a stable to live in. Here in these insanitary conditions, the woman gave birth to her first son. We know this as the birth of Christ, but this scenario is being repeated many times over in Gaza. Leaving the politics aside, the situation in Gaza is horrific. At writing, the first hostage release is imminent and I hope by publication, there might even be a temporary truce in place as more hostages are released daily in small groups. But even if by some miracle the bloodshed is over by the end of the year, the physical rebuilding of that small strip of land is an immense task and the mental healing of it's people almost impossible.

Both Palestinians and Jews can rightly claim historical ownership of the land. There is no easy answer to this issue. The only answer is for a change in the hearts and souls of both sides, helped by a united world, and for a willingness to live next to each other peacefully.

Can this ever happen? I sincerely believe that with God's help, peace can be achieved both in the Middle East, in Ukraine, Somali, Yemen and other war striven parts of the world.

'The earth is but one country and Mankind it's citizens'

Lets us all pray for peace over this joyous season.

From the Minister

We are currently in a season of light and dark, a season of much celebration thanks to Christmas and New Year, but also a season of cold, long, dark nights. This is a season which many struggle with for many reasons, perhaps because of a sense of expectation to be happy at times of celebration, or perhaps because of the oppressive nature of the aforementioned long, dark nights and inclement weather. It is also a season when we stop and take stock, to look back at the year that has passed and ahead for the year to come, but with a multitude of global crises making for an increasingly dark world, it can be difficult to maintain a sense gratitude for all that has been, a sense of joy for all that is and a sense of excitement for all that will be. Our light in dark times can seem to grow dim and leave us feeling disorientated and helpless.

While we may find some comfort in the consistency and continuity of familiar traditions at Christmas and New Year such as family meals, present-giving and fireworks, there is a greater encouragement to be found at this time of year. Despite our increasingly individualistic society, community remains an enormously valuable part of our lives, but only if it is fostered and invested in. Each of us is a part of our shared community and at this time of year, there are plenty of opportunities to come together and there is therefore plenty of opportunity for us to support our shared life together. It is in communal living, in the encouragement and building-up of one another, that we find divisions are bridged and barriers are torn down. The darkness that causes such divisions in the first place retreats when we, as individual lights in the world, gather to form a communal light and we are able to see each other more clearly.

The twelve-day festival of Christmas tells us a familiar story, one which we have likely heard many times before, but we love to hear a good story again and again, because stories are at the heart of communities and this particular story has community at its heart. Christmas tells of how God came to be in communion with creation in the person of Christ who is the light of the word: 'the light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it' (John 1:5). Two thousand years ago, a community of people came together under a starry sky to catch a glimpse of a child who would change the world. The same light that was offered to that community all that time ago is still offered to us as a community today, and it is the passion of the local church to provide time and space in which we can come together in that light, to feel afresh the love that it radiates into our hearts and to see each other more clearly in our shared life together. You are therefore warmly invited to your church's many services and events this Christmas season and beyond which include carol services, Christingles, crib services, Midnight Mass, and much more, including the Feast of Epiphany.

Christmas ends with the twelfth night on 6th January when Epiphany is celebrated to remember the arrival of the Magi at Bethlehem after their long journey following the star. 'Epiphany' means 'to reveal that which is hidden', and it is light that reveals to us that which is hidden by darkness. The light offered to us by Christ never grows dim and so I pray that, in the midst of this season of darkness, God's blessing is poured out on our communal life and that our hearts are illuminated to reveal a renewed sense of thankfulness, awe and hope in all that we hold dear.

A very Merry Christmas and Happy New year to you all.

This is a photo of Mekedes who has become our sponsored child through a Christian organisation called Compassion.

She is five years old and lives in Sidama, a hilly region in southern Ethiopia (Sidama refers to the region and the indigenous people), which is an important coffee producing area. Both of her parents are day-labourers, with no guaranteed income.

Our sponsorship, prayer and personal encouragement will help release her from poverty. Mekedes will be provided with health check-ups, nutritional support and the love of the local church. We hope that she can also now go to school.

We have committed to sponsoring Mekedes until she finishes her education and this will give her the best chance to improve her future and her family's too.

We are making a regular contribution through our PCC funds, but organisations such as Compassion ask that we consider giving money for a Christmas present or a birthday present (Mekedes birthday is on the 20th January). The Ramblers Walk 17th November 2023

This month is heading towards being one of the wettest November's on record. We have been battered by Storm Ciaran which bought 80 mph winds causing flooding and damage across the country. Indeed a big tree came down next to our house blocking in the Mill House behind us. A huge tree in their garden also blew down; the irony of this was both trees landed in the garden of another neighbour Rob, who happens to be a very skilful and nimble tree surgeon!

Someone above is obviously looking down favourably on our group of ramblers, as although it has rained most of the week, today the sun is shining and it's warm! Seven of us meet at the rec and we welcome Melanie to the group. We head towards the Heath end of the village, picking up Val as we pass her house and Lynn and Brenda from the crossroads making 10 in total. We carry on towards Woodchurch, passing Donkey Lane and then to Moor Lane which is where we are walking today. We pass the many poly tunnels where

local farmer and stalwart of the community James, grows his specialist salads and herbs. We continue down Moor Lane and Brenda points out that it was always called Shirley Moor Lane and she wonders why it was changed. We pass the allotments on our left, which are being cleared and revamped by a very hardworking committee. They already look transformed and will be ideal for anyone wanting to grow vegetables to enter in next year's Village Show!! We pass the local dog groomers and a farmyard on our right and a modern converted barn on our left.

Moor Lane is a narrow country lane and in places grass grows up through the tarmac making it look as if it's from times gone by. The Lane cuts across Shirley Moor and comes out on Brook Street which is the road between Tenterden and Woodchurch. The views open up and we can see for miles across the landscape. The landform is a flat flood plain but has gentle hills on either side. On the horizon we can pick out the 'twin towers' of the agricultural silos. The Tenterden Sewer and The Cradlebridge Sewer are the main drainage channels across the Moor and the land is now mostly arable creating the appearance of a rural wetland.

After a couple of miles we turn right off the lane and pick up footpath AT114, this follows the edge of a field and then takes us over a bridge. We continue up the hill and on reaching the top admire the beautiful views over Shirley Moor and towards Woodchurch in the distance. We know this area as have walked it before on previous walks to Woodchurch and through Hole Farm. As we take in the amazing scenery around us I notice that the field we are standing in is totally covered in spider's webs. None of us have ever seen anything like it before. The whole field is covered in a sea of gossamer strands that sparkle in the rays of the sun. The sight is breath taking and as soon as I get home I google this amazing sight. There are photographs that look exactly the same as the ones I have taken and it says the intricate constructions are the work of money spiders. Apparently the spiders climb to the highest point they can and release silk threads to form a triangular parachute which catches the breeze and lifts the spider into the air and away from the site. The technique is known as ballooning and allows the tiny spiders to travel much further than they could on foot! Wow how clever is nature?!! We carry on and the footpath has now become the AT116. We follow it through a couple more fields and then through to the stile at Munks Farm which is incredibly slippery. We walk along the road and back into the village all agreeing it has been another great walk. Last ramble of the year is December 15th – meet at Appledore Recreation Ground at 1.00 pm - all welcome!!
