From the Vicarage by permission of The Rev'd Canon Lindsay Hammond

Rumour has it – Or not!

'Rumour,' wrote Terry Pratchett, 'is information distilled so finely that it can filter through anything. It does not need doors and windows - sometimes it does not need people. It can exist free and wild, running from ear to ear without ever touching lips.'

We even find rumour - can you believe it - flowing through the life of our churches! Of course, rumour flourishes where information falters and so here is some information about the future of our churches which we hope will help to stifle rumour!

First, some of our ministers are leaving and some are staying. Judy Darkins, who looked after Wittersham and Ebony, has retired. Tricia Fogden, Vicar of Appledore and Stone, will be retiring in October. Chris Hodgkins, who looks after Rolvenden and Newenden, will be moving to a new post in New Romney at the beginning of October. That leaves Lindsay and Jeanette, and a wonderful band of retired ordained ministers, readers, and worship leaders. Altogether, there are around a dozen or so of us!

Second, Jeanette's training comes to an end in the summer of next year, following which she will move to a new post.

Third, we will appoint a second full-time ordained minister to work with Lindsay. Hopefully we can do that in the very near future.

Fourth, we are discussing with the diocese the possibility of providing a training opportunity to a newly ordained minister, perhaps from next summer, for a period of three years. We wait and see.

And fifth, none of the nine parishes is without a 'vicar'. Lindsay is Team Rector of the nine and Jeanette is assistant curate to the nine. Though they happen to live in Tenterden, they will minister across the group, working with the team as a whole to enable worship and pastoral care to happen. There are two further points to be made here. The first is that Lindsay has been Team Rector to the nine, and Jeanette assistant curate to the nine, for the past few years. The departure of other ministers in the team means that what existed on paper now becomes reality. And second, the diocese has made it clear that, while funding will enable us to have two full time paid ministers, plus a training curate, there is not the money for further paid clergy.

What are the implications for our church communities? It probably means that a very challenging situation will best be met, can only be met, with a response from us all that is enthusiastic, generous, understanding, and supportive, through which we live with a freedom, delight, and a 'can-do' approach. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus says to Simon Peter, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Perhaps this is what it means to put out into the deep, rather than remain in the shallow end of narrow parochialism, concerned only with our own interest rather than that of our neighbour. We can remain in the shallows and thereby seal our fate or seize the moment and venture out (God in Jesus will supply the armbands)! If you have any questions, do get in touch.

"Shut the windows, draw the curtains, keep the rumour out!" wrote L P Hartley. Keep rumour out, by all means, but open the window, and throw those curtains wide and shout a joyful 'hurrah' to the future!

<u>A Letter from the Ministry Team at St Peter & St Paul</u> <u>Church, Appledore</u>

Dear Friends,

October is here again – autumn leaves floating softly, summer is over. In church it is the season of passing and remembering, and we move forward in the sad knowledge that Tricia will conduct her final service at the very beginning of this month.

We are only too aware at this time of year that 'Time and tide wait for no man'. Which brings me to the subject of this month's magazine contribution:

PROVERBS. According to the dictionary, a proverb is 'a short, well-known pithy saying, stating a general truth or piece of advice'. 'A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush', 'a stitch in time saves nine' and, particularly appropriate for those of us feeling cooped up by Pandemic restrictions, and longing to get away from it all, 'a change is as good as a rest'. Useful for someone like me who finds it difficult to know where to start sometimes is 'a journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step'. And some are seriously quirky. What on earth does, 'a nod is as good as a wink to a blind horse' mean? Examples are endless!

But did you know that there is a whole book in the Bible dedicated to Proverbs? You'll find it in the OT. I found myself browsing through the other day and happened upon 'the words of Agur'. Don't ask me who Agur was! Indeed, my Bible commentary just tells us that he was 'an unknown oracle or soothsayer'. He introduces himself as no great shakes as an academic, but muddles through because of his trust in God. And I found myself warming to him as I read on. I like his contentment with just having enough. 'Give me neither poverty, nor riches', he says. I love his insistence that even the small and insignificant creatures of Creation can teach us much: 'Four things on earth are small, yet they are exceedingly wise!' Even the lowly green lizard can influence a king! And I'm moved by his appreciation of a good woman: 'She is far more precious than jewels'.

In times of uncertainty and loss, in times when we really are not sure how things will 'pan out', it's good to feel that we have the wisdom of past generations for reference. Whether from Biblical sayings, or folk wisdom, there is much to give us hope. This autumn 'season of remembering' reminds us that we always need to keep moving on in faith of better things ahead.



Childhood Memories of A Life in Appledore

The following appeared in the Parish Magazine for June 1960: "We learn with interest that some young men of the village are running a successful Social Club – The Ritz – at the Lower Garage. We sincerely wish them every success with this venture and look forward to hearing more news of their activities".

The Lower Garage was at No.1 The Street, and owned by Scotland & Bates. The ground floor was a workshop and service area, whilst the first floor at the front was used as a workshop by Jack Apps, who I believe made coffins.

The rear part of the first floor, and first floor of the rear part of the building (that has recently been demolished), was used as The Ritz. Not only was it a meeting place for the local youngsters, but also attracted those from the surrounding area.

I'm sure many people have interesting memories of The Ritz !! Perhaps the Developers of No.1 The Street would like to permanently name the building as The Ritz ?

Parish Council Update - October 2021

Village Signage Scheme

The scheme will revamp and update the following signs in an holistic way:

the historic sign in front of St. Peter and St. Paul,

two car park signs for behind the Village Hall and directional sign at the front of the Hall

two new car park signs for Court Lodge

A general scheme has been well received by all the local organisations involved and the Council selected a manufacturer at the October meeting. The next stage will be the design layout and proofing.

Highways

You may have noticed two cables running across the road between the Village Hall and the recreation ground. These will have recorded the number and speed of cars over a 7-day period. As there are no current records, the results will provide the basis for future reference.

Heathside Parking

Councillor Kinsley met the Ashford Borough Council housing officer to discuss parking issues there. The officer looked at where more spaces could be created. The Council is waiting to hear back on these ideas.

The consultation by Ashford Borough Council about building 4 affordable onebedroom apartments on the road closed on 20th September.

Council Finances

The annual audit of last year accounts was returned by the external audit with a clean bill of health. The Parish Council, like the Borough and County Council, is preparing the budget for 2022-2023. Kent County Council is already asking residents for their thoughts on increasing their share of next year's council tax: <u>https://letstalk.kent.gov.uk/budget-consultation-2022-23</u>.

BELLRINGING IN APPLEDORE

I thought I had better put you all in the picture, so to speak. There have been quite a few people asking why the bells are ringing on a Friday evening and not on a Sunday morning. I have been Tower Captain at Appledore since 2007 when Fred and Gill Pearson moved back to Derbyshire. In late 2019 one of the stalwart ringers of the tower moved away and then in March 2020 we were forced to close because of Covid and, as you know, there was no ringing at all. I do know of some towers, once church services were resumed, that just rang one or two bells, I should say "tolled" one or two before the service. To me that did not seem right. I felt it sounded more like a funeral service and I like to try and make a more joyful sound.

There are eight bells in Appledore church, and I like to be able to ring five as a minimum for services. Just to make things worse, one of the ringers had an operation and will be out of action for a while. Also, some of our ringers are not happy to ring at the moment because of Covid and I can understand that. Reading the Ringing World, the bellringers' newspaper, there are a lot of ringers nationwide who have that fear. Some are not ringing at all because of lack of ventilation in the tower. However, Appledore does have an opening window.

Now, regarding Fridays the reason you hear the bells is because we have visitors from other towers which swells the numbers. But, even then, there are normally only six ringing. Obviously, they are unable to support us on a Sunday as most church services happen at the same time.

Now as winter approaches, I am thinking of starting learner practices. So if you would like to hear all eight bells ringing out over Appledore, please consider learning. You do not have to be strong and muscular; you do not have to be musical. All you need to be is fit and well. Someone once said if you can ride a bicycle, you can ring a bell. If you have children (aged 13 or over) I would ask that they be accompanied by a parent. Just come along on a Friday at 7.30pm to see what it's all about.

Oh, and by the way, we are all learners of the art of campanology. I learned to ring many moons ago and I am still learning.

BADGER ALERT AND WARNING ALONG THE ROYAL MILITARY CANAL

Recently some residents have reported large holes when walking along the flat area adjacent to the Royal Military Canal east of Appledore towards Kenardington.

This year all vegetation has grown more than usual including grass making the holes hard to see and easy to miss.

The danger and hazard have been reported to the National Trust, the owner of the land. They state that the holes are caused by the large number of badgers which have been around for many years but are a protected species. It is, therefore, not possible to fill in the holes or put markers beside them.

To draw walkers' attention to the badger holes, the National Trust has agreed to install warning notices at the entry points to the pathway along the Royal Military Canal.

Simple instructions for assembling your scarecrow

Once you've assembled the frame, hammer it into the ground. Now you can have some fun creating and stuffing the body!

HALLOWE'EN

"The last night of October, Old Year's Night in the Celtic calendar, a night of witches and fires, was transmuted by the Church into the vigil of All Saints, or Hallowe'en – still celebrated in the North of England with disguises, divination and candlelit turnip-lanterns. Jumping for treacled scones, and ducking for apples". This was written in 1974 but some of these activities may still occur in places.

Dippy's father was a Worcestershire lad, born and bred, who lived for some of his young life at Elmbridge, near Wychbold * - so he was conversant with the locals and their ways. It is thought that he may have composed the following verse:

We are three witches of Wychbold

Our magic and spells are untold

We brew and we mix

The most magical tricks

Of Hodge-Podge, Hish Pish and Umpold.

Dippy tried to research the recipes mentioned, but failed to find Hish Pish or Umpold, but the recipe for Hodge Podge is available, and if requested by sufficient numbers, may be printed in next month's magazine.

*Wychbold is an ancient village near Droitwich, dating from approximately 692 AD.

'Hallowe'en' is taken from the book by Margaret Baker – "Folklore and Customs of Rural England".



Village Hall Extension and Refurbishment

Work on the project is continuing to schedule, the only delay being that previously reported on the window delivery.

Hall interior

The staircase has been built for the loft conversion and a window opening created. Apart from storage cupboards in the new small hall and loft conversion, the interior is largely complete and ready for plastering.

Exterior
