#### Kent Ride & Stride, St Peter and St Paul, Appledore

The Friends of Kent Churches Sponsored Ride & Stride takes place on the second Saturday in September each year.

## This year it will take place on Saturday 11th September.

To register as a participant, for further information, or to request a sponsorship form, please contact Fay Steed, pick up a form from the back of the church, or send an email to <u>www.friendsofkentchurches.co.uk</u>.

Participants plan their own routes with the assistance of a printed list of churches and chapels open. There are usually some 700 of these places of worship open, scattered right across this big county, and wherever you go you'll be assured of a warm welcome. Go individually, as a couple, with friends and family, with a cycling club, with your work colleagues, with school friends, with choirs, with a sports team – whoever you wish.

You need a special sponsor form. Please ask sponsors to tick for Gift Aid if they are taxpayers; this increases their donations by 25% with no cost to them. Ask your relations, friends and colleagues to sponsor you – so much per church or chapel visited between 10.00 am and 6.00 pm on the day.

50% of all sponsorship money raised can go to the church or chapel of your choice, with the other 50% going to the Friends of Kent Churches, who distribute it by grant aid to help the most needy churches in the county. Last year's Ride & Stride raised £140,602, including gift aid. There were over 850 riders and walkers, who visited an average of 12 churches each. In addition, over a hundred of those who welcomed visitors to our churches were themselves sponsored. Since it started, Ride & Stride has raised over £3 million in Kent and we hope to add to this total in 2021.

T-shirts and polo shirts are available to purchase. Cyclists can purchase bicycle flags with pole and bracket for the ride as a fun way to show their support and raise awareness.

## Parish Council Update, July 2021

#### **Parish Council By-Election**

Unfortunately, we will only know after the print deadline for the magazine who will be joining the parish council at the next meeting on the 5<sup>th</sup> July. Many thanks to both Andrea Honnor and Gary Kinsley for standing. (**Editor: we held off the deadline to include the result elsewhere in the magazine.)** 

**Pop-Up Café and Information Hub, 5<sup>th</sup> July, 10.30 – 12.30, Recreation Ground** Everyone is welcome for a 'cuppa'. Tables will be outside next to the play area. The Community Warden will be there too. It was good to see villagers at the last one.

#### Possible New Play Area for Heathside

A letter was hand-delivered to all the households on Heathside asking for residents' thoughts and comments about installing a small play area on the grass area which includes the shelter. Most households responded. The overwhelming comment was that it was not a suitable location and that increasing the current provision on the recreation ground was preferable. As a result, the parish council has contacted Ashford Borough Council to see whether this would be allowed. We await their advice.

#### Archaeological Report on the Court Lodge Development

Border Archaeology Limited has advised that they are making good progress with the archaeology from Appledore and the specialist analysis is ongoing so they expect that it will be another couple of months before they receive all those specialist reports.

The parish council have asked the planning officer to advise when a decision will be made and await a reply.

We are delighted to learn that Marion Gulliver, who used to live in the village, has recently returned to the area and is now residing in Tenterden. Marion has always been a supporter of the magazine and has remained on the mailing list. We wish her all the best in her new home, and look forward to once again seeing her around the village.

A chance conversation has brought about the following interesting account of one resident's experiences of fascinating employment throughout both the Brexit transition and the pandemic. Thank you David. Maybe someone else out there would like to share their encounters within the workplace over the past difficult months. We look forward to hearing from you:

"Hello Appledore, and Greetings from Mallorca. My name is David and I am Graham and Wendy Selmes' eldest son and for those of you unlucky enough to know me you may know that I work in live events, TV and theatre, thankfully I'm currently on the sunny then rainy Islas Baleares working on ITV's Love Island.

I thought I would take the time to let people know how COVID and Brexit have affected those of us working in Entertainment.

In March last year I had just returned from Russia having been working as Assistant Production Manager and Video Operator for Jean Paul Gaultier's Fashion Freakshow; which I can only describe as one of the most bizarre shows that I have ever worked, and trust me when I say, I have seen a lot! The stage was set (yes, the pun is intended.) to have a complete overhaul of the show and embark on a two year European and Australian tour with a stop in Japan to boot! Then the terrible news of "lockdown" came and almost immediately we were told to stop all work and go home.

That was the news across the board, overnight the industry that I know and love, the industry that I have spent twelve years labouring over STOPPED, gone was my booking to tour with a band across Europe, gone was Nickelodeon Slimefest, gone was MTV realitycon, there was nothing.

"Well, we hope this will all blow over by October and then we can still do (insert job name)." said the Company that I had been booked by, but as we all know it never came. Luckily, I managed to find employment running a drive-in cinema in Stafford 'The Great British Drive In', closely followed by a booking for ITV's "I'm A Celebrity Get Me Out of Here".

I often made the joke, "well I usually work in Tesco!" when working which never fails to get a laugh or a sigh! I have however stopped for the time being, with many of my friends having not been so lucky finding work, they have had to take jobs with Amazon or Tesco as delivery drivers to make ends meet.

While I know my industry is not the only one hit hard by the pandemic, we do seem to time and time again be pushed to the side as an afterthought, yet everyone still wants to watch the latest episode of Coronation Street or the next Netflix series and so filming has been allowed to carry on. Theatre on the other hand has had the doors barred shut, and the key tossed down the drain. As some of you may have recently read, Andrew Lloyd Webber is ready to go to prison so people can tread the boards.

I can waffle on for hours about it and the experiences I have had so far, but in the midst of it all, silently and without much dedication the 31<sup>st</sup> of December approached and we finally exited the European Union. Now I'm not here to start a debate, everyone was and is entitled to their opinion and this is just a reflection of my experience so far.

Some readers may be aware of the things I will outline here, some will not, and to many they will be of no consequence, they are however very real and very tiresome. For anyone having travelled for a job out of the Country, that requires things to be taken they will know of the Carnet. A document of temporary import. This (without boring everyone with intricate details.) is effectively a big list of everything you are taking into the Country. This list has to contain Item description, Item weight, item value, serial numbers and Item country of origin. This list is per lorry, when traveling with four, eight, fifteen lorries... each one containing thousands of lengths of cable.... You can see the sudden problem. "But you have to do that for any Country not in Europe anyway" I hear people say. While very true, a lot of the companies in the UK have never had a need to create such a thing. This also applies to personal tools, having to complete a personal Carnet for all of the tools that I need to bring to do my job (which is a lot.) One of the Chippys (carpenters) decided not to bother completing one and upon landing at customs got escorted to a different room and given an invoice for €867 import tax.

So, the trucks are finally packed the Carnets are complete, it's just time to get the crew out there to do the job, just not without a work visa, which apart from the cost also requires, a form from the police, an A1 form and three separate trips to the embassy.

This time last year (COVID excluding.) you bought your plane ticket, got on a plane and did the job, but it's not all doom and gloom, the news is good, we can now tour to Liechtenstein, Iceland and Norway visa free and to be honest I have always wanted to go to Iceland!

At 857 words I feel like I probably have bored everyone enough and as such leave you all with this thought.

You will struggle to find anyone who works in this industry who regards it as just a job. It is a way of life, when you are at the top of a stage fifteen hours into a day, you cannot just 'pick it up tomorrow ' there is a show that evening, with an audience of 50 to 50,0000 and in the words of that much used cliché I hate the most. "THE SHOW MUST GO ON."

So please, next time you get to see your favourite show, or band, and think this looks amazing! spare a moment for the Dimmer Tech, or the Sparks, the RF Engineer and the many other unsung professionals who have spent hours getting things just right so you can have the best experience possible. If not "I usually work in Tesco's mate I'm just here on work experience!"

#### Childhood Memories of A Life in Appledore

If you were to take a walk in the 1950s from the Recreation Ground along the footpath to the Canal, you would pass what was then called the Rush Field. As the footpath goes up on a bank next to a dyke on the left, the field on the right was completely full of rushes 4' to 6' tall.

As youngsters we would create passages, tunnels and igloo type camps amongst the rushes. To make an igloo we would flatten an area 3 to 4 feet across then bend over the rushes around the edge to meet in the middle and tie them together forming a dome type roof. Similarly tunnels would be created by bending over and tying together the rushes each side of a passage.

A few years later the rushes were removed and the field ploughed, the resulting soil was very fine and became a haven for nesting Lapwing (Plovers). When walking across the field you had to watch every step you took as the Lapwings nests were just scooped out dips in the ground, and the eggs being brown & black, were well camouflaged. # Village Hall Extension and Refurbishment

Work on the project is progressing well and is on schedule.

#### Drains

A video survey revealed that the roots of the oak tree at the front of the hall had penetrated the drains. The roots have been cleared and the drains re-lined, the work has been approved by Ashford Building Control.

#### Structural work

The new flat roof above the toilets and kitchen is under construction. Due to the general delays to building products currently being experienced, there has been a slight delay in the supply of building materials which has held back the construction of the new 'small hall'. However, this has not affected the overall programme, elements of which have progressed better than planned. Martello are expecting to make up for lost time in the coming weeks.

#### Exterior

The pebble dash is being removed and any repairs required to the brickwork will be completed before a new render is applied to the surface.

#### Next steps

The final kitchen and toilet layouts have been given to the Hall Trustees for approval. Once approved, orders will be placed for the units and fittings.

Textiles should go to specific banks either at community/retail/or Household Waste Centres.

# KEEP BRITAIN TIDY

#### **Appledore Litter-Pick Week**

As part of the annual nationwide Keep Britain Tidy 'Spring Clean' initiative, we are pleased to say that 20 people went out litter-picking over the week starting 28<sup>th</sup> May. The target of 1 million miles of litter-picking was exceeded with over 1.16 million miles being covered.

In and around Appledore over 40 hours of litter-picking time was donated! Litterpicking sticks, high-vis vests and collection bags were on offer to volunteers who did not have their own kit.

The hope is that litter-picking will start to be an activity that more Appledore residents will join in with on a more regular basis. Perhaps you might 'adopt' an area, perhaps near your home or a place you often spot litter, for more regular litter-picking. The message of this initiative is 'Love Where You Live' and more regular litter-picking will help the environment, leaving a cleaner space for us and all wildlife to enjoy.

At this point we would like to hail our own local litter heroes battling against the effects of 'lazy chuckers' – Tom does a marvellous job regularly on behalf of Appledore Parish Council, and we also know of Terry, Alan and Paula who regularly cover certain areas collecting litter in their own time. We would love for them to be joined by more volunteers.

It is hoped that another litter-picking week should take place this Autumn when some of the vegetation will have reduced. Then, fingers crossed, next Spring 2022 we plan to be able to hold a one-day event with refreshments, a central collection point and perhaps the odd competition, such as who collected the most litter by weight!

As with all activities that take place on public land and highways, there are health and safety issues, among others, to consider.

#### Hannah Murphy Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award Volunteer, Litter-Picking in Appledore

As part of my Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award, I have to do some volunteering. My plan had been to help the coaches with the younger squads at my swimming club where I regularly train. The COVID pandemic meant that I was unable to do this. After receiving an email in January about changing activities due to lockdown restrictions, I decided to change my volunteering to litter-picking. I made the decision that I wanted to help improve the look of the environment for those in my local community and my parents approached the parish council to see if they would be happy for me to do this.

After collecting with our litter-pickers in early February, I have been walking around the footpaths, streets and surrounding roads of our village at the weekends or through half-term holidays with either my Mum or Dad.

We tried to recycle as much of the rubbish as we could.

I've enjoyed being out in the fresh air and it's also a great way of doing some exercise too. I can't understand why anyone would not take their rubbish home with them. Looking at the rubbish I collected, it's clear that it is not just young people doing this. I don't like seeing litter in our village and on the footpaths in our surrounding countryside. It spoils the look of where we live. I have hoped that by being seen out there picking up other people's rubbish that it gets the message across that we shouldn't litter and that we should all take pride in the area where we live. #### LIFE WITH BRODIE - AN EVENTFUL TIME

After a while he said it was all OK, "Good job you've got that alarm" and I barked to remind him that it was me that saved the day.

Well, that should have been quite enough excitement for a while but no. I was playing in the garden and found a plastic lid. Good for a nice chew I thought, and nothing was said so I carried on chewing and licking. I think I swallowed a bit because the next day I was sick. That meant a visit to the vet. 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#### A bit of local history!

I came across a touching snippet of local family history the other day. In the box that Suzanne Elphick passed on to Maureen when she handed over the role of editor of the parish magazine was an old notebook. The front page was signed 'A. M. M. Gurr, Barton Farm, Bethersden, Kent'. Most of the book consists of recipes for such delights as Effervescing Lemonade, Belgian War Cake and Invalid Beef Pudding, but there are also handy household tips on such matters as filling old nail holes in wood, making cough mixtures and even cleaning black suits or dresses ('Procure some ivy leaves and put them into a saucepan.....'). I understand some of the recipes have already been reproduced by Suzanne in earlier editions of the magazine. All the entries appear to have been copied as each one begins and ends with quotation marks. There is no date in this part of the notebook but there is a loose cutting from a newspaper stuck between the pages, though it is not possible to say for sure whether the cutting dates from the same time as the notebook. On one side the cutting contains recipes for Parsnip Wine and Dandelion Beer, while on the other side you can read parts of a speech under the heading 'Special to "The People", by Sir PH....', which I have managed to trace. The speech was given by Sir Philip Pilditch, MP for Spelthorne in Middlesex, and was published in 1922.

Thanks to family history websites, I have been able to trace the background of the copier of the recipes. Her full name was Alice Maud Mary Gurr, born in Snargate in 1871. Her mother, Harriet Howland, died in 1875 and in 1880 her father, William Gurr, a farm labourer, remarried with a woman from Stone, Fanny Louisa Baker. Alice is registered in the 1881 and 1891 censuses as living with an uncle and aunt, Richard and Ellen Stone, at Westwell near Ashford, while her elder siblings and younger half-siblings stayed with her father and his new wife at their home, Willow Cottage, in Snargate. In 1901 Alice worked as a domestic servant to Robert and Florence Cheeseman at their house in Folkestone, at 10 East Cliff Gardens. By 1911 Alice had moved to Bethersden where she was employed as a housekeeper to 82-year-old George Steel Brown, described as a 'grazier' and resident at Great Barton Farm, the address given by Alice on the front page of the notebook. Mr Brown died in 1920 and there is no further trace of Alice until the 1939 England and Wales pre-war register in which she is listed as housekeeper and companion to a Mrs Susan Goldsmith at 51 Golden Square in Tenterden.

Alice had 4 brother and sisters from her father's first marriage and a further 9 half-siblings through his second. Alice's half-sister, Louise Neve Gurr, married Alfred James Jemison, the landlord of the Red Lion in Snargate. Louise and Alfred's son, Alfred William Jemison, and his wife Doris went on to run the pub for many years, Doris right up until her death in 2016.

Alice died in early 1945 in Ashford. The notebook of recipes appears to have ended up in the possession of her youngest half-sister Annie and then, through her, came into the hands of close family friends, the Knights. The book will now be returned to Brian Knight, the Chair of Appledore's Local History Society. Brian too has a place in the book. As a boy he used the blank pages at the end to record the number of cars passing by Hawthorn on Sunday nights in the spring and summer of 1959, counting up to 1,000 in the space of 2 hours, 44 minutes and 30 seconds on the evening of 31<sup>st</sup> May 1959. And we complain about traffic through Appledore today!



# The 100 Club

Promoter- Local resident 30 years - Jim Kelly Committee of 5 nominated people inc. 1 treasurer

Aim: To financially assist leisure activities & other good causes within the village of Appledore.

Estimated breakdown of the 100/ £3 per week members 10% Local Business 30% Football x3 (juniors/parents) Men's Sunday & Seniors team 30% Local Clubs & organisations 30% Appledore residents.

Weekly prize of  $\pounds 100/\pounds 50/\pounds 25$ , leaving  $\pounds 125$  per week in kitty In theory approx.  $\pounds 6,000$  per year available for local funding.

Draw to be made in advance every month covering 4 weekly draws Results announced/made public weekly from Black Lion or Village Hall monthly draws. Participants will pay £12 per month by standing order.

A projected start date would be around Christmas this year 2021.

## In Memoriam

It is with great sadness that I must announce the death, on May 20<sup>th</sup>, of Ann Massingham.

Ann was born in Worthing, daughter of Ken Morley, Editor of the Worthing Gazette, and his wife Ena. She had an elder brother, Christopher, an elder sister, Jane, and, some time after, a younger brother, Robert.

On holiday in Ireland as a teenager, Ann did get to kiss the Blarney Stone, which might explain a few things.

Ann worked in London as a receptionist for a security firm, also for the Havana Cigar promotion company and then took classified ads for the London Evening News.

In 1979, she met Adam Massingham at the last night party of "Joseph and his Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat" at the Connaught Theatre, Worthing, where he had played 7th brother and bass guitar. We have been together ever since.

We lived in Wood Green, north London, until 1984, when we got married and moved to Fordcombe near Tunbridge Wells. There Ann started to keep a few geese, ducks, and chickens. We also had half a dozen sheep and a family of goats. In 1995 Ann adopted a tiny new-born lamb which was 1 pound 4 ounces at birth.

In the summer of 1995 we moved to Mill Farm, Appledore Heath. There Ann built up a flock of 200 plus geese, with assorted ducks, chickens, turkeys, guinea fowl and quail, from which she would sell the eggs.

Ann joined the grape-picking team at Gusborne at the start of their production, and also started as an online shopper for Sainsbury's at Bybrook, Ashford.

In 2018 Ann was successfully treated for the first of a series of cancers. At the end of April 2021, cancer treatment was changed to palliative care when she was told that she had, at best, 6 months, but should have at least a month. We had just over a week at home together, then a week in Kent and Canterbury Hospital, after which Ann was moved to the Pilgrim's Hospice in Ashford where she died six days later.

Greatly loved and missed.

#### Thoughts from Dippy Dora


#### Old Walls
