

## Minister's Letter February 2024

Anyone who has ever moved house will be familiar with the inevitable trip into the loft that comes as a part of the move. Lofts can hold a wealth of treasures and also a store of junk: those things we didn't quite want to get rid of last time we moved; the stuff that *may* one day have a use; the items that are of sentimental value...a first pair of shoes for a toddler, an item of jewellery from a departed relative, toys that once brought so much fun and pleasure into young lives.

As we look through these items they bring back a flood of memories that far exceed the objects themselves. Then there is the decision to be made – do we keep them or let them go?

This sort of decision can make us think: if we could only save what we could carry what would we pick up? We often use the scenario of a fire, but as we watch the news – both home and abroad, war, natural disaster and the weather have displaced countless people and they have had to discard all their belongings including their very home in a split second.

Should we be faced with such awful situations, in reality we would probably not want to carry any possessions as we would be more bothered about the people and pets around us. Photos, books and tech equipment bring their own pleasure, but we can certainly do without them and many are replaceable. Even keepsakes, whilst they hold sentimental value are nothing compared to those we love.

What actually defines us is not so much the things we have – but the people with whom we travel through these lives. It is the interaction and journeying together that often give the meaning and purpose to our lives rather than the possessions we have.

So here we are at the beginning of 2024. As we embark on the new year, it is a good time to reflect on what it is we actually want to hold on to. It could be that our memories of 2023 are in part made up of accumulated clobber interspersed with little gems. It is likely that some of the last year has already been lost from the memory bank, but little gems remain. Moments in time that have shaped each of us by their uniqueness, or through the extravagant compassion and grace revealed.

I hope that 2024 will bring you moments to wonder, gems to remember, that irrespective of material possessions, those accents of love will define the year ahead.

# BEGINNING AND ENDING THE DAY WITH GOD Daily Online Services

Watch and Pray will be the theme of Beginning the Day with God. Watch and Pray will challenge us to seek God in both familiar and unfamiliar places: in darkness and in quiet; in movement and migration; in the healing and transforming work of the Spirit; in the weeping of Holy Week and in the joy of Easter morning.

Ending the Day with God will also have a Lenten theme.

## Only On A Sunday...?! Month One – Sunday

Being a member of the clergy team is a role that embraces a variety of different facets. Many people think they have a good idea as to what we do – many people too have ideas about what it is we *should* do! But what exactly does priestly ministry entail? How do we pass our ministerial time?

Over the next few months, we will explore how a 'typical' week looks for the clergy team in our wonderful benefice of nine churches. By taking a day each month, we will see how a rich tapestry of worship, mission, ministry and yes, paperwork, weave together to help keep the word and work of God alive and well here.

This month we begin with Sunday.

When it comes to what the clergy do, Sunday is probably the day that is most familiar to the world outside the church. It is the day in which most of our focus is quite rightly on the leading of public acts of worship.

Across the Tenterden, Rother and Oxney Benefice, our churches offer a great variety of worship. For those who like to begin their day with a said communion service there is the weekly 8am in Tenterden and once a month an 8am Book of Common Prayer (BCP) service in Rolvenden. These services last about forty minutes and do not have hymns, although in Tenterden music provides a reflective background to certain parts of the service. When possible two priests will take the Tenterden service. With the music and the livestream there is lots to set up and lead and so it ensures that it is smoother and more prayerful with more hands!

After this there are services across the benefice at 9:30 and 11am. Some are Common Worship (CW) Eucharists, some BCP communions. The BCP has a heritage going back to 1662 and is familiar to many worshippers. CW was brought in in 2000 and is a more contemporary service. Often going from one to the other in quick succession, there is a need to think carefully about the form of words and worship we are leading!

Some of our main services are known as a 'Service of the Word'. That is, opposed to a 'Service of the Sacrament'. A Service of the Word can include BCP Matins, Morning Praise or Celtic Morning Prayer.

Baptisms are a popular service for families who have usually had a connection with the church at some point and are often a good opportunity to enable those guests who are less familiar with the church to come into the buildings and experience a Christian act of worship. We often do this service as a stand-alone on a Sunday afternoon.

Sunday afternoon has also become the time for Forest Church. Meeting once a month in an outdoor setting for something totally different that embraces creation, this service is for everyone but moves around the benefice and is especially welcoming of families.

Each Sunday ends with Evensong – a beautiful, calming, worshipful end to the day. At tone-in-Oxney this monthly service is the one regular service and is fully sung. Tenterden have a weekly evensong which reaches a wider congregation by being livestreamed.

Many people assume that Sunday is our busiest day. However, although it often begins at 7:15am with the unlocking of Tenterden Church and ends twelve hours later when Evensong is done and the doors are locked, it is actually one of the easiest days because it is the most predictable in its nature.

All of the worship offered in this benefice is only possible because of a faithful group of retired clergy and lay readers who give their time to help in leading services – including preparing their sermons, which is a significant commitment. Also, each parish has some amazing people who act as welcomers, (sidespeople), sacristans (setting the altar and clearing away after), tea and coffee makers, readers, intercessors and musicians.

All these things work together to make our Sunday a day of worship to our Father in heaven.

# Parish Council Update February 2024

#### Draft Budget:

The Parish Council has applied to increase the precept for Council Tax from April 2024. It is the first increase that the Parish Council has made for over a decade. The rise for a band D property will mean properties with no discounts will have an increase of £6.53 a year, from £67.89 to £74.41 (9.62%) per annum. The income that the Parish Council used to receive from the solar panels has now transferred over to the Village Hall, but there are still costs that need to be covered including staffing, street cleaning, maintenance and cleaning of the toilets and management of the car parks. We hope once the new houses next to the Village Hall have been completed, and the house owned by the Parish Council is rented, that the Parish Council precept will be lowered from next year.

**Speed Watch**: The team are short of volunteer support: we need some volunteers willing to give an hour once every 2 months or so to help reduce speed of traffic through our community. If you are able to help and can spare an hour or so every few months, please contact Roger Hiskey on 01233 758097

Mirror At Junction of Court Lodge Road with The Street: The Parish Council is investigating with Kent Highways whether they can install a mirror to help vehicles turning from Court Lodge Road onto the High Street.

#### **Allotment Plans**

Duncan Gray on behalf of the Allotment Society has submitted a request for funding from Ashford Borough Council to help develop the allotment site. It is hoped that the allotments will be up and running in a few months.

#### Improvements at the Recreation Ground

There are also plans to request funds to improve the Recreation Ground. This will include the development of a Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) and more facilities for spectators for all activities at the Recreation Ground. The Parish Council is using some of the funds from the sale of the field to help improve the pavilion.

#### **Planning Applications**

At the January meeting The Parish Council commented on several local planning applications, including Hornes Place Oast and Oaklands. # **Appledore Ramblers**

Well since the last magazine we have enjoyed two rambles. On December 15<sup>th</sup> there were 7 of us and 2 dogs, Brodie and Dilly. The weather was fine although it was very muddy underfoot. We walked a loop of the village going up to Mill Mound then down past Horne's Place and across the road to Oakhouse Farm. We then walked down Donkey Lane, past the allotments and up to Park Farm. We turned right from here walking along School Road to the crossroads where we turned left. We were then able to pick up the AT123 which goes in by the white cottages on the Tenterden road. This footpath is well trodden by local dog walkers as it has lovely views and comes out in the street via a gravel path. It was quite funny because one of our walkers, who has lived in the village over 30 years, owned up to never having walked this footpath! Our walk ended here because 12 of us were meeting up again in the evening for our Christmas 'Jolly' at the Black Lion and we needed time to shower and change! We enjoyed a lovely evening of good food and drink and lively conversation!

Our January ramble took place on the 19<sup>th</sup> and this time we broke all our previous records and 16 people and the well-known Brodie the black Labrador, turned up to ramble on a cold but very bright, sunny day. We are very pleased to welcome Denise and Brodie, Cindy, Lindsey, Fred who originates from Switzerland and Deidre from Belfast to the group. Tracy and I had done a recce for the walk earlier in the week but this had shown us that the last part of the walk was very difficult, so we checked our maps and re-routed our ending! We walked out the back of the rec along the canal on the AT261. This follows the Royal Military Canal and is good flat walking and not muddy, which is quite hard to find at this time of the year! Construction of the Royal Military Canal began in 1804 as part of the defences against Napoleonic Invasion and the original plan was to dig 22.5 miles by hand in less than a year. However the harsh winter weather and flooding caused much delay and after a year only 6 miles had been dug. The project was placed in the hands of the military who employed labourers known as 'navvies' and was eventually finished in 1809 by which time the Napoleonic threat had passed.

We walked all the way to the Garden Centre at Hamstreet which was about 5 miles. En route we spotted 3 egrets which are basically white herons and a cormorant which is a large diving bird. In places the canal was totally frozen and just a sheet of ice and swans were seen walking on top of the ice. There were a couple of stiles to negotiate but these were dog friendly with the separate lift up section to let the dog through. The only issue with this route was we had to cross the very busy A2070 road where the traffic was racing past! Anyway we survived the crossing, made it to the Garden Centre and was very ready for a sit down and nice cup of tea or coffee. Thankfully 3 of us had dropped cars at Hamstreet earlier and helpful husbands provided transport so we didn't have to walk back!

The next ramble is on Friday 16<sup>th</sup> February – meet at Appledore Recreation Ground at 1.00 pm – everyone welcome!!

#### NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE SCHOOL

The School Journey to London was a great success. Fourteen children from the top class, in charge of the Head, left Appledore Station at 9.05 a.m., and by 10.45 were standing awe-struck among the pigeons in Trafalgar Square. After the excitement of a journey by Underground ("Is this an Underground train?" asked one child, descending an escalator), they gazed at the wonder of the Dome of St. Paul's and climbed to the heights of the Stone Gallery. Then on to St. James' Park for sandwiches and a glimpse of Buckingham Palace ("Do you think Princess Anne might come into the Park to play?) followed by a walk through to Westminster Pier to embark for a trip down the Thames to Greenwich. Here they inspected the "Cutty Sark", visited the National Maritime Museum and had tea before returning to Westminster. Any surplus energy remaining was successfully discharged at the Children's Play Area near the Royal Festival Hall before the Party returned, tired but happy, to Charing Cross and thence to Appledore.

The Right Worshipful the Mayor of Tenterden (Alderman Leslie Chalk), will open the Church Fete, in Mr Nicholls' field at 3.00 p.m. on 6<sup>th</sup> August. This is believed to be the first time a Mayor has attended any function in Appledore.

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# Appledore Local History Society

With regard to December's 'Blast from the Past' – "Our Village". It is still a friendly and a nice place to live but much has changed since 1961.

One Windmill base is now part of a domestic property, as are the Oast Houses.

The Village Street no longer has a bakers, a butchers, two grocery shops. a petrol garage nor a blacksmith but it does have a Village Shop and Post Office, a hairdressers, a tea room and an antique centre.

The Methodist Chapel is in the process of being converted to a domestic property.

The Village has lost its school and three of its four public houses as well as our village policeman and Police House/Office.

There is still a bus service to Ashford or New Romney but no longer to Rye or Tenterden. There is a railway station but with no waiting room or staff. Trains operate to Ashford and Hastings/Eastbourne, but no longer to Lydd and New Romney.

We still have a Village Hall that has been very much improved over the years.

Our local garage now has better premises and an increased fleet of private hire coaches.

Many of the old farms are now utilised for other businesses such as grain services, heavy haulage, and groundwork plant services.

As well as builders the Village has several other businesses operating here as can be seen in the adverts depicted within the magazine

Many of the organisations mentioned have disbanded, but other new clubs and organisations have been formed as can be found in the Village Diary.

The fruit trees, runner beans, asparagus, tulips and daffodils are no longer grown around the Village and the dairy herds have disappeared, but we still have sheep farming. New businesses have emerged growing salads for London restaurants, a vineyard providing quality wines, and a local farm providing Appledore Turkeys for Christmas.

On the housing front, approx. 143 new domestic properties have been built, 21 of these being conversions of existing buildings or barns. Three original properties were demolished to allow some of these developments to take place. Eighteen new properties are being built at the present time, and when completed the total new properties since 1961 will be an increase of approx. 60%.

# FROM THE SHOW COMMITTEE



In last month's magazine we printed the Village Show Schedule and so now we can start to think about what classes we might like to enter on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> September. Class 31 is one jar of marmalade and this time of year is traditionally marmalade making season. This is because the bitter Seville oranges that are the most popular, because of their flavour and appearance, have a short season and are only available from early January to about the end of February. In the past I have bought Seville oranges from Waitrose and also from Tenterden market. You can however use any citrus fruits such as lemons, limes, grapefruit and sweet oranges but this generally gives marmalade a cloudier appearance and the pith does not turn as translucent as that of Seville oranges. This is the straightforward marmalade recipe I use.

- 1.5 kg (3lbs) Seville Oranges
- 3.5 litres (6 pints) water

Juice of 2 lemons

2.75 kg (6lbs) sugar

Wash the oranges and remove the stalks if necessary. Cut the oranges in half, squeeze out the juice and pour into a large pan. Tie the pips in a piece of muslin and add to the juice in the pan. Slice the orange peel and pith into thick or thin shreds and add to the pan. Pour the water into the pan with the lemon juice (I also slice the lemon peel and add) and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for 1.5 hours or until the peel is very soft. It should disintegrate when squeezed between the fingers. Remove the muslin bag, squeezing the juice back into the pan.

Add the sugar and stir over a low heat until it is dissolved. Boil rapidly until setting point is reached. The boiling time after sugar is added should be no longer than 15 to 20 minutes for a good set. To test for setting, place a spoonful of the hot marmalade on a cold plate from the fridge. If after 30 seconds it wrinkles and feels stiff when pushed with your finger, then it is ready. Remove any scum and allow to cool slightly before pouring into prepared jars. Wipe them clean and cover, label and store. This recipe makes about 4.5 kg or 10 lbs of marmalade.

I find marmalade very rewarding to make and love to see the filled jars all lined up in the cupboard! Please give the recipe a try as it would be lovely to have lots of jars entered in the

Village Show! Happy marmalade making!


I can easily get used to this sort of treatment.


