Welcome to the July issue of the Parish Magazine. There are three topics of conversation at present—the weather, the football and the election. The weather—as I write this it has finally become summer. The football—why do England play so badly abroad? The election—the least said about this the better!!

My life is also dominated by another topic—death. I have had five friends die in the last few months—three of very mature years and two who had terminal illnesses. One after another has been quite hard.

Death is part of the cycle of life. It is something we will all experience ourselves and will happen to many of the people that we know and love. There are many beliefs of what happens after death which colour

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our reactions to death. Some believe that 'death is a messenger of joy', that we live on in another form of existence and will eventually be reunited with our loved ones. Some believe that we come back in another form—a tree, a blade of grass. Others consol themselves that after burial, we can decompose into our original molecules and are then taken up by the earth to create new plants and flowers. Others believe that death is the end. Full stop. (If I've missed anything out Simon, I apologise in advance!)

But what ever we believe, death is still the end of our physical relationship with that person. No more laughter about silly socks. No more rambles through the woods. No more cosy tea and chat at exactly 3pm. And this is what we are really grieving —the loss of their friendship, companionship and physical love.

My deaths were all expected, but recently we tragically lost Michael Moseley and it is probable that they will soon find the remains of Jay Slater in Tenerife. These two men forgot that walking in extreme heat can be fatal, without sensible precautions.

Extreme heat is dangerous, especially to those of use who feel 21 but look 77! We may have been able to get away with stupid things when we were younger, but not now. So remember, when it is hot—drink more clear non alcoholic fluids, stay in the shade, cut down vigorous activities, and if you are walking on your own, in isolated places, even our local fields and woods, remember hat, more fluids that you expect to need, phone with GPS and preferably tell someone where you are going.

No Evensong at Tenterden

From a minister's desk

As I sit writing this I look out of the window on a dull, wet, and windy scene with spring flowers being battered to pieces by the wind. Indoors we have gone back to wearing our winter woollies and even had the heating on for an hour or so some evenings. Our spring is a disappointment to say the least and for some, our farmers potentially disastrous.

It is at times like this in our cold and damp environment that I think of my grandparents, my father's mother, and father. They came to this country in the 1920's leaving behind one of the most beautiful villages in Italy. The village they left was Ravello situated in the hills above Amalfi and looking down over that glorious bay.

Ravello is famous for its magnificent views, gardens and villas. Ravello has long been a destination for artists, writers, and musicians. Virginia Woolf, Richard Wagner, Tennessee Williams, Greta Garbo, and Jacqueline Kennedy are just a few of the people who were frequent visitors of Ravello. In fact Wagner chose to write part of his opera Parsifal, in Ravello. I was privileged when I visited to attend a performance in the outdoor theatre in the Rufolo gardens, an amphitheatre looking down over the bay of Naples.

There is a glorious 11th century church in the village square. the Duomo Di Ravello and it is in this church that my grandmother was baptised, and of course it goes without saying the sun always shines. So it is a Paradise on earth, so why did my grandparents leave this glorious place to come to damp, wet and cold England?

Well basically all that glitters is not gold. At the beginning of the twentieth century Italy was a very poor country, so poor that to survive many had to leave this on the face of it warm and beautiful country, to seek work and a life somewhere else, they became economic migrants. Many went to America, and many came to this country in search of work and some kind of security. My grandparents joined family members already living in the East End of London. They were engaged in the predictable Italian stereotypes of Ice Cream and Café's.

How my grandparents got here I have no idea, but for two very young and impoverished people it can't have been easy and I wonder if they had to walk some of the way. Equally I have no idea how they crossed the channel; it is one of those times that I wish that I could go back and ask all these questions of my grandparents.

The reality is that I am a grandchild of economic migrants who had to flee their country because of poverty and no doubt made an arduous and difficult journey to reach these shores.

There is a part of the Christmas story that is overlooked and that is that Mary, Joseph, and Jesus had to flee into Egypt and live there for some time as refugees. The reason that they had to flee is that Herod the king at the time was seeking Jesus to kill him having been told by the Wise Men that Jesus had

been born as king. Herod a despot feared that he would one day usurp him. So Jesus, Mary and Joseph became refugees to escape persecution. Presumably as they were in Egypt for some time, they were welcome. Doubtless Joseph was able to continue his career as a carpenter and a jobbing builder to support the family.

What do these two stories tell us?

Well for one thing are not always as they seem. Sometimes what appears to us as paradise is often in reality far from it and that the world continues to have despots both in the form of individuals and groups who persecute their own citizens. It also tells us that like my grandparents and Joseph, Mary, and Jesus, it is human nature for people to seek security and prosperity for themselves and family however challenging leaving their own country may be. The final thing is to ask what would we do if we were to find ourselves in the situation of my grandparents or Joseph what would we do?

Parish Council Update July 2024

Clir Michael Hill: who regularly attends Parish Council meetings, addressed the gathering and highlighted concerns over the situation at Dover with traffic holdups caused by border checks. This situation may worsen in October with the introduction of a new border system with the added concern that traffic gueues will extend to Ashford's local road network. Action is being taken to ameliorate this problem but there is, as yet, no solution.

Dog Waste Bin in Hop Gardens: Ashford Borough Council has agreed to replace the dog poo waste bin taken away from the Hop Garden earlier this year, with a general waste bin which like all the other bins we now have- can also take dog poo.

As readers may be aware, there are issues with the new waste contract which ABC have recently signed, so we are not sure exactly when this will happen. Our thanks to Ashford Cllr. Johnny Shilton for his support.

Robin Buckle made a valuable contribution during the public session of the June Parish Council Meeting. Robin raised his concerns in relation to the road layout at The Narrows and the risk this brings to pedestrians e.g. when vehicles mount the pavement to allow traffic contraflow in such a limited space. This location, Robin suggested, needs signs to let drivers know it is a shared space where pedestrians should have priority.

Other members of the community expressed their concerns with excessive vehicle speed on The Street from Heathside to The Narrows. The general view was that it is only a matter of time before a serious accident occurs-or worse.

Robin Buckle turned to Court Lodge Car Park and suggested that it would benefit from some trees (eg Silver Birch) within the bed located in the middle of the car park.

Robin believes some planting of trees along the grass verge beside the Recreation Ground as one enters the Village from Woodchurch and on the other side, next to the new development, could create a boulevard effect, a visually pleasing entrance to the village.

The Parish Council will welcome further thoughts on these topics during the public session of our next meeting in July.

Heathside Update: Cllr Nicol has made considerable progress in discussions with the developer of the new Heathside flats and Ashford Borough Council. Cllr. Nicol's suggestion that the developer provides and instals a defibrillator machine received a positive response. There is also the possibility of a small cupboard being positioned near a seating area to accommodate a book exchange.

Appledore Ramblers 21st June 2024

So its ramble day again and we have a clear blue sky and glorious sunshine! Today we are off 'on tour' and 8 of us set off in cars to Tenterden where we park at the Steam Railway car park.

We set off up Station Road to the High Street and then cross the road and take the alley next to the Hoof and Hook pub restaurant. This is called Bells Lane and is the AB31 footpath. We walk past the allotments on the left and then through one of the many new housing estates in Tenterden. The path continues on along 3 Fields Path and comes out in the lane leading to Hopes Grove Nursery. Here we cross the Smallhythe Road and walk along the side of Tenterden Cricket Club. The footpath gate lies behind the cricket pavilion and once through this we are now on the Morghew Park Estate. The path takes us along the back of a post and rail fence and then comes out in the yard where Morghew Potato Shop is located on the 2000 acre Morghew Park Estate which can trace its history back to 968AD. They grow over 30 varieties of potatoes which are sourced by chefs and foodies alike and also produce a really good cold pressed rapeseed oil. The path continues through the Estate yard passing various cottages and then becomes a grassy lane which is the AB27. The views from this point are amazing looking out over the High Weald to Rolvenden and beyond, apparently from some parts of the Estate you can see as far as Fairlight and Hastings. Morghew is also well known for its Pheasant and Rough Shooting which is big business through the winter months. We carry on along one of the many farm tracks - several of which have signs to keep walkers from straying as obviously they want to keep ramblers away from 'the guns'!!

The path takes us downhill until we reach the railway line which we have to cross. We stop to admire a very old looking windmill pump that would have been used to provide water for the steam locomotives. The path here is a bit peculiar and goes in a 'V' shape, we walk to a bridge and then almost double back to cross the railway line again. We cross a small bridge and point out to our group the marker on the bridge, highlighting that this is part of the High Weald Landscape Trail. This trail is a 145 kilometre route between Horsham, West Sussex and Rye, East Sussex which is designed to pass through the High Weald Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. We turn right and are now on footpath AB41 and after a small field cross another bridge into a corn field where the corn has been sprayed off to show the path. This then brings us up in the grounds of Westview Integrated Care Hospital. The current hospital was rebuilt and opened in 2005 but many of us remember the huge imposing building that was the old Westview Hospital that started life as a Workhouse for the poor in 1843. We carry on up Plummer Lane to the main road which we cross and walk back towards the High Street. We take a left into West Cross Gardens and follow footpath AB20 across fields and down to the railway track which we again cross. We walk through a beautiful meadow full of wild flowers and then arrive at a footpath junction where there is a choice of 3 different gates to go through. We go right and follow the path through the old Pittlesden Manor Farm which then pops us back out into Tenterden Steam Railway car park. As we have walked on a hot

sunny day we really need and deserve a drink, so The Old Dairy Taproom which is based in a WW2 Nissen hut, next to the Kent and East Sussex Railway, seems like the perfect spot to finish our ramble!!

Next ramble is July 19th - see you there!!

Class 47 Man's face. The idea is that you draw a man's face in compost, sand or on card-board etc and then plant cress or another seedling in the areas covered by beard, maybe eyebrows, and head hair. This needs be grown on then for up to two weeks before the show, so they have nice bushy faces and hair. You might need to plant several faces in case one doesn't grow properly. You then decorate the rest of the face—eyes, nose, mouth etc as you please. The judge will be judging the growing and the most handsome man!

Class 38 We will be reprinting the drawings next month.

Class 43 Collage is using bits of paper, photos, fabric, leaves etc in an arrangement stuck down on a piece of card or board. Max size 2ft x 2ft (60cm by 60cm). Design is entirely up to you!
