Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

As you read this, around 20 of us will be about to travel to lona for a week's retreat. Iona is a tiny island off the southwest coast of Mull in the Inner Hebrides. It is only 1.5 miles wide by 3 miles long, with a population of around 170 permanent residents.

Iona has a special place in the heart of many people the world over. The island has a long and illustrious history and is known as the 'Cradle of Christianity' in Scotland. The many people who visit Iona – this outpost of Celtic Christianity - encounter peace and restoration. Which is why we are going!

There is a tradition in Celtic Christianity of what are called 'encompassing' prayers. The prayer below – St Patrick's Breastplate – is an example:

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me. Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.

For months of the year, weather conditions on the western coasts of Ireland and the Scottish Highlands are austere. The history of these Gaelic lands - from pillaging invasion to potato famine - are marked by suffering, and the subsistence living today is not at all easy for many – if they stay at all. These conditions have always prevailed and, in response, the encompassing prayers weave a circle of words around the fragility of the human predicament, in which appeal to the protective power of God is paramount.

Encompassing prayers resonate because life's circumstances almost seem to demand them. The meek do not inherit the earth, the rich are, too frequently, not humbled, the hungry are not fed, nor the prisoner freed. And people die in atrocious situations, sometimes at the hands of other people, sometimes at the hands of natural forces. This is a pretty dark picture even if some of us are doing OK out of life.

And so we weave a circle of words around our human fragility which appeals to God who is unseen and eternal. This is faith seeking to glimpse the God who is working in life's human and daily circumstances. This is faith which trusts that bread is more than bread, and wine is more than wine, and one sunlit day by a river, or the music of birdsong on a summer breeze, can provide hints in abundance that God is here. And that can be enough. The questions are not necessarily answered. The questions may remain. But the questions may be quelled, and we are strengthened to continue.

Amended Minutes of Heathside residents meeting Tuesday 18th July 2023, 11am-12pm

- 1. Present at meeting Cllr Johnny Shilton (Isle of Oxney ward), Cllr Kevin Nicol (KN), Cllr Roger Hiskey (RH) & Vice Chairman Paula Thornton (Appledore Parish Council), Cllr Simon Honnor (SH, Kenardington Parish Council and Appledore resident) Dr Ruth Smith (Editor, Appledore Parish Magazine) and a further 17 residents of Appledore, mainly drawn from Heathside. Joanne Burns and Sarah Sales (JB, SS -Tenant Engagement Officers) & Giles Holloway (GH -Housing Development & Regeneration Manager) from Ashford Borough Council.
- 2. Introduction Roger Hiskey, Chair of Appledore Parish Council, welcomed all attendees and thanked ABC officers for making their visit.
- 3. Social Housing Decarbonisation Fund (SHDF) Sarah Sales and Giles Holloway provided an overview of proposed efficiency improvements to ABC tenant properties in the Appledore area. Concerns were raised regarding drafty old double-glazed windows and metal ones being heavy. GH said that these should be looked at during the surveying for the decarbonisation project but they may have to be in separate planned works rather than the SHDF project itself. Certain Heathside residents had already been contacted about this initiative. GH advised that only those who had been contacted would be able to move forward in the hope of improvements being possible for their specific homes.
- 4. Concerns raised regarding Heathside: Discussion of concerns raised by residents in the Heathside area.
- i) Planning permission for flats –
- (a) SH advised the group that although the council had permission approved for the flats, it does not mean that it has to be implemented. SH used the example of his own bungalow in Appledore, which while it enjoys a planning permission from ABC to build a two storey house, yet remains a bungalow.
- (c) Parking. There was extensive debate on the issue of parking, which was seen to be a very significant problem. It was noted that the road is already overcrowded with cars. KN, a Heathside resident and Councillor, referred to the Planning Committee debate on the scheme. He noted that a Borough Councillor had visited the site and confirmed this problem. However, the issue of parking had been rejected by the retiring Ward Member in that debate. Appledore residents were angered at having been let down, in their view. ABC officers suggested a paid permit scheme to manage the parking issue. Heathside residents responded that they did not wish to pay for the right to park outside their own homes. They further noted that while the new flats would have allocated parking spaces, it did not appear that ABC Housing Services would be making those occupiers pay for them. Heathside residents remained concerned that the new development would make the existing parking issues even worse. GH to investigate.
- (d) Drainage from field and on site in general is bad, with the potential for drains to overflow if more concrete is laid for properties. SH explained that this area of the Borough has a largely clay subsoil. This exacerbates problems with surface rainwater drainage and

these problems were not adequately reflected in the "Zone 1" flood zone status of the site, which in his view had been incorrectly dismissed in the report of the planning officer whose report was presented to the Committee. It was generally noted that a drainage scheme was likely to be needed for the new flats and their surroundings and that the foundation design of the flats would need careful consideration. The foundations were unlikely to be the standard one metre deep trench which is exemplified in more 'conventional' sites.


- (e) Concerns for where construction vehicles would be parked during the works. GH said that a way for it to work would need to be found.
- (f) It was raised that as per tenancy agreements 'there was a right to quiet enjoyment'. Would the works impede this? ABC legal team to confirm.
- (g) Concerns from property facing proposal that their light would be affected in their home. GH said shade and rights to light would have been considered by the local planning authority during the planning process. RH acknowledged that while the law did not protect a right to a good view, it was disappointing that the new development would remove a view over the wider rural area for Heathside residents.
- (h) Would the walkthrough from Heathside to the fields remain? JB to check and confirm from planning documents.
- (i) GH noted that with 1500 people and increasing on social housing waiting lists that the demand for properties means that we have to look at all potential locations.
- (j) JB noted that many items discussed were considered in the planning application and documents are available on the council web portal (details provided at the end of the minutes). JB to arrange people to view the planning documents away from the website.

ii) Parking –

- (a) General agreement that parking is not sufficient (if not using the garages) in Heathside due to most properties having more than one vehicle.
- (b) The proposed flats are planned to have allocated parking similar to other Heathside properties and five spaces planned for the curve of the road.
- (c) The meeting considered if making use of some of the garage areas as open air parking would be a valid idea. Would this require permitting or be free for tenants? Who would enforce this parking? To be investigated further.
- iii) Grounds maintenance & green space -
- (a) Concerns green space will be removed and the view to the field impeded by proposals.
- (b) The lack of grass cutting was raised. Residents had already been informed via letter that council machinery was unable to be used due to the boggy conditions, hence the grass being untended for longer periods.
- iv) Potholes/road maintenance -
- (a) Issues raised regarding current pot holes and road maintenance and concerns as to how vehicles for any construction would affect the road surfacing.
- (b) Any road/pavement issues should be reported to Kent County Council (details provided at the end of the minutes)

(v) Garages

- a) General consensus that the garages are not in the best state, however some are tenanted and those in attendance at the meeting who rent two would like to continue to use them.
- vi) Other-
- (a) It was mentioned that Section 106 funding was provided for the housing development nearby that was going to contribute circa £15k for the maintenance and creation of a playground space at Heathside.GH to look into this.
- (b) No. xx has had several issues with cracked walls. SS referred the resident to report this.
- (c) General discussion regarding the lack of social housing allocation in new build estates and why can we not build entirely council-owned estates as have previously done rather than focus on a smaller project like Heathside. GH confirmed that developments like that are being thought about.
- (d) Hedgerow on the corner of Hawthorn is too overgrown and affecting visibility. JB to check ownership of maintenance of hedge and request KCC/ABC to attend.
- (e) Concerns that No.x Heathside has fence encroaching outside of property boundary.
- (f) Concerns for lack of lighting, although one resident confirmed they have a streetlight on the side of their house
- 4. Tenant engagement participation Joanne Burns quickly summed up and provided a very swift overview regarding future tenant involvement.
- 5. Conclusion RH thanked all participants and noted the high level of attendance from Heathside residents, despite some being prevented to join the meeting by their work commitments.

The Ramblers Walk 18th August 2023

I can't believe another month has whizzed by and here I am writing about our latest ramble! After searching our maps and doing a recce last week, we are walking to Woodchurch. Today there are 8 of us and we welcome a new rambler from Norfolk, who used to live locally and is down visiting.

We set off along the main road towards Woodchurch, as for the first part of this ramble we will walk along the road. I stop everyone as we get to the end of Elm Tree Cottages as I want us to admire the beautiful stone wall that the family here are building. I have been watching it go up over the last couple of weeks as I pass with my dog and I know it is a true labour of love by the whole family who have lived here for 20 years. I was born in Bethersden and recognised the stone as Bethersden marble which is a fossiliferous freshwater limestone found in parts of Kent and Sussex. It dates back millions of years when this part of the country was covered with swamp and freshwater. It is composed largely of the shells of freshwater snails or gastropods which have set in the lime-rich silty clay. Much of the stone was quarried in Bethersden and can be seen in Canterbury Cathedral and indeed in our own church in Appledore.

We carry on our way walking past Moor Lane, where a man stops us and says "You must be the rambling group!" We all laugh and someone remarks that we must be getting quite famous!!! We reach the high stile at Munks Farm which we climb over and are now on footpath AT116. The footpath is easily followed as you can see the next stile in the distance. We walk through a couple more fields going through proper footpath gates and then walk diagonally to the top of the hill. The views from here are normally spectacular as you look towards Shirley Moor but this afternoon it is very humid and hazy. We head for the new footpath post which has recently been erected in the middle of the field showing the way.

We follow the arrow walking through a field of peas that lay dried up on the soil. After a short search we find the bridge to cross the ditch and then turn right walking round another field to another bridge which brings us to a field of maize. The footpath really goes straight through this field but as the maize is way above our heads we decide to walk round the outside. We manage to fight our way through thistles and brambles and reach a very rickety stile which causes a good few laughs as we get everyone safely over. We are now in a hay field, where last week the farmer was driving up and down turning the hay. Now it is full of sweet smelling round hay bales, which obviously now need picking up and storing for the winter months. We walk on negotiating two more stiles and a bridge before we reach a large arable field with a footpath cut through the corn. This brings us out by the Brattle estate in Woodchurch, where we walk along the road and up into the village.

We stop off at the lovely tearooms in the old Woodchurch Post Office which is well worth a visit. Here some of us enjoy tea and cake but others of us enjoy a cold beer or cider while we rest a while. At this point it turned into a very special afternoon for one of our ramblers who bumped into a friend she had not seen for 27 years! We head home agreeing it was another

excellent ramble in our beautiful Kentish countryside. Hope to see you for the next one on September 15th!

Confirmation of those interested is required by Friday 8th September.



Parish Council Update August 2023

Railway Hotel: Thanks to the diligence of Cllr Paula Thornton, a substantial amount of money, in the region of £30,000, is available to the Parish as a result of the development of the Railway Hotel. The Monitoring Support Officer at Ashford Borough Council wrote:

"As detailed in my email dated 13/06/2023 The Railway Hotel Money is available and we would welcome the Parish to apply to spend the contributions that we are holding"

This money is allocated in varying amounts to The Appledore Allotments, Young Peoples Play Space, Natural Green Space, Outdoor Sports Pitches

The projects which are to benefit from this S106 money, will be discussed at future Parish Council meetings

Footpaths in Appledore Parish: a full and detailed report was presented to the August meeting by Paul Ripley, Footpath Warden, who wrote "The existing footpaths in and immediately around Appledorew Parish are in good hands. An informal but active group, the Friends of Appledore Footpaths (FAF), set up initially by Tracy Morgan, has been monitoring and maintaining paths where they are able."

Paul continued "It is pleasing and exciting to see that the monthly rambles have started under the leadership of Jo Weekes and her friends. This has the additional benefit that minor footpath clearance and maintenance can be done as part of the pre-walk"

Paul Ripley's report covered funding for minor and major projects, expertise and manpower for projects such as stile repair, reinstatement of blocked paths and footpath creation. He also addressed insurance issues relating to accident and injury whilst working on footpath projects.

Derek Winter, Chairman of the Appledore Village Hall Trustees presented a detailed report on the Feed in Tariff Income (what has been incorrectly called Solar Heating Income) and its benefitsIt was resolved that from 1st October 2023 the benefits of this income would be returned to the Village Hall Trustees.

Landscaping of The Village Hall and Court Lodge Car Parks: It was agreed that the current contractor be permitted to withdraw from the contract and a new specification, drawn up by Cllr Roger Kimber go out to tender

Appledore Flower Festival: it was agreed that the Parish Council make a contribution of £50 towards the 2023 Appledore Flower Festival.
