A Letter from the Ministry Team at St Peter & St Paul Church, Appledore

Dear Friends,

As December begins, Christmas is 'standing in the wings' and we begin to anticipate its many delights. Not the least of these, is the opportunity to spend time with family and friends. This time last year, the hopes of those living in South-East England were dashed, when it was decided that Covid restrictions could not, after all, be relaxed over the Christmas period, and many were devastated. But 2021 has been a year of hope, as the introduction of vaccines have made us feel more secure. We are, therefore, looking forward with much greater confidence to an indulgence of festive food, crackling log fires, a slump of undemanding television programmes and, most importantly, joyous family gatherings.

A TV series which I find quite addictive is called 'Saving Lives at Sea'. It focuses on rescues carried out by Britain's lifeboats, using footage from cameras worn by the lifeboat crew themselves. They are so brave, and so selfless! An enormous variety of rescues have featured, but one in particular has stayed with me. Recently, the Eastbourne lifeboat was called to attend a heavily laden, illequipped dinghy, carrying about 30 refugees. Having lost all power, and taking on water, its occupants were wet, bitterly cold and some unwell. Among them were several women, and four children. The youngest of these was only 3 years old. How grateful and relieved must their anxious parents have been as they were lifted gently onto the lifeboat, receiving a 'thumbs up', and warm blankets from the crew. The programme brought home to me, with alarming force, the desperation which causes such people to leave homes and families behind and set off upon such a dangerous journey. Such folk will have little hope of family reunions this Christmas – or perhaps ever.

When Mary and Joseph, with their baby son, fled to Egypt, following King Herod's dastardly threat to kill all little boys under the age of two years, the Holy Family became refugees and asylum seekers. Fearful of returning under his regime, they remained in Egypt until Herod died. I hope that they were kindly treated. I don't suppose they were welcomed by everybody. But I hope that they were offered warmth and hospitality, and made good friends – the sort of comfort which we all crave, whether at Christmas or at any other time.

May you, this Christmas, and always, be blessed by the presence of your nearest and dearest, and may you hold a welcome in your hearts for those who are far from home.

Childhood Memories of A Life in Appledore **December and a time for carol singing!!**

In the 1950s an organised group of singers would spend several evenings working their way through the village singing carols. The group would consist of adults and young people, but always needed two men, or strong lads, to carry the organ. It was a portable organ about 3 feet/1 metre long with a handle at each end, and at the bottom were two 'paddles' that the organist had to pump with their feet to produce the air for the notes as they played. The group would set up outside a group of houses. The organ being placed on

firm ground along with the stool for the organist, and carol singing would

commence.

After 2 or 3 carols, one or two of the group, with collection tins at the ready, would knock at the doors hoping for donations. Sometimes a householder would give out mince pies as well. The group would then move along to another set of houses and the process repeated all over again.

I believe one of the charities supported was the National Children's Homes, but I could be wrong.

I suppose today we would be singing to carols being played on our mobile 'phones!



Appledore Local History Society held an Open Day, jointly with Appledore Parish Magazine, in the Methodist Chapel from 10am until 4pm on Saturday 30th October

We were very pleased with the level of attendance, which was very encouraging. We greatly appreciate the kind donations made on the day, as they will contribute to helping us cover our ongoing costs, which have been adversely impacted by the pandemic, having prevented us from organising any fund-raising events during the last 20+ months.



We had numerous items on display enabling visitors to browse through them, eg photo albums from Appledore School (closed in 1991). We also received some helpful information from visitors that will be built into our archive/database.

For the day, we created the Appledore Heritage Collection. helped by a small grant, courtesy of Michael Hill of KCC. Paddy Moseley donated display cabinets, which complimented our own display units. In addition to items from our own collection, interesting artefacts were kindly lent and/or donated Parishioners, including our Chair, Brian Knight, and a past Chair and Honorary Member, Liz Owen.



There was also a small display put together by the Appledore Methodist community regarding its current plight. Without an increase in the congregation and other revenue opportunities, the Methodist Chapel might be closed and possibly sold, resulting in the small congregation needing to travel elsewhere for their services. Also adversely impacted will be the weekly coffee mornings and the loss of a home for the ALHS stored archives and the Heritage Collection.

As this is the last Parish Magazine issue for 2021, we wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.


Platinum Jubilee 2nd June. 2022.

This may be a little premature but some of us may still recall Her Majesty's ascension in 1952 (the coronation actually took place in 1953). To officially celebrate the Platinum Jubilee, the village plans to hold a "1952"-themed "Street Party" on the Recreation Ground on Thursday 2nd June, scheduled to be a Public Holiday, so please mark your diaries..

The entertainment will last from morning to night with 1950s music and dance provided by several local bands including The Rockitmen, Hart and Harper, and the Cinque Lindy Hoppers. We'll have food stalls providing food and ice-creams for those who'd prefer to buy, but you're also welcome to bring your own picnic. Gusbourne Estate will have a gazebo selling wines, The Grapevine from Rye selling Champagnes and cocktails, plus a Pimms wagon. Several local artisans will be selling produce and there will be a display of classic vehicles from the period also. We'd encourage party goers to dress in period dress and Katie and Jade from Blush will be offering 1950s hair-do's for those inclined (sadly no longer an option for this writer).

All clubs and organisations from the village are welcome to participate. St Peter and St Paul Church is planning to join the celebrations, along with the Village Hall, and the Appledore Local History Society. We'll have a Jubilee tree-planting, and the day's celebration will crescendo with the lighting of the beacon on Horne's Place viewed from the Recreation Ground to the voluminous accompaniment of Millie Scott playing the bagpipes. The beacon lighting will happen across the United Kingdom and overseas territories at 9:15pm on the order of HRH's Pageant Master, to a specially written piece by Stuart Liddell: "Diu Regnare". In the true spirit of a national celebration, please mark the date and welcome everyone in Appledore to participate in this magnificent occasion. Save The Black Lion!

You may have heard that the proposed sale of The Black Lion is likely to fall through. A great disappointment for Ray and Sandra, after all their hard work in difficult times and after their huge contribution to the village.

The future of our village pub is in the balance. One way to safeguard the future of our pub is for the pub to be owned by us - the villagers - ourselves. Do you agree?

To introduce myself, I am Simon Honnor, an Appledore villager. My career included work as a chartered surveyor – originally and briefly valuing public houses and later in property banking and working on other projects. I am asking people in Appledore to come forward and have their say about the future of The Black Lion. This is not just a questionnaire. I am asking what you want for the future of our pub and what you may be prepared to do, so that we can make a good outcome happen, together. For example:-

Do you want to keep the pub as it is after Ray and Sandra have started a well-earned retirement?

How important is it to you that the pub does not close?

Would you like to see some changes to the pub which may provide more benefits for the village and would you help to make this happen?

Would you be prepared to help with putting up money to fund the pub purchase for the village?

Do you want to be part of a team trying to secure the pub for the village?

At this stage I am asking for your feedback in order to chart the way forward. My wife Andrea and I shall collate your feedback. Information given in confidence will be treated appropriately. Hopefully most can be shared. This is an opportunity for the village to save our pub and we are asking the village which direction it wishes to take, in an open and transparent way. We need to see what resources are available, in terms of money, people and skills. We have already done some research into charity-type funding. If required we may then arrange for a business plan with funding options to be prepared. Again, we shall be guided by your feedback.

Please make contact with your feedback no later than 20th December. But preferably as soon as possible. If we can, it would be great for everyone to know that the future for the pub looks more positive soon, without more time suffering uncertainty.

Lastly, we all know that Ray and his staff are doing a great job keeping The Black Lion going. These have been challenging months for Ray, Sandra and everyone in their team. Let's make this an opportunity to do something great for the village.

Court Lodge Road Car Park

Village Hall Extension and Refurbishment

Work on the project is progressing well with completion scheduled for early next year.

Hall interior

All of the windows and doors have been installed. The kitchen and toilets have been tiled and the floors in the 'small hall' and other areas prepared for their final finish.

Exterior

Larch timber cladding is being fitted to the new part of the building and the older section is being rendered. The entrance steps and front wall are under construction.

Car Park

A sustainable drainage system has been installed at the far end of the car park to take rainwater from the Hall, with the drainage ditch in the land beyond reprofiled to safely take away any overflow caused by heavy rainfall.

Next steps

Once finished the exterior render will be painted. Flooring to be fitted to the small hall, loft area, meeting room and hallway. The kitchen units, toilet cubicles and sanitary ware will be delivered over the next few weeks.



ROAD CLOSURES AT NO 1 THE STREET

The problems caused by the road closure beside the houses under construction in 'the narrows' before the Appledore Flower Show in August will still be in many people's minds. I'd like to thank the Parish Council for their support in holding the Southeast Water and their subcontractors to account for what we all would agree was a less than satisfactory performance. Martello must maintain a constructive relationship with utility providers generally, but I want to assure the community that the incidents were reported to OFWAT in a lengthy interview in September.

Many also may wonder why it was necessary for a further part closure in October. A blocked sewage pipe caused the partial closure. This pipe is owned and maintained by Southern Water, who were alerted after Martello's contractors faced a rather messy discovery of the blockage as they made a sewerage connection. Southern Water sent urgent teams to inspect the blockage, drain the overflow and later sent a repair team, which necessitated the single vehicle pass-way near No 1 The Street.

Whilst it caused more inconvenience to pedestrians and road users, the discovery turned out to be slightly fortuitous, namely the finding of a clog that would have affected several neighbouring properties, along with the new properties at Canal View. The consequences later could have been very much worse.

Thanks for your patience with road closure and other traffic interruptions during the construction of the Canal View development.

Interview with Patricia Fogden – Vicar of Appledore who has just retired.

I was lucky recently to catch our Vicar while she was packing up for a new adventure after retiring from Appledore Church after ten years of service here. All of us at the Parish Magazine would like to wish Tricia and her husband all the very best for the future and thank her for her service to us all.

I'd like to take you back to where it all began – when did you enter the Ministry?

In 1994 I was turned down for training as Reader in Portsmouth. At the time I was a senior Nurse Manager in theatres in Southampton. At my interview for the training, they said that because my job was so demanding, they thought I wouldn't have time to train as a reader. I disagreed as I found my job at the time a doddle. But as usual, God knows best, and six months later, I was asked to also take on the training of the operating theatre assistants, so sure enough, the reader training would have to have taken a backseat.

Then eight years later, we moved here to Snave and one day I was in Ruckinge Church during an interregnum and as we were going through all the paperwork from the diocese, I saw a document saying, "This is your last chance – apply for Reader training now"! So, I applied but because we were in interregnum, I would have to wait for my new vicar to come as he had to put me forward. Then the goalposts changed again and two weeks later the area Dean said he would put my name forward. So, I went to the University of Kent for three years' training as a Reader. Then, towards the end of my training we had a weekend on the work of a Reader with the Bishop of Maidstone. As the weekend went on, I kept thinking, "I' don't want to be a Reader, so I spoke to him, and he told me to I pray with a couple of friends..."

When you said you didn't want to be a Reader, what did you mean? That you wanted more?

I felt that wasn't what God was calling me to do – it was more.

So my friends and I prayed. One of my friends offered to pray for my husband which nobody had offered to do before! When I got home and my husband asked how the weekend had gone – I said fine and he said, "Well, I don't think you should go for Reader, I think you should go for Ordained Ministry." There was my answer! So, I applied for Ordained Ministry and the rest is history! I was ordained at Canterbury Cathedral on 28th June 2003.

So, by 2000 were there fewer objections to women vicars by then? Yes, the first women were ordained in 1994.

So, you've never experienced any kind of resistance?

Well, there were two people in my group of churches that I knew were anti women; one was a Church Warden and the day that I was accepted for my training, I was going up to the church and he was coming out and I thought, "Ur..." and he threw his arms around me and said, "You'll make a wonderful priest," and that was "One down, one to go!"

And the other chap said to me. "You know I love you dearly, but I just don't believe in women priests."

I said, "That's not a problem at all,", and I would ring him up before Communion to tell him I was taking the service that day, so he didn't have to come. Anyway, after a while he was very ill, and I hadn't rung up as I'd got out of the habit of doing so and then one Sunday he came, and it was me taking the service and I touched his wife on the shoulder and said, "I'm sorry it's me taking Communion today."

When it came to Communion, they got up and I thought, "This is going to be embarrassing," as I thought they were going to walk out, and they came up for Communion! And I couldn't get the words out, I really couldn't! Even thinking about it now, I fill up with tears. He just winked at me!

And afterwards, he said that when he was so very ill, his wife had said to him, "Do you want me to get you the Rector?" and he said, "NO, I can't stand that man!" Her answer was, "I don't understand you; you will take Communion from a man you don't like, and you like Tricia but won't take it from her!" He realised that she was right, but he had to have the last word by saying to me, "But you won't be a bishop will you!" (laughter)

How long have you been in Appledore and where were you before? I was ordained into the parishes of Orlestone with Snave, Ruckinge, Warehorne, Kenardington and Hamstreet. I have been in Appledore 10 years.

Wow – so you get so many churches at a time?

Well, unfortunately the benefices are getting bigger and bigger with fewer and fewer priests.

I also received the Bishop's Licence in Europe as well as Canterbury. That means I can take services in Europe, which I still do on occasion. I have held services in Germany, Tenerife and Holland so far. I'm hoping to do more now that I am retired.

Has your Licence to preach in Europe been affected by Brexit at all? No, as far as the Church of England is concerned because I go as a locum – I'm not paid – it is voluntary.

How did you end up in Appledore? Was it natural progression?

Part of my training was in Appledore for 6 months under Lindsay Hammond and then I was contacted by the vicar after Lindsay - Neville Gallagher - and he contacted me to say he was going to retire soon and was I interested. When the post came up It was advertised as House for Duty and I didn't want to do that.

What does that mean?

Well, it means you are given the house but have to pay all the bills, you are not paid anything apart from expenses so it is quite an expensive undertaking. At the last minute, I decided I would apply. I came for an interview and was offered the post! A couple of years later the post was changed to a part time paid position.

So, you have been here since 2011 – how do you feel about leaving? Extremely sad!

Do you have to go?

Yes, well technically the retirement age is 70 but I had hoped I might stay here a little longer! But things have changed so much, and our hours would go towards making a full-time post. So, the benefice will now have just 2 full-time priests and a full-time curate, and they will cover Tenterden, St. Michael's, Smallhythe and Wittersham, Ebony, Rolvenden, Newenden, Appledore and Stone.

Wow! Whereas before you were just Appledore and Stone?

Yes, but I was part of the whole Benefice of nine – I covered some services there but my main focus was here.

What will you remember most about Appledore?

Oh, the people! I have been so lucky to have had such a wonderful band of people and not just church people – that's the beauty of it! Yes, I have my church council and the people who come to church regularly but it's also the people who don't come to church regularly! And when you look at things like our Flower Festival – the whole village comes together and it's wonderful, and that's what I like about this village. When push comes to shove everybody comes together

We've just seen that with the scarecrows! 21 scarecrows we had! I was so upset because I was going to do a scarecrow vicar, but I was up at my mum's that week – she's 93 – I went up for her birthday.

What changes have you seen in Appledore since 2011 – in the past ten years?

Well, er... there's been quite a bit of new housing.

What about the new people coming in?

A lot more holiday people – a lot more of the houses are holiday lets and you don't always know. I think there are a couple of people not far from the vicarage that I've met once in ten years!

I wonder if that phenomenon will grow after Covid with people wanting to escape to the country?

Hmm, maybe.

Next question – your husband – has he followed you with your job?

No, we own a boarding cattery in Snave. He has had to stay there as part of the licence is that somebody is there all the time, so he is there and I run between the two! I tend to do my Sunday services and then go home because my day off is a Monday, so I stay and come back on a Tuesday.

So what will you do now? What's next?

Yes... good question! (laughter)

For six months I'm not allowed to do anything as far as the church is concerned and then I can apply for a "Permission to Officiate Licence" from the Bishop. The beauty of them not replacing me here is that I can return to assist with services on this Ministry team because normally you aren't allowed to come back to the last place you have been. This is so that you don't get under the feet of the new incumbent, but because I'm not being replaced I can come back! That's the one good thing from my point of view! So, I've not gone for ever!

Can you say how many marriages and baptisms you have officiated at in Appledore?

Yes (after checking and telephone call back)!
55 weddings with 3 more booked for next year and 36 baptisms!

What have been your most memorable occasions in Appledore? I'm going to come on to the Christmas Services because I think they are the best thing! (lots of laughter!) I love them so much!

They are certainly different!

But other memorable times?

The Queen's Jubilee - that was another occasion with the village coming together. We did a service in a marquee on the Recreation ground and that was really good and also a concert in the church – we had mostly local people performing. I sang Rule Britannia dressed in a Union Jack dress!

On the day of the Jubilee celebrations, Kito and I walked up through the village with our Union Jacks and we had our Jubilee Queen and her three princesses – young women – they drove up to the Pavilion on the back of a car!

Of course, I will always remember the Flower Festivals – they are out of this world... because everybody comes together to make it a success.

Strange as it sounds, but I am also thankful for the privilege of sitting with those who were dying. Firstly, as I felt blessed to be asked and secondly to just be there with them.

Seeing as this is the Christmas Edition of the magazine – I have to ask – what was your best Christmas Service?

Oh gosh

I've written in my notes – all memorable! (laughter)

It's difficult because every year they are so different! (laughter)

You never know what's going to happen!

No, you don't! Probably one of the most memorable was when George the donkey – God rest his soul because he's just died – pooped going down the aisle and the children thought this was hysterical!

But probably my most memorable was when we took the theme of the film Frozen and we turned the church into an ice palace with blue lights, lit up white trees and a clip from the film (I did ask permission). I got everyone singing "Let it Go".

That's lovely!

This year where and how will you spend Christmas Day?

Well, that's a good question! I don't know! Our normal Christmas for my husband and me – because Christmas is so full on – I normally go home after the Christmas services, and we have toad in the hole because that is Peter's favourite meal. Then our surrogate family who took us on when we were building our house and I was living in Hamstreet normally come for a Christmas dinner on Boxing Day.

So, this year we haven't discussed Christmas! I'll have to find somewhere to go to church on Christmas morning, but I don't know where yet.

Do you know what will be happening here?

No, there will be services here but I haven't seen the December rota yet but there will be one!

The problem with Christmas is that everyone wants a service at the same time on the same day!

Here we tend to do a non-Communion service on Christmas morning, that is easier to cover because it doesn't have to be a priest.

One thing I have been thinking about – these small villages – there are fewer and fewer priests coming into the Ministry – well that's my interpretation...

No – there are actually more and more coming forward for training!

So why is this happening?

Well, we are getting to that stage – I'm of the Baby Boomer generation - where there are a lot of us retiring, which doesn't help.

Expenses is it?

Yes, at the end of the day it does also come down to money.

And what would they need - more people coming to the services?

Well, more money coming into the church – either by more people coming into the services or things like people leaving a legacy in their wills to the church. But even that isn't enough at the end of the day. Each church needs to be totally self-sufficient.

You don't get any money from the Government?

No, a lot of people think we do but that's not the case. The church has to pay its own way. I mean here in Appledore I think we pay £17-18,000 to the Diocese each year. This goes towards paying my stipend (salary), maintenance of the Vicarage, training new clergy, Safe guarding and the support of Diocesan House and Officers. These are all required to help run the church.

Is the Appledore Church in good nick?

Yes, we are very fortunate, we have the Friends of Appledore Church who look after most of any fabric requirements. It is in pretty good nick compared to a lot of churches.

So, what are you going to do next?

A few more cruises! (laughter)

That was my next question! (laughter)

We have two cruises booked for next year - in Feb. to the USA and Caribbean, in July we are going to Oberammergau – for the Passion play that was postponed last year.

And then in September we are going to Canada which is a cruise again postponed from last year. AND just this morning we booked two cruises for the summer of 2023!

Wow, two?

Yes, back-to-back. One is to the Canary Islands and the other is to Spain and Portugal.

Why cruises?

I love the sea as does my husband was an officer in the Royal Navy. He never wanted to go on a cruise because he said it would be a busman's holiday. But he promised me that for my 60th birthday we would go on a cruise! So, we did and two days into the cruise as we were crossing the Atlantic, I have a photograph of him, Kindle in one hand, bag of crisps in the other and he said, "I don't know why we didn't do this sooner!" I could have hit him! He is now as enthusiastic as I am about cruising.

Is there anything you'd like to add or a message for Appledore?

I will miss everyone and the village.

A huge thank you because I've had so much support – from everyone! Including of course the Methodist Church – as I am also the Methodist minister for Appledore - and that has been a delight and privilege as well.

Do you think our church is in a healthy position?

Yes, I think it is. One of the reasons is probably because I have tended to do fairly long cruises which has enabled the lay people to step up and take services. The Benefice Clergy will keep it going and there is strong lay support. Appledore Church has a core of very loyal people whom I certainly couldn't have been without.

Personally I will miss the people and the village. I'm going to miss opening my garage door and driving my buggy up through the village and seeing the life of Appledore stretch out in front of me!

Appledore Local History Society

Established in 1989 by a group of enthusiastic residents, the Appledore Local History Society, (ALHS), has become the centre for the gathering, recording, and maintaining of knowledge, in various formats, of life in and around the village of Appledore, Kent.

Members of ALHS meet at The Methodist Hall, our current base, on the 2nd Thursday of the month. Formalities are minimal, leaving the remainder of the time for group reviews of documents, photographs and artefacts that have been gathered over the years and which continue to be deposited or loaned to us for recording, further research where necessary and for preservation.

Acquisition of our digital archival system was a significant turning point in the data recording process, which has allowed us to digitise much of the historic data that has been collected. The work continues as we seek to include all information collected so far and that which we continue to receive, thereby widening the knowledge we have of Appledore through the ages.

ALHS arrange for visiting speakers to deliver talks on matters of historic interest, specifically as relates to Appledore and the surrounding area, as well as arranging for group visits to sites of historic interest. Monies raised from such events are deployed exclusively for the benefit of the village.

Members of ALHS engage in specific local events, for example in repairs and tending to the graves of those who died in service for our country and are buried in the old cemetery of the village church of St Peter and St Paul.

Provide a focal point for the regular gathering of residents interested in the history of the village and surrounding areas

Facilitate the collection, collation and sharing of information and artefacts and to provide a repository for the benefit of future generations

Welcome and inform new residents of the history of the village and surrounding

Provide visitors to Appledore some basic facts that will enhance their knowledge of the village





We are interjecting a new format for our reading and, alongside the chosen monthly book, we will revisit some of the classics or old favourites, which we intend to discuss every two to three months. The first chosen book is To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee, which we will review in January.

Our first read was *The Hunting Party* by Lucy Foley, which produced some lively and interesting discussions. Ultimately, the opinion was that, whilst we read the book avidly to discover who the victim and murderer were, we were not overly impressed with the complexity of the characters. Overall, a one-star rating.

For our next read we discussed three books from different genres; Mystery - The Thursday Murder Club by Richard Osman, Historical - A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles and Romance - In Five Years by Rebecca Serle. Romance won!! So, our next read was *In Five Years*; we were looking for it to be an uplifting read, and it to be just as original as it is purported to be.

Although this was billed as a romance novel, to most of us this didn't really follow through with the characters. The true love story was between the two best friends, not the main couple. The premise of the book was based around one of the main characters, Dannie, and her dream. To us, the dream seemed unbelievable and lead us to think in the wrong direction, concentrating on the potential fallout from the dream rather than the close friendship between Dannie and Bella. We all thought that it was rather disappointing that the book ended on an unnecessary red herring. Therefore, we rated the book as a good holiday read, but not much more, so three stars.

Further books were discussed, from *The Midnight Library*, (noted as an excellent read but already read by some) to a historical novel, A Beautiful Spy and the chosen book, a thriller, The Last House on Needless Street. This novel makes the reader believe that they know what's inside the last house on Needless Street. The story sounds familiar. That's where you're proven wrong, it's not what you think. We're looking forward to hearing everyone's comments on this intriguing thriller.

When these are viewed with some surprise


But my Jock, he really doesn't care
