### A Letter from the Ministry Team at St Peter & St Paul Church, Appledore

Dear Friends,

We've experienced some hard and dismal times over the last year and more. Times of difficulty, alternating with times of joy is part of the rhythm of life. We're all familiar with words from the Biblical book of Ecclesiastes, which are no less true today than they were when they were first recorded:

"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens: a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot, a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance."

But now, we are probably all ready for a good dose of summertime joyfulness! Joy puts a smile on our faces, or perhaps we even laugh out loud. Some will want to write a poem, burst into song, or maybe just phone a friend to tell them all about it. If you watch little children who are really enjoying themselves, you'll probably notice that they just can't keep still. Its contribution to the community is not only in terms of the glorious displays, enjoyed by residents and visitors alike, but also in the camaraderie that exists in drawing so many people together in its execution. There's borrowing and lending; sharing and encouraging; advice to be given and taken; cakes to bake; flurries of activity and moments of rest. And in the end, that wonderful array of perfumed splendour, filling the interior of our beautiful church building, and spilling out into its surrounds. It's enough to make you want to sing and dance. # Village Hall Extension and Refurbishment

Work on the project is progressing well and remains on schedule.

### Hall interior

Insulation has been fitted to the ceiling and walls. First fix of the wiring is continuing and the fuse boxes have been moved to their new position. The stud work for the new interior walls is complete.

### **Structural work**

The new 'small hall' and kitchen timber frames are under construction. The new roof to the toilets and kitchen has been built. Delays in the delivery of materials continue to slow progress.

### Exterior

More of the pebbledash has been removed, a crack in one of the walls has been revealed and the structural engineer is advising on remedial work. The porch at the front of the building has been removed and is being made good.

### Next steps

Orders are due to be placed for the windows, toilet cubicles and kitchen. During the next month the flat roof areas should be completed.

# Childhood Memories of A Life in Appledore

### **Royal Military Canal**

What an activity centre this was.

We could fish there, and if Mr Springett the Bailiff came along he would usually be on the other side of the canal where most visitors would fish. If we saw him coming along on our side we would hide our rods in the bushes, but if he did catch us we would have to buy a one day fishing ticket.



The canal was also our swimming pool. An area just along from where the Old Way footpath joins the canal bank was the 'Swimming Place.' There was a very sturdy plank of wood secured into the bank and protruded out over the water- the diving board. Later the diving board was moved to the culvert, the place where the back dyke is piped under the bank into the canal. This is near where the footpath from the Recreation Ground meets the canal. When the dam was built along the Military road it became a new place to swim as the canal was wider and deeper there.

Boating was another canal activity. Homemade rafts were made from two railway sleepers nailed together about 4' - 6' apart with wooden planks. Underneath would be old empty 5 gallon oil cans (obtained from the local garage or farmers) held in place with wire netting. With a long pole we would then punt our rafts up and down the canal. The Kent River Board (now the Environment Agency) considered our rafts to be boats and wanted us to purchase 10 shilling Boat Licences to use them on the canal but it never happened.

One local lad obtained a metal Indian type canoe (as used on amusement boating lakes). It would hold two people and was great fun rowing it on the canal.

# Friends of Appledore Station Summer Planting

## **FoAS Ladies**

Whilst few of us have taken train journeys recently, mainly due to the strangest period in modern history, not a war but a disease which, like the Black Death in 1348 and latterly the Spanish Flu in 1919, has stopped humankind in its tracks, the desire to begin again and to put the last 18 months behind us is strong and never so strong as in Appledore this summer.



Many of you will have seen the wonderful work being done on the old station building, a Grade II listed and muchlamented bastion of the old railways, when every station had staff, toilets and a welcome smile. Its decline has been watched with sadness, but with a little tenacity and a lot of badgering by active members of the Friends of Appledore Station (FoAS), they have managed to encourage the Railway Heritage Trust to find money for its refurbishment, now only weeks from completion. We none of us know what the final outcome will be. It is unlikely to have toilets as the station is not manned, but the building will be ready for new occupancy once its value to the railway has been determined and a plan put into place for its use. Exciting times.

Meanwhile, however, the planters are a major highlight on the platforms. Planters whose installation was the inspiration for all the activity and hard work that has been going on over the past two years and more. How could we have known when asked to form a group of interested residents and to put a few pretty flowers onto the platforms, that the idea would 'literally' blossom and where once was desolation, now a true sense of ownership and pride has come back, evidenced with the complete refurbishment of the once majestic station building.

On Friday (11<sup>th</sup> June), a few brave ladies (brave because of the very hot afternoon) collected new plants from our stalwart friend Dean (**Pine Cove Nurseries Tel: 01580 765429**), and set about refreshing the planters. Having removed the winter pansies, the new plants were put into place and are already looking beautiful. Dean has been providing us with stock for the past two years and this year his suggestions (based loosely around our budget) are blush cosmos, red geraniums, blue scaevola and mixed nemesis. Dean and his wife have been most generous to us, so we would urge you to support them in return, if you can.

Watering was a mission as the water has to be carted by hand back and forth from the recently installed standpipe (another amazing outcome resulting from the cajoling and tenacity of FoAS members in encouraging Southeast Water to instal the supply for us), but the watering was finally complete, and the plants left healthy and pretty for everyone to enjoy. The ladies in question then repaired to the Black Lion for well-earned refreshment. FoAS has a regular band of happy helpers, with a formal watering rota and regular work parties and we thank everyone involved very sincerely for your continued help and generous support.

We always get a wave from the train drivers and guards when they see us working on the platforms. It seems strange that they should care, but then again why would they not, having seen the changes brought about since FoAS was created and watching our enthusiasm to get things done and the difference it is making?

So, as the world begins to wake up and we take our first cautious steps back to our former lives, please enjoy the work being done at Appledore Station for the benefit of the whole village. Better still, why not take a trip down to the station and see for yourself; no need to take the train to get the Appledore Station experience!

FoAS is funded by anyone who is prepared to help, and we are not shy to ask – so if you are feeling generous, the FoAS contact number is below. To coin a much-used phrase, '*every little helps*' and that includes both monies to support our work and/or your valuable time, if you are disposed to join us.

### Update on Appledore broadband upgrade scheme

It has now been several months since the scheme in Appledore was initiated to build fibre broadband to our homes and businesses. With full fibre broadband, the performance should be as good as Internet connectivity gets anywhere in the UK.

Our online form for expressing interest in the scheme (found on the parish council website) had 61 addresses of homes and businesses that responded with the intention to adopt fibre broadband. With the government vouchers taken up by these addresses, we anticipated a subsidy of around £105k to build the required infrastructure.

This address list was submitted to BT who eventually came back with a response. To deliver fibre to the 61 addresses would require building infrastructure for 243 premises (as much of the infrastructure is shared at distribution points). The cost for which would be £365k.

Obviously, the voucher scheme would not fund the build. Furthermore, the Kent County Council has also stopped offering the generous voucher top-up scheme. At this point, only the central government scheme, offering £1,500 per property and £3,500 per business is available. It is however anticipated that KCC will introduce a revised (less generous) top-up scheme soon. Regardless, the expectation is that vouchers alone will not fund the build and we need to consider alternatives.

We've since contacted BT to look at other options. These could include a reduced scope or waiting for other schemes in the area to be completed, which both have the potential to reduce costs.

In the meantime, the waiting game continues. It is worth noting however that timescales for any build will be a minimum of 12 months, and a complete process could easily be 18 months. As such, those considering alternative options may want to pursue those.

### Legging It


