Welcome to the March issue of the Parish magazine.

Every month, I wonder, what will I write about. Sometimes, the topic is staring me in the face, but other months, I have to let the grey matter meditate a little longer.

This month, my brain kept coming back to - destruction! Deliberate or accidental.

We have all seen graphic pictures on the TV of the destructive powers of earthquakes. 47,000 presumed dead and 1 million homeless in Syria and Turkey. It will take years and cost billions of any currency to rebuild and replace the losses, and no amount of counselling will cure the scarred minds of the people. Just imagine what being buried for several days must be like. Would you ever be truly sane again? This destruction is accidental and cannot be totally prevented.

On a similar scale of devastation we have the first anniversary of the start of the Ukraine war. Approximately 40000 civilian deaths and 200,000 military deaths with 10 million made homeless. This is deliberate man made destruction. Again the reconstruction of Ukraine will take years, cost billions and again there will be long lasting mental damage.

And what has that got to do with Appledore? During January, the Recreation Ground laid an expensive child-friendly surface under the swings. They put the swings out of action and surrounded everything with red and white tape. A few days later, the tape was broken, one swing was down and irreparable damage had been done to the surface. This will need to be replaced at the cost of £4000!

The culprits are known but not yet named. Someone has to pay for the damage.

This was destruction, but was it deliberate or accidental? No child who does not understand what red and white tape means, or that putting the swings out of action must have a reason, is mature enough to go to the playground on their own.. That first step onto the surface may be called accidental, but seeing the result of that step should have stopped this child going further. The next steps were deliberate and were vandalism. Yes the temptation would have been great to continue. I wrote in the wet cement when my conservatory floor was laid. But it was MY floor to destroy. Lowering the swing was also wrong.

Nobody is coming forward to admit their guilt. Maybe the parents are unaware of the furore on social media and in the paper, maybe they cannot afford to pay for the repairs, maybe, they simply don't care.

Parents of this child—take responsibility before the police become involved.

Letter from the Church

I have just returned from a ten-day trip to Alicante. Our plan to fly to Alicante and then drive into the mountains was thwarted by the 'cold snap' that Europe experienced in February. We ended up visiting various Cathedrals, art galleries, museums, bars and restaurants.

In Valencia cathedral I was passing through a rather nondescript chapel on my way to the exit. There were some people praying here; the chapel housed what is claimed to be the Holy Grail – the cup that Jesus used at the Passover Supper on the night of his arrest.

A quick Googling tells us there are between 38 and 116 suggested 'cups' which may, or may not be, the Holy Grail. The Valencian cup does seem to be top of the list when it comes to provenance. One story is that it was taken by St Peter to Rome and then taken by a Vatican soldier to Spain in the third century. It takes pride of place on the altar - well-lit, a dark cup with ornate gold handles and a base laden with precious jewels – not the sort of cup, surely, used by Jesus of Nazareth with his fishermen friends.

Unmoved, and imagining how many poor worshippers had been asked to contribute towards its beautification, I was about to leave the chapel, when I found an information card for visitors. The ornamentation was added later as it came to be revered; the actual cup is made of agate though very simple in design. Even so, an agate cup seemed an unlikely contender for a modest Passover Supper with the Servant King - but I then read that many 1st century Jewish families would have possessed a very special, often ornate, cup which was only used for Passover. This would be handed down through the generations. I had never thought that Jesus might have used anything other than a plain pottery goblet, or maybe a wooden beaker, given Joseph's woodworking skills.

What sets this Holy Grail apart from the others, for me, is that no-one has ever claimed that it is anything other than the cup Jesus used at that Last Supper. It looks fit for a King and, as I gazed at the chalice, I recalled Pilate's question to Jesus "What is Truth?".

It is unlikely that we shall ever know the truth about the Valencian Holy Grail. It's a good story and it may be true; who knows? But is it something to build our faith upon? We build our faith upon the one who gathered his friends around him, drank from a common cup with them, and the next day died for them, and for us all. Let us use these weeks of Lent to think about truth in our lives, in our

relationships, in our work, and in our faith, remembering the words of the centurion at the foot of the cross

"Truly this man was God's Son".

Voting in the May Elections and Voter Authority Certificate (Free Voter Identification)_

On the opposite page, you will be able to find a list of deadline dates regarding the 4th May Elections. These dates are all in April.

The national campaign has probably already alerted you to the fact that if you are voting in person at the booth, you will need identification. There will be a long list of identification that can be used, on the back of the voting cards, being delivered to all those registered to vote.

You can see the full list of accepted identification at the Electoral Commission Website <u>https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/voter-id/accepted-forms-photo-id</u>

If you do not have any of these or no longer look like the photo, you can get, FOR FREE, a Voter Authority Certificate which lasts for 3 years. You will need a recent digital photo and your national insurance number to apply online <u>https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate</u>. The service is already running and in use by people getting ahead. You can also obtain the paper form from Ashford Borough Council if you are unable to run off a copy from the government website

Calling Second Home Owners in Appledore

Did you know that as a home owner in the parish you are entitled to vote in the Parish Council Elections. If you had 3 different homes in three different parishes you would be entitled to vote in each parish. Surprisingly, you can register to vote in all elections in multiple locations. Though, as in all elections you are only permitted to vote once. So don't forget to register to vote.

If you do register to vote in the parish election you also allow the parish council to spend a greater sum on local groups. There is a general restricted law for parish benefit that permits a parish council to spend, on local groups, an amount for the year, based on the number of registered electors for the parish. Help the parish council to keep Appledore Local Groups going by registering to vote in parish elections.





Was there a spy among us?

In fact, yes, from the late 1960's until about 1980, we had two retired spies living next door to each other in Appledore!

Charles de Salis (1911-2007) lived in Church House from at least 1966 until 1980, when he and his wife moved to Rye, and Kenneth Benton (1909-1999) lived in Vine House from 1968 into the 1980's until he moved to Chichester.

This was not by some strange coincidence, however, as their career paths in MI6 were definitely linked. Both men did the same sort of job in Portugal and Spain, both were in Rio de Janeiro at the end of their careers and both reported to Kim Philby, the British spy chief and double-agent who defected to the Soviet Union in the period of the Cold War.

Philby had previously arranged the defections of Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean when they came under suspicion. All three were part of the 'Cambridge Spy Ring'. Both de Salis and Benton were also scholars, but had not been at Cambridge, like Kim Philby and the other double-agents.

Let's not forget the wives of these interesting men! Mr de Salis married Katherine Gange in 1946. She had been Kim Philby's secretary. Benton married Peggy Lambert whom he met in Vienna. She worked in the British Legation and when they returned to England in 1940, they were both recruited to work for Section V, the counter-espionage section of MI6, which handled the Double Cross system.

After life in MI6 de Salis taught at Ashford Grammar school and then taught foreign language conversation classes in Rye. Kenneth Benton is a name to add to our rather long list of authors who live/lived in Appledore. Benton became a successful thriller writer and Chairman of the Crime Writers' Association. His books included 'Single Monstrous Act', 'The Red Hen Conspiracy' and 'The Ward of Caesar'.

What interesting conversations they must have had while they were neighbours!

ARE YOU STRANDED? CAN YOU HELP?


In 2019 Kent County Council launched a 12 month pilot scheme in six areas to provide bus services to the remotest areas. Appledore saw the arrival of the Tenterden Hopper. This gave residents access to Tenterden on Mondays to Fridays to the benefit of the community as a whole. The pandemic and



community as a whole. The pandemic and subsequent lock-downs, lack of use etc., together with the current funding crisis, may all have played a large part in KCC now cancelling this service as of 12th February 2023.

Before the pandemic we had the Appledore Good Neighbours Service. Ran by volunteers, it offered free/cheap transport to the surgery, hospital, shops etc for housebound villagers. Unfortunately it never restarted and our car-less residents have struggled. Now the Hopper is out, they are stranded.

Is anyone out there willing to resurrect this service? Besides the volunteers running it, there were quite a few volunteer drivers. Passengers were taken free or for a small donation towards the driver's expenses. It was often possible to take several people together to the same destination and again you could take someone when you go into Ashford or Tenterden to do your weekly shop.


