The Appledore Gardeners' Society has particularly been hit hard over the course of the last year, and Ian is yet another who will be so sorely missed. WW2 SPITFIRE PILOT SHARED HIS WARTIME EXPERIENCES FOR RAF CENTENARY

On 1st April 2018 the RAF will celebrate 100 years since its formation.

The Royal Star & Garter Homes, a charity that provides specialist care for veterans and their partners who live with disability or dementia, has been privileged to care for many RAF veterans in its 102-year history.

One such resident is Second World War Spitfire pilot Phillip Johnson. To commemorate the RAF centenary, here we share his incredible story.

Phillip joined the RAF on his 18th birthday and underwent the demanding Spitfire pilot training in the UK, Africa and Egypt. Once his training was complete Phillip was flown to Malta and joined 185 Squadron.

In 1944, 185 Squadron moved to Italy, and operated as a fighter-bomber unit supporting the Allied advance up the length of Italy. Phillip explains, "*The Army would tell us where German Tanks were holding them up. Our job was to destroy the German Army as best we could so the British Army could move on. It was critical work.*"

Phillip remembers one occasion when his plane was struck by enemy fire. "There was a lot of flak coming from the ground. We swooped in, attacked the tanks and made towards the sea. When I landed, I noticed there was a great big hole in the rear of my plane. It would have been a very different story if it had hit me, or the fuel tank."

In early 1945, Phillip was posted back to the UK and joined 174 Squadron whose objective was to help with the air offensive over Germany. The aircraft flown by 174 Squadron was the Hawker Typhoon, meaning Phillip had to re-train.

Typhoon engines were noted for being 'temperamental' – something Phillip experienced. "On one flight, the engine cut out. I had to find a landing place pretty quickly. I glided down to land in a large field. I got it down alright but broke the aircraft's back. It caught fire and I got out quickly!". When Phillip returned back to the Station, the Squadron Leader ordered him to be back up flying again in two hours' time. Phillip explains, "That was deliberate. It didn't give me time to think about what went wrong."

Not only did the RAF provide Phillip with adventure and camaraderie, it was where he met his future wife, Doreen, who was a mechanic in the WAAF. *"As soon as I saw her I knew straight away she was the girl for me."* Phillip and Doreen shared a happy 66 years of marriage together.

Phillip went to the Royal Star & Garter Homes in June 2017 shortly before his 94th birthday, after he finally began finding it difficult living on his own at the family home. In November, during the Remembrance Day Commemorative Service held at the Home, Phillip wore his medals for the first time in his life. The Charity's emphasis on being part of a military family helps many veterans to reconnect with their military past, and comrades that were so important to them during their service.

When reflecting on his time in the RAF, Phillip remains very modest about his actions.

"It was just part of the career. It's what we had to do, so we just did it".

Yesterday I received some very sad news that Ian Bampton had passed away on Friday 12th February after a prolonged illness. His son asked me to inform those in Appledore as he knew that Ian had devoted a significant part of his life here with his wife, Julia, and they had very much enjoyed their time in the Parish.

I counted Ian as my friend and colleague as we spent many hours together at each other's homes and also when he served as an enthusiastic Honorary Secretary and more recently as a Trustee of the Appledore Recreation Ground Management Committee. He also helped and contributed to many projects in the village using his in-depth knowledge he had gained as a highly qualified architect. But what I shall personally remember Ian for most is being a character and a gentleman who was liked by everyone.

He and Julia recently moved to Thanet to be near to their daughter but lan's recent illness prevented this from coming to full fruition.

On behalf of those in the village that knew Ian I offer my condolences to Julia and family.

After my explanation in the parish magazine last year about the bells being 7 silenced owing to the Covid restrictions I am still being asked when will be able to ring again. All I can say to that is I don't know. 7

I did, in the last piece I wrote, say I would hope to do something for the Ar-T mistice service and Christmas ringing. Well as you all know that was a no b go owing to the rise in cases of the virus and the church being closed for services. I, like you, would have loved to have heard the bells being rung for both those occasions, muffled for sadness and respect for those who ${oldsymbol Q}$ gave so much during the wars, and rung 'open' for the joys of Christmas. Sadly, as you know, Christmas was rather different this year, but now the Infection rates are beginning to fall and there are vaccinations for the more rulnerable, hopefully there is a light at the end of what has been a very long tunnel. I am not going to make any predictions as to when we will be able to get back to ringing but would hope now it is not too far away.

I must say that I was asked to toll a bell for a funeral in a nearby church I last autumn. After a day or two I had found muscles that I have never found before from ringing, so from my point of view I would like to get back to it as soon as possible and Ifree up some of the unused muscles that bell-ringing finds.

A Warning of phone scams going the rounds from Derek Winter

1) Amazon Prime - some of those who use the service initially receive a recorded phone call saying their monthly payment has been increased in error from £7.99 to £799 etc (varies). Usually it seems a second almost immediate follow-up call (sounds like a bustling call centre) is made requesting you download an app from the app store to enable a refund to be made BUT IT IS SO THEY CAN TAKE CONTROL OF YOUR COMPUTER. But obviously you don't know this until it's too late! These people are persistent and keep calling. Amazon will never ring you only email.

2) BT or other server - A recorded phone call is received saying your router is dodgy and to contact the caller (a bit more to it but reported slight different modus from two people). I have however known BT to call in the past.

3) A call from the Inland Revenue telling the recipient that they are about to be arrested in 20 minutes for failure to pay the correct tax and will be taken away in handcuffs unless it's paid immediately, again modus differs slightly from different people approached.



<u>Census March 2021</u> (will provide a snapshot of modern society)

Households across Ashford Borough Council will soon be asked to take part in Census 2021.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

It will be the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code, allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed," lain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said.

"This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

Census day will be on March 21, but households across the country will receive letters with online codes allowing them to take part from early March.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.




