



From the Minister's Desk

One Christmas I asked my class to prepare some prayers for worship. One child wrote, very simply 'Dear God, everyone misses you.'

It is hard to know what that child was thinking. On the face of it, they are words that would seem more appropriate on a postcard to much loved grandparents or a message to a poorly relative in hospital. Perhaps it was simply an affectionate phrase that seemed right to 'send' to God. But maybe there was more to it than that? On reflection, as we look forward to Christmas, those words bear thinking about: 'Dear God, everyone misses you.'

The Christmas story is the story of the God who is *missed*. For centuries, the prophets had foretold the coming of the Saviour, but when he came, few seemed to notice! Many doors were closed against him! The failure to recognise the Christ when he comes is a theme that runs through the gospels. It is there in the stories of his infancy, his ministry, his suffering and death, and his resurrection. Everyone, or almost everyone, 'misses' God.

But the words have another way of being read. Everyone misses *you*: that is, everyone would love *you* to *be* here, everyone longs for you; there is in every human heart a deep yearning for God, a desire for the meaning and purpose and peace of mind that God alone can give.

And the message of Christmas is that God acted decisively to meet this human need for him. God has drawn near, God has made his home with us: 'the Word', says St. John, 'was made flesh and dwelt among us'. Our God, longed for down the ages, has come to us at last! And the message of Christmas, and of Christianity, is not of the rumour of some far distant God, but of God who has made himself one with us: in the person of his blessed Son, he has shared our birth, and our life, and our death; and in his resurrection he points us to the life which lies beyond this life and lifts us into the gracious presence of the Father.

'Dear God, everyone misses you.' 'Dear child', says God, 'but you have come home to me, and I have come home to you'. And that rather puts me in mind of one of my favourite hymn verses of all time – in my book, strictly for Christmas morning!

'Yea, Lord, we greet thee
Born this happy morning,
Jesu, to thee be glory given;
Word of the Father,
Now in flesh appearing:
O come, let us adore him, Christ the Lord!'

A week later I again received the utmost attention when three times I had to go to A & E due to concern over the skin graft, and each time one of the team from Maxillofacial Unit came up to A & E and took over.

I apologise for labouring my experience but there appears to be nothing to report these days but doom and gloom, but I for one cannot be more thankful and indebted to a system that has been in place since 1948 and one which we must continue to support and maintain for the years ahead.

Parish Council Update December 2024

Firstly, from everyone at Appledore Parish Council (APC) we wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

As we enter 2025, APC are seeking your views on 2 projects being progressed:

Improving Road Safety

APC Highways Working Group has submitted a request to Kent County Council (KCC) for the following improvements:

- 1) The Street (Hawthorn) Installation of 2 playground warning signs and "SLOW" road markings at either end of the Recreation Ground has been agreed by KCC. Possible installation of Speed Indicator Devices subject to result of recent speed survey.
- 2) The Street (The Narrows)* Implement a priority traffic flow system, install a pavement and bollards.
- 3) Heathside* Extend current pavement (situated on the East side of Woodchurch Road) up to Fourwents Junction, and refresh "SLOW" markings.
- **4) Kenardington Road (Hornes Place)*** Implement priority flow system & refresh "SLOW" road markings at the metal fenced blind corner section of the road outside The Wish.
- * Improvements 2 to 4 are subject to KCC approval. KCC advised that 2 and 3 will likely be sizable and expensive, and 3 likely to require consents from land owners.

Electric Vehicle Points

A plan is in place to locate 2 x electric vehicle charging points at Court lodge Road car park. The project cost of approximately £5,000 includes 3 years maintenance. APC has received a grant of circa £2,500 towards the total cost. The charging points will be available for anyone to use and will operate on a "Pay As You Go" basis.

Is there a requirement for communal Electric Vehicle charging points? Do you agree or disagree with the selected road improvements? Is there anything else you would like to say?

Keeping your home warm, efficient and safe

- · Try to heat the rooms you use to at least 18°C if you can, as this reduces the risk to health of someone wearing suitable winter clothing.
- · Overnight, people who are 65 and over or who have pre-existing health conditions, may find bedroom temperatures of at least 18°C are good for their health; this may be less important if you are a healthy adult under 65 and have appropriate clothing and bedding.
- · If you can't heat all the rooms you use, heat the living room during the day and your bedroom just before you go to sleep.
- · Get your heating system and cooking appliances checked and keep your home well ventilated.
- · If you have an electric blanket, use it as instructed and get it tested every 3 years. Never use a hot water bottle with an electric blanket.
- · Do not use a gas cooker or oven to heat your home; it is inefficient and there is a risk of carbon monoxide poisoning which can kill.
- · If you are not on mains gas or electricity, make sure you have a good supply of heating oil, LPG or solid fuel so you do not run out in winter.

Keep the warmth in:

- · Fit draught proofing to seal any gaps around windows and doors.
- · Make sure you have loft insulation. And if you have cavity walls, make sure they are insulated too.
- · Insulate your hot water cylinder and pipes.
- · Draw your curtains at dusk and tuck behind radiators to help keep heat inside.
- · Make sure your radiators are not obstructed by furniture or curtains.

Look after yourself

- \cdot Sitting or sleeping in a cold room is not good for you and increases the risk of heart attacks, stroke and breathing problems.
- · Keep your bedroom windows closed on a winter's night; breathing cold air can increase the risk of chest infections.
- · Exercise is good for you all year round and it can keep you warm in winter. Keep moving if you can, this will help keep you warm. Try not to sit for more than an hour, get up and walk around, make a hot drink and spread housework throughout the day.
- · Wear a few layers of thin clothing rather than one thick layer; this will trap the heat better to keep you warm. Thin layers of clothes made from cotton, wool or fleecy fibres are particularly good for maintaining body heat.
- · Wear shoes with a good grip to prevent slips and falls.
- · Make sure you have spare medication in case you are unable to go out.

Food is a vital source of energy and helps to keep your body warm so have plenty of hot food and drinks.

- \cdot Aim to include 5 daily portions of fruit and vegetables. Tinned and frozen vegetables count towards your 5 a day.
- · Prepare for cold weather. Stock up on tinned and frozen foods, warm clothes and any medication so you don't have to go out too much when it's cold or icy.

Power and utility companies have schemes which make at-risk groups a priority for reconnection following power cuts. Visit: www.ofgem.gov.uk

If you need to go out:

- · Wear shoes with slip resistant, good grip soles.
- \cdot Make sure you are not caught out by snow and ice; stay tuned to the weather forecast and plan ahead with food supplies.
- · In periods of severe weather such as snow and ice, do not travel unless necessary. Get up-to-date traffic information on the Kent Travel Information website.
- · People are urged not to go to A&E or call 999 unless it's an emergency. If you are in any doubt NHS 111 can help you get the right treatment.

The Ramblers Walk 15th November 2024

Well this month's ramble has been a bit like a military exercise to organise as we decided to try out the footpaths to Wittersham. Thirteen of us meet at the rec and then go by cars to the Ferry Inn car park. Today we welcome to the group Mark who has lived in the village for many years and Kim and her 2 dogs Romy and Raffy, of course we have our trusty ramble dog Brodie with us as well. We have already parked cars in Wittersham and have partners on standby to collect us when we get to the other end!

We set off from the Ferry following the Reading Sewer on AT94 and then pick up the farm track to the bottom of Chapel Bank. We walk straight up the steep Chapel Bank Hill on footpath AT93 enjoying the beautiful panoramic views looking over to Stone and Wittersham. We walk round the top of Chapel Bank and down the other side on footpath AT260. About half way down the hill the footpath goes left through a gate in the hedge, we cross a quite boggy field whilst being watched by a flock of bemused Suffolk sheep, to another gate. Once through the next field we have a difficult stile to contend with, which causes a lot of laughs as we help haul each other over! We then walk round the edge of the last arable field and end up on the small road that goes down by the side of the Garden Centre on Reading Street.

We cross the road and take the lower footpath AB56 which follows the Reading Sewer. There are great views all the way along here overlooking the Rother Levels and wildlife is in abundance. The dogs keep disturbing pheasants that are hiding in the reeds and they take off squawking over our heads. We spot a large bird of prey on the ground a little way ahead and watch as it takes off. We can see its finely-striped tail and with its wingspan of about a metre realise it's a buzzard. We carry on our way crossing the odd bridge and stopping to put up posters about Dexter the dog that went missing whilst on holiday in Appledore. We spot another bird of prey soaring overhead and decide it is a Kite as it has a forked tail. We cross another bridge and stop to admire a family of swans. The Mum and Dad proudly show off 4 fully grown cygnets that are just starting to lose their ugly grey feathers and grow their beautiful white ones! Finally we reach Smallhythe Bridge which is just along from Smallhythe Place, the former home of Victorian actress Dame Ellen Terry and now a National Trust Property.

We turn left and have to negotiate a short stretch of the busy B2082 road before then clambering over a very unstable stile. We now cross some very green lush fields many with sheep in. The ground underfoot is quite wet as this is the Rother Levels. We carry on across more fields on footpath AT76 and are now walking uphill. The footpath is fairly well marked with signs and yellow tape and soon we turn right through a footpath gate that goes along the side of someone's garden and then ends on a country lane. We follow this going up and admire beautiful distant views over Wittersham. We are now in the area known as Peening Quarter. At the end of the lane we reach the main Wittersham road which we cross taking footpath AT88. We carry on, passing a tumble down farm cottage and through several more fields, one full of cheeky Shetland ponies. Finally we hit Swan Street and walk up to the now shut Pub in Wittersham to our previously parked cars and trusty lifts that await us! We have walked over 6 miles and some of us were flagging a bit at the end and needed a pick me up drink at the Ferry! A beautiful walk in lovely weather and it was great to try a new route.

Good News


Friends of Appledore Station are pleased to report that the overgrown vegetation alongside the pathway to Platform 2 at Appledore Station has been cut back to provide a clear line of sight for passengers, particularly for those who expressed concern that when travelling alone after, dark, there was discomfort when walking along that route. Homegrown Timber (Rail) Limited are an approved Network Rail contractor, who specialise in vegetation management. The ownership, management and employees of the company engage in a targeted level of voluntary community work and Appledore Station has been the beneficiary of their generosity on this occasion. The HT(R)L Team spent all day on 19th October 2024, performing the necessary work, braving mixed weather conditions. The timing coincided with the recent partial closure of the Marshlink Line, for renovation work to the Ore Tunnel. The partial closure provided the opportunity for the heavy-duty equipment to be manoeuvred trackside and appropriately positioned along the pathway for the duration of the work. Refreshing the paintwork of the planters and replacement of the damaged signage will be undertaken within the next few weeks, in preparation for the Spring planting.
