



#### From the Minister's Desk

I've just had an early morning cuppa with Lee who is painting our conservatory; we often put the world to right over a cuppa. This morning we were discussing retirement and I began to dwell on my own two years of retirement, having been a rural parish priest for nearly 10 years. I always knew it was going to be tough. Coming late to ministry, St Thomas' Groombridge was the only parish where I was vicar and we could not have been happier there. As so often happens, I was a complete change from the person they had had before, not least their first female Vicar. John was once presented with a birthday card which read 'to the Best Vicar's Wife ever'. He treasures it still.

Unfortunately, in the week of my retirement there was a sudden resurgence of Covid in the village and so all plans for a parish picnic following my final service were cancelled. We had to quickly make our retirement-project home in East Hill look like a family home as we had family staying that weekend. We began to put up some pictures and photos to make it look like our family home. Unfortunately, I stepped back to ensure John had got the picture hook in centrally and I tripped over a wire and fell backwards, breaking my elbow and wrist. Next day, I took my final service in a sling which earned me my final Brownie points, simply for turning up! I was in a lot of pain and felt relieved that there was no party to go on to. That followed later, in September, when the weather was perfect and the village was in a better state of health.

But then home to what? My arm prevented me from getting stuck in to all the work on the house that was needed and would have pre-occupied me in those first weeks of retirement. No Mary, bringing round her lovely soup? Or Beverley, saying she was off to Morrisons and did I need anything? Or, Roz, offering to push the hoover round. Suddenly, as a former parish priest, we were uprooted from where we lived and worked and had fun and friends, to a new house, new town, new community. It was quite strange and very lonely. It was rather like a bereavement, and I wondered if I had done the right thing.

I have often quoted Sarah James, a former Warden of Readers in Rochester diocese, who said as she retired 'It is time to blossom where I'm planted'. And now I tried to cling on to that notion. Although I felt older and slightly 'on the shelf', the diary full of various hospital and doctor's appointments, I still felt that God could use me. I'm not sure I have yet blossomed(!), but I can certainly sense new blossoms of me happening, and my life is beginning to fill up again with good things: more family time, quite a lot of decorating still to do - which includes learning lime-plastering skills, being part of the ministry team here, gardening, singing. It is important to make the effort to become part of a new community – because it will not come to us; we have to leave our comfort zone to embrace it.

My ministry in Groombridge was a ministry of love. I believe that is our first calling as Christian sisters and brothers – to love one another, as God loves each one of us. It was a two-way love: I tried to love them, even the ones I sometimes found difficult (!), and I received back from them love a hundred-fold. And now, two years on, I'm adjusting to retirement and my new life in Tenterden and the surrounding villages. There's so much going on here!

Maybe I should stop wandering up and down hospital corridors and Tenterden High Street, smiling and saying 'hello' to everyone. I could get away with it when I was wearing a dog-collar, now people probably just think I'm slightly odd. Anyway, 'Cheers' to retirement and the autumn of our lives!

#### 'Minister of the Month' October 2023



I first began to think about Licensed Lay Ministry – or Reader Ministry as it was then called – in the early 2000s. With its purpose defined as 'Preaching, Teaching and Leading Worship', it seemed a good fit for someone who had been a teacher since her early twenties. At the time, beyond training for 'The Bishop's Certificate', I pursued the thought no further. Over the years I explored various other avenues, being generously supported and encouraged by the Clergy with whom I worked. By 2007 I'd arrived back 'at base' and began the three year training towards Licensed Lay Ministry.

If I'd thought that 'ministry' was mainly about teaching, I was to discover differently, for I have *learned* far more than I think I have *taught*! Sometimes that learning has been about the darker side of life, as those with whom I come into contact have talked about sadness and loss, loneliness and personal difficulties. But I have also learned from watching others about the generosity of human nature, dedication and the sheer delight of a life of faith. Part of my job as a Lay Minister is to show that 'Church Life' and 'Life beyond Church' flow seamlessly into one another. And so the conversations that take place when out with my walking group, (for instance), are as much a part of my ministry as those in church. That's important to me!

One of the greatest inspirations to my faith has been in the natural world, and I know that so many others can identify with this. I have very many happy memories of walking in wild and lonely landscapes with husband Clive, and (now grown up) son, David. As the years pass, we aren't able to be quite so adventurous, but I've managed to 'plug the gap' through discovering a delight in photography, drawing and painting. And if I should still be 'at a loose end', I only have to look out of the window, to see the beckoning finger of a garden full of *jobs to be done!* 

Being a Lay Minister has been a gift. It has changed me as a person. I hope that I've been able to give something back, too ... but I guess only God knows the answer to that!

#### **New Clerk**

#### **Planning Applications**

Recent planning applications in Appledore include a new holiday accommodation with a garden space on the site of the Methodist church and the creation of a staff car park at Scotland and Bates. The Parish Council supported both of these applications. The erection of a new fence at Hornes Place Oast was not supported as it was felt that it would be an intrusion into the local countryside.

#### **Community Funding**

Local community funding is available from Ashford Borough Council via the Parish Council. The available funds include £13405 for sports pitches, £5313 for Natural Green Spaces, £9184 for Play Spaces and £2268 for allotments. Please contact the Clerk for more details.

#### Car Park Charges

At the September parish council meeting there was a discussion about charging for use of the car parks as a way of gaining an income stream. The Council decided not to implement any charges as it was felt that any charges would lead to increased parking on the road and that people attending events at the Village Hall should not have to pay for parking while they are attending events.

#### Water Bills

Over the last few months there have been large increases in water and waste bills for the public toilets. The Council has been liaising with the water and waste companies about the increases in the bills, as both bills have more than doubled. Moving forward, the meter will be monitored more closely now that we know where it is located. If your bills have increased, it may be worth checking your water meter readings regularly.

#### **Allotments**

The Allotment Charity now has 4 active Trustees, Beverley and Duncan Gray, lain Ramsden and Marilyn Ray.

#### **Footpaths**

We have a very active footpath "team", and particular very grateful thanks are due to Jo Weeks, for re-starting, organising and ably leading the monthly village rambles, and to Duncan and Bev Gray for their hard work in repairing bridges and stiles. We are hoping to utilise some available "Green Space" funding for some of these more major projects. #### The Ramblers Walk 15<sup>th</sup> September 2023

So Autumn is here and it's time for our September ramble. This month we want to ramble around Stone as some of our group had remembered a wonderful walk they had done several years ago. We had carried out a recce earlier in the week but it had not gone well and we could not find some of the footpaths we had wanted to! So we sought advice from some Stone locals and then after another recce were good to go!!

This month there were 7 of us and we were very pleased to welcome a new rambler – Sue, who lives in the village and who had enjoyed reading about us in the parish magazine. We decided to drive to the Ferry Inn and start our walk from there as we were a bit worried it was going to be a bit too long otherwise! We walk out the back of the car park following the Reading Sewer and then turn left, crossing over a farm bridge, next to a lovely field of sunflowers. We walk along the concrete road which comes out by Luckhurst Farm. Here we cross the road and pick up the AT93 which goes through an Ash plantation. We meander through a couple of grass fields, followed by a stretch of wood and then pop out on a stile on Catt's Hill. The footpath AT103 is continued over the road along the fence of a very beautiful blue and white house. We now make our way across fields and up to Stone Church. The views are incredible behind the church and you can see for miles over the Romney Marsh. We go inside and have a look round the 15<sup>th</sup> century St. Mary's Church, which is a typical Kentish Church, built of ragstone and featuring a Roman ragstone altar.

We head back out into the hot sunshine and find the footpath which is now the AT109 and runs along the back of the graveyard and then through Huggit's Farm. After a few more fields it brings us out on Top Road. We walk along a short bit of road before turning in on the left onto the AT112 which is the path that leads to Great Prawls Farm which is the main reason for choosing this route. The path opens out into fields and then just the most amazing views are in front of us. We can easily make out the old sea cliffs and imagine the sea lapping round the bottom of the cliff. For many centuries Stone-in-Oxney was a real island surrounded by the sea and this part of the Isle of Oxney was part of the coastline overlooking what is now the Romney Marsh. We are all totally in awe at the beauty of this place as we can see for miles looking out towards Dungeness Power Station, the wind farm, Rye and the sea. After several minutes and with our spirits lifted we continue on our way. The footpath takes a right turn and meanders past several farm buildings that have now been converted into picturesque homes. The path is now the AT112 and follows a farm road eventually coming out on the Wittersham Road close to Wattle Corner. We turn right along the road until we reach the AT102 and then cross a field and drop down into Luckhurst Wood. The path is quite well signed and after a few more fields we reach Lower Road, Stone. Here we can follow the road past Parklands and back to the footpath next to Luckhurst Farm. Then it's just back along the concrete road and soon we can see the coloured umbrellas of the Ferry Inn where we know a nice cold drink is beckoning us!!

This was just the most amazing ramble with the best scenery to date – if you get the chance to walk this one then make sure you do as you will not be disappointed! Next ramble is October  $20^{th}$  – meet at Appledore Recreation Ground at 1.00 pm – all welcome!!



#### **Kenneth Cyril Girkin**

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> November 1929 – 9<sup>th</sup> July 2023. A personal tribute

On Tuesday April 1st, I had the privilege of attending the remembrance service for Kenneth (Ken) Girkin in Appledore parish church.

It was an uplifting and humbling experience. Ken enriched so many lives; as a teacher (for most of his career at Chatham House school, in Ramsgate); as a lover of the outdoors; as a fellow-traveller in the university of life, of whose fountain of knowledge he was the first and keenest to drink, and the first and keenest to impart; as a generous and able sportsman; as a musician with a fine tenor voice (he sang more than once under the baton of Sir Edward Heath, a neighbour in Broadstairs); but above all as a friend without guile or malice, determined to give all he could to others.

He retired to Appledore and he and Valerie made an enormous contribution to the life of the village. Tessa Knight spoke eloquently at the service on behalf of the village. Tessa herself (with the great support of Brian) does so much herself for the village, and has been a source of huge support and comfort to Valerie.

Ken was Appledore's footpath warden for many years, diligently reporting to the Parish council at almost every meeting. He passed the job to me, knowing I was a keen walker, but I fear I fall far short of his high standards. He led the monthly village rambles, and derived great pleasure from seeing the enjoyment of his fellow walkers. I am pleased to say that Jo Weeks and her friends and colleagues are ably carrying on the tradition.

It was through an interest in the weather that I came to know Ken shortly after I moved to Station Villas. We both had a weather station and submitted our recordings to Climatological Observers Link (COL), an organization that collates our data and publishes a monthly bulletin. Ken also produced a summary of his results for the parish magazine, together with fascinating and entertaining elements of topical interest. It pained Ken when he had, for external reasons, to miss a month, which of course he very rarely did.

He and I travelled together, to London for meetings of the Royal Meteorological Society, and to Wetherspoons pub in Tonbridge for regular meetings of a much less august body of fellow amateurs whom I called Anoraks Anonymous. It was on these trips that I was also entertained by stories of his sporting prowess. He played cricket for Suffolk in the Minor Counties league, and subsequently for Broadstairs and Selsted. He umpired for Selsted well into his 80s. He would have been typically generous, and scrupulously fair. He never boasted, but he was justifiably proud of his achievements. As he was of his children and grandchildren. His daughter Sara is a teacher at Benenden School, and son John, a Professor of Biophysics at Durham University, and Director of the Biophysical Sciences Institute at the University.

My thoughts are with them all, and with Valerie, his devoted wife of 66 years, who did so much to make all this possible.

I will miss Ken's knowledge, enthusiasm, irrepressible good humour, and above all his loyal and entertaining friendship.





They sent for Dr. Cock immediately but, by the time he got to the Church, there was nothing left of the coffins and their contents; the action of the air had reduced them to dust. 


#### APPLEDORE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

So, we think nowadays we have 'horrors' to deal with like the rising cost of living, over-development, fly tipping and pot holes, but what about some of the less warm and fuzzy times Appledore has gone through in the past?! Using a few of the images within the lovely tapestry housed in St Peter and St Paul's, and facts from Sir John Winnifrith's 'A History of Appledore', we can see that things have been quite troubling at times. Happy Halloween everyone!

In 1380 probably all of the houses in The Street were burned to the ground by the French who were raiding the south coast as England's sea power had fallen into decay. The houses would have been built using wattle and daub with thatched roofs, perfect fuel for a fire!





By 1450 there was discontent in the country, including the Appledore area, and there were riots, people charged with treason and after being hung, drawn and quartered, one quarter of a man called Alan Elys of Tenterden was hung on the pillory (a wooden structure with holes for the head and hands) at Appledore!

Leaping ahead a few centuries, Appledore was affected by the threat of invasion by Napoleon, as we were at war with France until Wellington's victory at the battle of Waterloo in 1815. The threat led to the construction of the Royal Military Canal from 1804 to 1807. This was no easy job given the lack of mechanical excavators. 500 labourers and 3 regiments of militia were needed to finish the canal.

There was no invasion but the building of the canal led to the great reduction of 'marsh fever' (malaria), which had plagued the parish over the years and led to a high mortality rate.
