'FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK

What a summer it has been, eventually! Hot and dry for longer than we could have dreamed of.

But it seems that there have been fewer butterflies, bees, and even pests like aphids and wasps flitting about. Although we'd regard some insects as pests (who likes wasps?) they are very important in the food chain, and other insects, birds and small mammals suffer when there are shortages of them.

These shortages can also affect us. Albert Einstein once said "if the bee disappeared off the face of the earth, humanity would only have four years left to live". His words are a powerful reminder that our lives are vitally connected to God's creation and to each other. We must work to ensure those often fragile connections are guarded and strengthened.

Recent media reports suggest a great decline in the bee population in this country: the prolonged wet weather, farming methods (please don't think I'm blaming our farmers!) and mites have decimated a third of the bee population. In addition to gathering nectar to produce honey, honeybees perform a vital second function - pollination. About one third of the human diet is derived from insect-pollinated plants, and honeybees are responsible for 80% of this pollination. Honeybees are responsible for pollinating a variety of fruits, vegetables and nuts.

So without bees there would be no harvest and we wouldn't be holding our Harvest Festivals.

You may have heard from media sources that the use of food banks has escalated. More and more people are finding themselves unable to afford food once they've paid their bills. It is not just those already on benefits who are suffering; people who have been made redundant and are struggling to find employment are joining the queues for food parcels.

Food donated to some of our harvest festival celebrations will be distributed to the local food bank. But all year round non-perishable food can be dropped off in our churches to be taken to a food bank and distributed to those in need.


Harvest is a celebration, one of the songs we sing declares 'all good gifts around us are sent from heaven above, so thank the Lord, O thank the Lord for all his love. 'And one way we thank God for creation and for the wonderful variety of food we enjoy, is to be generous in our giving, even as God has been generous to us.

Our Harvest Festival service food gifts are ways of making connections just like bees make connections, which are fundamental to the life of our planet as they fly from flower to flower.

God calls us to make connections: The heart of the Good News is the breaking down of barriers between people (Ephesians 2.11 - end). The heart of love is to reach out to neighbours in need wherever we find them (Luke 10.25-37). The heart of harvest is to share the celebration with all around us, whoever they are (Deuteronomy 26.1-11).

So let's be busy bees helping to pollinate the community and world we live in with kindness and generous giving.

One Parish, Nine Churches

Over the last year or so, the Parochial Church Councils (PCC) of the nine churches in our Benefice, have been taking an honest and serious look at how we could worship and minister together in more fruitful and efficient ways in the future. This has come under the remit of a group we formed, with representation from each of the churches, called 'Grasping the Nettle.'

One of the most significant developments to come from this group is to consider reducing the number of PCCs we have from nine, to one. This move is purely about the governance of the nine churches. It will have no impact whatsoever on services, nor will it lead to church closures. It will, however, provide greater stability and security in these challenging times. And, because it will release parish clergy from a large number of meetings a year, they will be able to give more time to work with local church leadership to grow the church in the community. Local groups, formed from both the congregation and the wider community will be established to undertake the care of their church.

We are keen to ensure that any process towards a single parish is open and transparent from the outset and that all of those who live and worship in the parishes and churches, have the opportunity to be fully informed of what this involves and to ask any questions they may have.

To this end, the next round of PCC meetings will be open to anyone and everyone. During these meetings a presentation will be made which explains clearly what a single PCC is and what it is not. We will look at issues to do with finance, governance, church buildings and worship.

Below are the dates, times and locations of all nine meetings. All the presentations will be the same at each location. To this end, **PLEASE ATTEND WHICHEVER MEETING IS MOST CONVENIENT TO YOU.** It may not be the one in your local church – but you can go to any of them.

In the weeks after these meetings, please reflect on what you have seen and heard at the presentation and give your feedback to any member of the PCC at your local church. This will then be used to inform future conversations the PCC will have, prior to making decisions about a single PCC on behalf of the parish.

It is really important that anyone who wishes to have a say is in receipt of the full range of information. These meetings will provide an opportunity to ask questions so that opinions can be formed based on facts, not hearsay. Therefore, if you think you want to have a say in this, please do go along to any of the meetings above.

Whilst we do not wish to rush this process, each PCC will probably be seeking to make a decision by the end of 2025 at the latest.

History of Appledore Flower Festival

Referring to the letter from my late mother-in-law Lorna in the September edition (Blast from the Past) I am delighted that this has thrown light on the question so often asked ... "when did the Appledore Flower Festival begin?" Now we can say for certainty that it started in 1962!

The idea for a Festival of Flowers came from Spalding in Lincolnshire where Dennis and Lorna Clifton were there attending the bulb auctions. Looking for a break in the proceedings she searched for a diversion in the town and came across a festival in the local church and brought the idea back to Appledore.

In the early days she was ably assisted by her friend Janet Shapland from the Quillet, opposite the Clifton family home at Court Lodge. Over the years many others have taken on the responsibility of organising what has become a huge village event now led by Donna Clifton and raising thousands of pounds for the upkeep of our Parish Church.

In the past many others have taken on this task including Iris Bourne, Eileen Oven, Dora Kelly, Poppet Codrington, George Cranham, myself and no doubt some whose names have escaped me. As far as I can remember there have only been 2 or 3 years since 1962 when the Flower Festival has not happened, one of those being in 2020 due to Covid restrictions.

As a final thought, Paddy Moseley and Iris Bourne were involved in creating flower arrangements at the very first one! Long may it continue to bring joy to all our visitors.

Parish Council Update October 2024

The new Parish House is nearing completion. Parish Council representatives have commenced discussions with Ashford Borough Council to set the criteria for renting the house. This is likely to be a staged priority approach e.g. stage 1; searching the social housing register for those seeking an affordable rental house in Appledore and who can evidence local links such as family members living in the village. The exact

requirements will be announced in due course. In the meantime, if you know anyone who would likely benefit from renting this house and are not currently on the social housing register then please direct them to this link for more information: <u>https://www.kenthomechoice.org.uk/</u>. Watch this space for further updates.

Update on improving our foot path and cycle links: Sharon Marsh and Jane Garner are leading a project to upgrade the public right of way between Appledore and Appledore Station. The long-term plan is to apply a hard surface to the existing foot path to enable all-year walking and cycling. Since the last update Sharon and Jane have spoken with most of the land owner stakeholders, all whom are supportive of this initiative. The biggest challenge is the requirement to reposition and extend the right of way to avoid having to walk/ cycle along the section of the B2080 near to the Station approach. We wish all those involved the very best in developing this marvellous environmentally friendly project.

Building community resilience: one of our "community resilience leads" Paula Thornton presented a useful document in the last magazine edition on preparing for the worst scenarios. This included her reflection on the how we as a community handled the recent water shortage, the importance of good communication, building our knowledge of those in the community who are most in need and have a plan to support them. Ashford Borough Council has produced a 5-step approach to building resilience in response to an emergency. Select this link <u>https://www.kentprepared.org.uk/5-steps</u> for further information. Volunteers Required

Volunteers are therefore required for the following duties:-

Accounts - Sending out invoices, paying bills, dealing with finances.

Advertising – Deal with advert enquires, arrange or create adverts, print the advert section, maintain a record of when advert payment is due for renewal & inform Accounts for invoicing.

The above two duties could be carried out by one person or two separate people.

Printing – Organise the printing with the volunteer printers, carry out printing & copying for customers as required. Monitor and order paper and ink as required, liaise with the Printer Manufacturer regarding Maintenance & Repairs.

Collating – A Team of 4 people are required to collate/put the magazine together, after it has been printed then bundle for distribution to Deliverers.

One member to be Team Leader to organise collating day and arrange distribution to Deliverers and the Church (Car required). Order Staples as required.

Deliverers – One Deliverer urgently required and others would be appreciated to lessen the burden on others and to cover sickness and holidays.

Printing, Collating and Delivery normally takes place in the last week of the month.

Training for volunteers will be provided if required.

The Ramblers Walk 20th September 2024

So today we are back to the village ramble after having a break in August. I am looking forward to meeting up with my walking buddies again but as I look out the window in the morning, the heavens open and thunder rolls around the sky. However, I'm not worried as on ramble day we have so far had a 100% success rate of good weather!

Today we are walking to St. Thomas Becket Church at Fairfield. Thirteen of us leave the village, walking through the narrows and across the bridge and take the small road off to the right, which according to the map is called Beckett Road. We are walking to the church along the road and then going to come back across the fields. The weather is now hot and sunny and we stride along admiring the views either side of the road. We pass Priory Farm where all the turkeys are out in the field and carry on until we reach Becket House. For years the key to the church used to hang to the right of the door of Becket House but now it has been moved to the right hand gatepost on the driveway. We collect the key and carry on a bit further along the road and then go through a gate into the field surrounding the church. Normally sheep graze all around the church but today the field is empty. The church dates back to the 12th century and was then restored in the 18th century, it stands completely isolated in the middle of a field. We go inside which is like stepping back in time. The interior is filled with rows of box pews where different families would have sat depending on their social standing. These have quite recently been restored and are painted bright white. The church has a very special triple decker pulpit and has featured in several films such as Great Expectations.

We decide it is time to move on and lock up and head back to the road. We return the huge key to it's gatepost and retrace our steps back as far as the railway line. Here there is a finger post on the right over a stile, showing footpath HM43. We follow the hedge line through a field of sheep and then the path crosses a dry ditch into a potato field. The potatoes are currently being picked up and we have passed several tractors along the road with trailers full of potatoes. We walk round the edge of the potato field and past some modern agricultural barns and along to an old pumping station. This whole area is covered with many ditches or sewers and the pumping station would have been used to move the water around the different sewers. We carry on through different fields of newly planted peas and other crops and stop to admire a beautiful swan who is anxiously watching her four grey cygnets. The footpath bends round to the left and is now the HM44. We now have to navigate 2 stiles to cross us over the railway line. Typically of course, at this particular time a train has to come along and we hold fast by our stile as it whizzes past. We have to manhandle dearest Brodie over the stiles, as they are not dog friendly, but as always she is beautifully behaved and takes it all in her stride! We cross a couple more fields and bridges and then footpath AT126B brings us back out on Beckett Road. We walk round the bend and then cross another bridge on footpath AT126A which goes across the back of Bridge House Farm and pops us out in a half open gate opposite the Military Canal and the bridge at the bottom of the village. We make our way along to the pub where some of

us enjoy a well deserved drink and others have to rush off to the next commitment!
