What on Earth is an Assistant Curate?!

In July we will be delighted to welcome Reverend Andrew Tapsell to our benefice as our new Assistant Curate. He will then be with us, working across our group of nine churches for a period of up to three years. This is truly wonderful news - however, please don't be surprised when we bid him farewell in 2025!

Having just completed my time here as an Assistant Curate, I am very aware that there is some confusion as to the role, so this little article is designed to give some clarity.

To begin with, in this context, the role is a *training post*. Currently Andrew is known as an 'ordinand', that is, someone in training for ordination. On the weekend of July 2nd / 3rd, he will be ordained in Canterbury Cathedral. Ordination is the service in which holy orders are conferred onto somebody who has been selected and trained for the role. At this point, Andrew will be ordained as a *deacon*, but the training he started in theological college, now continues in the parish. Assistant curate is a little bit like an apprenticeship – only now he will be learning 'on the job'.

The role of deacon.

All clergy are at their root a deacon. Once ordained as deacon Andrew will be known as *The Reverend Andrew Tapsell*. A deacon is a publicly acknowledged figure who is given authority to represent Christ and his Church in a particular way. The ministry of a deacon is to be a servant, both within the Church and in the community. Deacons have a particular role during worship, especially at the Eucharist, where they perform certain liturgical tasks, e.g. reading the Gospel and dismissing the congregation at the end of the service. Andrew will spend much of this initial year shadowing members of the ministry team and beginning to find out about life in a parish. He will also start to build his own ministry, gradually learning to take funerals and home communions and engaging with pastoral visits. He may wish to start new things that fit into our setting. His training will also continue on an academic level, led by the diocese.

In worship, as a deacon, Andrew will wear robes as all clergy do, however, his role will be reflected in the way he wears his stole - across his body. (See image)

Ordination number 2 – as a priest


At the end of this first year, he will be ordained again

– this time, as a priest. The stole will then be worn across both shoulders and Andrew will for the first time be able to celebrate Holy Communion and give blessings and absolution. He will, however, never stop being a deacon. All priests continue in the role of a servant to the church and the community. During this second year and on into the third, Andrew will continue training and developing .

His ministry in preparation for leaving curacy and taking up a role in his own parish – or indeed a chaplaincy or other ministerial role.

Why here and what is the role of our churches?

Whilst Andrew is here, Lindsay and I will take responsibility for his training and are known as 'Training incumbent' or 'TI' for short. With a wealth of ministerial experience, Lindsay is well placed to train the future ministers of the Church, and this is recognised in the diocese. This benefice though also provides opportunity for a variety of



the experiences required in laying a good foundation for a future parish priest. Due to the way we operate here, I am to share the role – which is actually fairly unique! We will meet regularly for prayer and reflection in a two-way 'supervision' process. This will ensure that Andrew is given the confidence and skills needed for the role, but also has space to spread his wings and develop his own ministry – from which we will all benefit. We are very clear that Andrew is NOT 'an extra pair of hands,' but a newly ordained minister learning about what God has called him to do and how this looks in parish life.

We are very fortunate to have an assistant curate – there are only a handful who are ordained each year and the diocese put a lot of time, prayer and money into trying to ensure the placement is appropriate. We are confident that he will receive a warm welcome and have a great place to learn all about ministry. I know I did – and am very grateful for that.

I will just add that being licensed as Team Vicar in the place where a curacy took place is somewhat unusual. A very specific set of circumstances enabled me to apply for and be interviewed for the post here after my curacy and I am delighted that I was offered the post...we are highly unlikely to see that happen again!



Councillor Vacancies

The notice period for residents to call for a bye election has passed and the borough council has advised that new councillors may be co-opted at the next parish council meeting on the 6th June. We are grateful to several residents for coming forward and offering to stand.

Parish Meeting Thursday 19th May in the Village Hall

There were around 35 people who attended the parish meeting. Appledore has a significant number of local groups and societies who would all happily welcome new members. There is a wonderful breadth of activities available through them as well as a number providing important community benefit. All clubs and for many their finances too, were affected by Covid closing down meetings and gatherings however they have restarted with renewed vigour.

The new vicar Jeanette Kennett was welcomed and we heard about the structure in place to allow for her and a large team to fully support 9 churches including Appledore. They will looking at how to reach out to families. The annual meeting of St. Peter and St. Paul is the 29th May after the morning service at 11am. All parishioners have a right to take part in electing the Church Wardens at that meeting. Frances Smith thanked residents for their support of the produce in the porch sales which help fund upkeep.

The Art Club has now been running for 7 years and has displays at the Flower Festival and in the hall through the year. They also visit galleries and enjoy painting on locations but no matter what they always finish with tea and cake! We also heard an interesting report on the refurbishment of the station from Friends of Appledore Station. Network Rail Heritage Fund funded the restoration of the facility and it is hoped that a business will rent it. Various maintenance items have also been rectified. All this making the station's appearance much better. The new editor for the magazine Dr. Ruth Smith praised the print team, the collation team and delivery team. The magazine is a fantastic way to record the goings on in

team and delivery team. The magazine is a fantastic way to record the goings on in Appledore, so Ruth asked everyone to continue sending in their articles by the 20th of the month however, Ruth mentioned that the editor had final say on everything. Unfortunately, Ruth also advised that as no one had come forward this year to help, that there would be no village show. Following its absence this year, it is hoped that next year will be different.

The hall committee bookings manager Marilyn Ray is already taking bookings for next year. The hall is now being booked for weddings parties and wakes. A list of all activities in the hall is published in the magazine. As well as the regular excellent classes (Pilates, aerobics and yoga), the hall will again be running the film club, quizzes and dances plus Xmas lunch for the plus 60s. Bear with them, as they learn the ropes for the hall again after almost two years downtime. Pop in for a coffee on Wednesday mornings.

Heather Parker the new chairman for The Garden Society (previously The Gardening Society), thanked Paul Ripley for his three-year stint as Chairman. The group changed its name to reflect its interest in the garden and not just gardening alone. During the winter they enjoy speakers whilst in the summer, in addition to

their regular meeting they visit gardens: having recently popped into Hole Park to see the Bluebells. With the interest in gardens reinvigorated following Covid, they would welcome new members to add to their current membership of 36. It is only £10 a year. Their popular annual plant sale will be at the Jubilee celebrations on the recreation ground on the 2nd of June.

Covid has made us all appreciate the wonderful countryside around us. Whilst Kent Public Rights of Way appear to not have the money nor desire to keep the parishes footpaths in a usable condition, an informal group of residents have come together to improve them for the benefit of all. They have surveyed the 33 paths that lead through, come into or lead out of the parish, logging their condition and any clearance work and repairs needed. Tracy Morgan reported that they had achieved light vegetation clearance to reveal signs and stiles. Some trees and fallen branches had also been cleared away from paths. Posts have been installed with way markers to help walkers find their way and fly tipping has been reported. The list of repairs continues to grow as stiles and gates deteriorate over time. They have achieved a considerable amount in a short time. Anyone is welcome to join them.

The History Society focus is to provide over time an archive of information recording life in Appledore past and present. Residents were requested to consider sharing items and photos with the society. Terry Blaney explained that they are currently working on a leaflet about Appledore Heath and are planning further open days this year as these have been quite popular, plus a fun quiz is scheduled for October. Their website is regularly updated, currently with a new slide show and they received many requests for information about properties and families. Their meetings are sociable and very informal focusing on what history reveals. Everyone is welcome.

The penultimate report was a review of the events planned to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee. Gary Kinsley thanked everyone for their help and hoped everyone will enjoy the day. A group would be filming the event for the benefit of others in the future.

Finally, we heard from Simon Honnor about his and other residents efforts to prevent the planning application for a 6th house on the Court Development Site on Court Lodge going through. A petition signed by 75 residents was submitted when public consultation first opened. Simon also submitted a complaint regarding the developer having already put in a driveway from the unapproved house. Planning enforcement officers had written to advise that they will be investigating.

Lastly but not least, can I thank Helen Hennig for organising refreshments. Helen has received some lovely geraniums (or pelagoniums for those in the know).




I for one always wished that I had talked to my parents and to my grandparents about what their lives were like when they were children, what they ate, how they dressed, the ways they celebrated Christmases and birthdays, what schools were like, how they entertained themselves - in short, how they grew up, how they were brought up. Then there were their experiences of major events of the twentieth century, if not the nineteenth of work, of marriage, and of bringing up their own children.

As soon as my first grandchild was born (14 years ago), I determined to write my own story for him and for the others born subsequently; I also 'ghosted' and then had published my mother-in-law's autobiography *Grey Clouds and Silver Linings*. More recently, I have been leading two writing classes at the University of the Third Age (U3A) in London: "Writing Your Life Story' and 'Writers' Workshop', with everyone involved being very encouraging and helpful to each other.

None of my family ever suffered deprivation, misfortune, or hardship of any kind and even though they may make for an interesting narrative, it is not necessary for a story that will fascinate your children and grandchildren. Life stories provide the younger ones of today with family background, with historical context and social interest; they can also supply some of the whys and wherefores of family life as well as the many differences and similarities over the years. At this modest level they are not necessarily best-sellers or commercial prospects in any way. But neither are they just the domain of professional writers and you can have great fun researching and putting together something that is essentially *you*.

Overgrown Hedges and Trees over the Footpath and Road

June 2022

Dear Resident,

Every year throughout the spring and summer KCC Highways & Transportation receive numerous complaints regarding trees, hedges and other vegetation, which overhang the highway from private property. This matter can pose a number of problems for people trying to use the footways, especially if they are trying to pass with buggies, wheelchairs and scooters. It would be greatly appreciated if you could ensure that any trees and hedges that are bordering the Highway are maintained and cut back to your boundary which would greatly benefit all Highway users. This will help us all keep the highway safe and prevent the need for KCC Highways & Transportation writing to you requesting that you cut back your vegetation.

So that you are aware of our requirements, please refer to the text below.

If the boundary of your property borders the footway, then please be aware that:

- The full width of the footway/pavement must be available for use by pedestrians.
- As well, there must be a minimum height clearance over the footway/ pavement of 2.1 metres/7 feet for any vegetation.

If the boundary of your property borders the carriageway, then please be aware that:

- If you have vegetation that overhangs into the road, there must be a minimum height clearance of 5 metres/16 feet to accommodate buses and HGVs that may use the road.
- If your property is rural, then vegetation should be 0.45 metres/1.5 feet behind the edge of the road and all signs need to be kept clear of foliage.

Also, we would ask that you pay special attention to your trees, hedges and vegetation if your property is on or near a junction, and/or inside the bend of the road, to maintain maximum visibility for road users.

A football tournament to raise money for both junior & veteran clubs is being planned for August 27th & 28th, at the Recreation Ground.


The Saturday & Sunday tournament will cover most age groups and promises to attract many visitors, to the village for the Bank Holiday weekend.
