recreation ground; contamination on the site; an electrical sub-station; closure of the footpath into the field; insufficient space for extra parking; the visual impact of the building; the lack of local infrastructure to support extra villagers- schooling, doctors, buses, rail, poor broadband and mobile signals, etc.; the provision of sprinklers in the building meaning that potential access by the Fire service was unnecessary(!!!); blocking off of views and sunlight; inadequate carbon reduction measures and multiple concerns about the actual construction time—safety, dust, noise, parking of building vehicles, etc etc.

Appledore Parish Council did NOT object to the building of the flats but objected to the proposal on the grounds of lack of parking spaces. Currently each house/bungalow has 1 designated parking space, but most properties have 2 vehicles due to the poor local transport. The plan removes 12 unmarked parking spaces and creates 9 marked spaces!!!

QUESTION 1. WHY DID <u>OUR</u> PARISH COUNCIL WHICH SUPPOSEDLY REPRESENTS <u>ALL</u> THE RESIDENTS OF APPLEDORE, KNOWING THE GROUNDSWELL OF VERBAL LOCAL OPPOSITION TO THE FLATS, NOT OPPOSE THEIR CONSTRUCTION?

One consultee wanted to object on health grounds to the development. Not wanting to broadcast the family's health problems on the public consultation pages, wrote to Laura Payne DIRECTLY. I have seen copies of this correspondence. One of the other Heathside residents also wrote directly and his comments are in the planning documents. Why is there not a shortened version of this health objection also in the planning documents?

Laura Payne sent the objections to the developers, who cancelled out all the objections. They indicated they were providing more parking than there is currently as they did not count any of the cars parked on the sides of the road or on the grass. They denied the legality of the footpath, which we know has been there more than 20 years, but as no-one has bothered to get it legally recognised over the years, it is does not exist! They deny any flood or contamination concerns. They reaffirm that sprinklers in the flats mean that access for fire Services are not needed. Ed—Fire services might be required for many other reasons e.g. extricating an obese patient, electrical fires or a fire in a current property.

I then read a Transport Technical Report. Apparently Appledore has 'a number of local shops' and Tenterden ' is a ten minute drive from Heathside'!! Also only two of the new tenants will need to drive to and from work. There will be 4 parking spaces for the new flats, no 10's space will be moved and 5 new spaces created in a parking bay along the curve of the road. This apparently creates 10 new spaces. My maths makes that 9 new spaces and one moved. And what about all the other vehicles that have to park on the grass or the pavement etc as only one parking space is allocated however big the property is. All these flats for the homeless will have a bicycle parking space and electric car charging point. Whoopee!!

I then turned my attention to the Planning Committee meeting. There is no record of any consultation, just a curt 'Resolved Permit' I have heard that our local Borough Councillor, is one of those who voted FOR this development.

QUESTION 2 WHY DID <u>OUR</u> BOROUGH COUNCILLOR VOTE <u>AGAINST</u> THE WISHES OF HIS CONSTITUENTS?

Meeting of 18 July 23

Report by Roger Hiskey on behalf of the Parish Council.

An interesting, spirited and lively meeting was held when residents of Heathside met with Ashford Borough Council officers in the Village Hall on Tuesday 18th July.

Isle of Oxney Borough Councillor Johnny Shilton and Parish Councillors, Chairman Roger Hiskey, Vice Chair Paula Thornton, Cllr. Kevin Nicol and Cllr Simon Honnor (Kenardington Parish Council) plus 18 residents of Heathside attended a meeting with 3 officers from Ashford Borough Council, Joanne Burns and Sarah Stiles and Giles Holloway (Housing Development and Regeneration Manager).

Details of the meeting will be circulated. The issues discussed included the Social Decarbonisation Fund, the development of the 4 new flats, the health of people near the site, poor drainage from the nearby field onto Heathside, concerns as to where construction vehicles would be parked during the building work, concerns about residents right to peace and quiet enjoyment, and issues from property facing the development about their right to light being affected.

When planning permission was granted for the 12 new houses being built in The Street there was a commitment to invest £15000 in a Heathside play area. The point was made

that with the new development of 4 flats, such a play area will not be possible.

Other issues discussed during the lively meeting included parking, maintenance of green space, potholes and road maintenance and the Heathside garages. There was a consensus that the garages are not in the best state.

Kevin Nicol's report from Facebook

The meeting was well attended in the small village hall room with just over twenty residents and three representatives from Appledore Parish Council. In addition, attendees included Borough Councillor Johnny Shilton and Simon Honnor, a local resident who is a member of Kenardington Parish Council. Simon had originally requested this meeting with ABC regarding the Heathside flats as early as March and facilitated the introductions between the Parish Council and ABC. All those in attendance had a chance to make comments to the council reps and were also informed at the meeting of plans for estate to upgrade some of the houses in a partnership with E-on and government funding.

Selected homes would have received a letter by now from ABC in association with E-on explaining that a survey will be carried out later this year and they will be looking at windows, cavity wall insulation, loft insulation, under floor insulation and an external wall cladding insulation along with air source heat pumps or ground source heat pumps and solar panels on the roof. This should reduce heating costs for the homes and depending on usage getting paid for any excess energy produced. If you have not received this letter, then unfortunately you will not be in this round of surveys and upgrades.

The meeting then turned to the proposed development of the four one bed flats on the green, which led to a very robust debate with everybody in no uncertain terms letting the council representatives know that nobody in Heathside wanted the development to go ahead. Some of the reasons given included health issues and associated risks of building works, protected wildlife on the site, loss of green space for children to play on, 11 months of living in a building site, the council being in potential breach of their own tenancy agreements, concerns over parking by tradesmen and noise, extra damage to the road due to heavy lorries delivering materials to site, loss of view and light, lack of amenities in village like shops, GP, dentists and most importantly public transport. The proposed plans will lead to a loss of parking spaces, but it was briefly discussed taking down the garages and having allocated parking instead in those parts of the estate, this may or may not lead to residential parking permits which many opposed. It was also pointed out to the council representatives that just because they gave themselves planning permission they don't actually have to follow through with it and build, it is hoped that they have taken onboard everything that was said by residents and it will be passed on to the relevant people in planning and housing and that they listen and understand the residents' concerns and have no wish to endanger people's lives and cause upset, misery and breach their own tenancy agreements over building 4 flats on a historical pond site, that is a wet piece of land and unsuitable for normal building foundations which will further increase the cost of the build. A set of non-verbatim minutes taken by Joanne Burns from ABC will be written up and distributed to the parish council and residents, when they arrive, they will also be put up in the village Facebook page. The meeting closed around 12.30 after starting at 11am, everybody was thanked for attending and the council reps spoke to some residents privately after the close of meeting.

As I say, I attended the meeting. I arrived early to find only 6 chairs put out and an agenda which did not even mention the flats! There were two Tenant Engagement Officers present and a Housing Development and Regeneration Manager. From what the Council officers said, they were under the impression that there had been NO opposition to the flats. They were not expecting to discuss the flats. They had 'no influence over planning' and they would be 'unable to overturn' the decision. There were over 1500 people on the waiting list so they had to build on any piece of ground they owned.

It was agreed that the Council would send out DRAFT minutes, which duly arrived.

Parish Council Update July 2023

Planning Application:

In their July meeting Parish Councillors considered the Planning Application (NOT/2023/0968) to Hornes Place Oast, Kenardington Road. The application was seeking permission to change agricultural buildings into residential dwelling houses: if approved this would mean that 5 barns have been converted to dwellings. The Parish Council opposed such a move, on the grounds that increased volume of traffic would enter Kenardington Road on a dangerous bend in the road.

Appledore Allotment Charity:

The Parish Council nominated Beverley and Duncan Gray as the 2 Trustees nominated by the Parish Council to the Appledore Allotment Charity.

Signage for the Court Lodge Carpark:

There is a lack of appropriate signage directing vehicles from The Street to the Court Lodge Car Park. It had been expected that the developers of the car park would have dealt with this. They will not be doing so. The Parish Council are now working to rectify this omission as quickly as possible.

August Meeting on Monday 7th August:

Among the items to be discussed is the grass cutting and gardening of the carparks in Court Lodge Road and the Village Car Park next to the Village Hall.

There will also be discussion of the financial income from the solar panels on the roof of the Village Hall







Appledore Local History Society

VICTORIAN CURIOSITY BURIED IN APPLEDORE GRAVEYARD

Having done a bit of research in the internet, it would seem that with the absence of TV the Victorians found various subjects to entertain themselves, albeit at other peoples' expense.

When the circus came to town, there would often be side shows, including 'freak shows'. People with various unusual physical characteristics would be put on show, some being paid very well for this, and some having their own promoters too!

One such person, Charles Chalcroft, unusual due to his above average size, is buried in the Appledore churchyard and the following highlights of articles tell the sad tale of his demise;

DEATH OF THE SUSSEX GIANT (11 May 1886, Mid Sussex Times)

"An inquest was held.. on Saturday last, touching the death of ...the Sussex giant. The facts as to his death were that on Thursday afternoon, it being club-day at Appledore, deceased was exhibited in a booth as the Sussex giant. He weighed, it was said, 39st. 10lb... On Thursday the giant had exhibited him self to one or two parties of sightseers, and in one of the intervals he dozed in a chair..At length the man who was showing him tried to arouse him for another entertainment, and then came out, saying "I can't wake the Colonel." Mr. Terry, surgeon, was fetched, and at once pronounced that the giant was dead. Heart disease was, beyond question, the cause of death, and a verdict to that effect was returned by the jury."

INQUEST ON THE SUSSEX GIANT (15 May 1886, Faversham News)

"..George Hinds, Esq., Coroner for the Weald of Kent, held an Inquest at the Swan Inn, Appledore, touching the death of the Sussex Giant, whose real name, it appears, was Charles Chalcraft.... In the forenoon the deceased got up between 9 and 10, and he drank a quart of beer but ate nothing. He complained of feeling hot and feverish, and later on he had some gin and water. Afterwards he had another pot of beer, still complaining of feeling faint and feverish, and then he said he would have a doze... Mr. J. Garside Terry, surgeon,...was called

The deceased was buried immediately after the inquest, in Appledore Churchyard. His coffin was of extraordinary dimensions, and more resembled a van in width and depth than a coffin. Cross beams, with ropes and pulleys, had to be erected to lower the coffin into the grave, and a large number of men had to be employed to convey it to the Churchyard, the weight being over five cwt. A few days previous to his death the deceased had been exhibited..as "Barnum's world-famed Giant, Col. C. Chalcraft"

The Ramblers Walk 21st July 2023

Well we try to be organised in the Ramblers but things don't always go to plan! Tracy and I decided that this time we would drive to Snargate Bridge, park in the car park there and then start our walk along the canal opposite. We did a recce walk and agreed to return before the ramble to trim up the first part of the walk which was rather overgrown. On returning to cut back the undergrowth we found the car park shut and padlocked with signs from Rother Fishery Association saying the waters are private and no parking is permitted!

After discussion we decided to drive and park at Kenardington Church so 10 of us in 3 cars parked up and walked down the road and along to Snargate Bridge where we picked up the AT191 which follows the Royal Military Canal towards Hythe. It passes through farmland where a large herd of suckler cows with their calves at foot peacefully grazed the marsh land taking no notice of us at all. Apart from the odd swan and a lonely cygnet all was very quiet. We stopped to photograph a dead tree that looked very artistic against a brooding grey sky and we passed under the railway line where the footpath became the AE626. The footpath reaches a road which we then walked along until we came to Shepherds Cottage which the footpath AE624 runs up the side of and into the church yard of Warehorne Church. The church was open so we had a look round inside but all agreed it was a lot less pleasing than our church at Appledore! It does have an interesting tower rebuilt in brick in 1777 because the original stone tower was struck by lightning in 1770.

Opposite the church is the Woolpack Pub so of course we had to stop for a drink! After a brief interlude we continued on our way this time taking a stile to the right of the church and on to the AE623. The footpath dips back down through farmland to the canal. We stopped to take in the sight and sound of a rookery where many hundreds of rooks were nesting communally in the top branches of some mature oak trees. Suddenly the rooks all took off and swirled in the sky making unique patterns like a murmuration of starlings. We continued on our way negotiating two rather tricky stiles which caused amusement as one of our shorter gentlemen ramblers earnt the nickname 'longlegs' as he threw himself over the very high stile!! We were now on the opposite side of the canal walking back to Snargate Bridge. We took the road back to Kenardington Church stopping off to admire the walnut tree just outside the churchyard. We picked up a green walnut from the ground and one of our knowledgeable group showed us it had a green husk and inside this was the walnut shell with the walnut inside. He also pointed out a huge fig tree which climbs up alongside the church tower. This walk was about 4 miles and enjoyed by all I hope!

Just to finish, I must say how sorry the Ramblers were to hear that Ken Girkin had passed away. Ken used to organise the village rambles and everyone is always telling me what a lovely man he was and what a wonderful job he did choosing routes, doing research and then sharing his amazing knowledge of our countryside and wildlife with his fellow ramblers. He left incredibly big shoes to fill and I can only hope that he is looking down on us and pleased that Appledore Ramblers Group is up and running again. See you on August 18th!

Bell ringing at Appledore on June 28th.

As most people in Appledore now know the bells were ringing for almost three hours non stop on June 28th. Why so long you ask? The reason being, the ringers involved wanted to ring a full peal which takes on average three hours to complete. A peal to a bell ringer is, as I put it, like an athlete running a marathon, an achievement of stamina and concentration. I have rung about twenty five peals (one at Appledore in January 2000) in my time as a ringer but some ring thousands.

A peal consists of over 5,000 different permutations of the bells. In other words the bells have to ring in a different sequence every time so as no a change is repeated. Appledore has eight bells, and if you wanted to ring every possible permutations of the bells you would ring 40,320 changes. Stone has just 6 bells and the maximum changes is a mere 720. If you multiply 720 by 7 you get 5040 and 5040 by 8 comes to 40320. The peal they rang was called Bristol Surprise Major and consisted of 5088 changes in 2hrs 49 mins. There are hundreds of different peals and there is even one called Appledore Surprise Major.

It takes a lot of studying and practice before you become a peal ringer, but once there, and after one or two peals it seems easier, although I must admit I could have not done what the team who came did.

I have had several comments about how nice it was to hear the bells, but I am sure there were some who were not in favour. In future it will be put in the magazine of any proposed peal, providing the request is in before the deadline date of the magazine so you know what is going on.

This was the first peal at Appledore since 2005, so I don't think one peal after eighteen years is too much.

Just as a useless piece of information, if there were twelve bells at Appledore and a team came to ring all possible permutations it would take a few years of non stop ringing!

This is the pattern of the lines we have to learn before we ring. When it this type of pattern it is not easy to learn.
