

He continued to support the communities of the Isle of Oxney even after standing down as a councillor

He was made an Honorary Alderman of the Borough in 2023, and was the longest serving councillor at the time. As well as a former chairman of many council committees, he was Chair of the Friends of the Stocks Mill, among others.

The Parish Magazine was in need of a replacement printing machine in 2020 and Councillor Mick Burgess arranged for a Ward Member Community Grant to help purchase the new machine, for which we are eternally grateful.

We send our sincerest condolences to Mick's family and friends and in closing we acknowledge and give thanks for the unerring support he readily gave, both at his many attendances at Parish Council meetings, and for always being available in providing his vast experience in all matters concerning the Borough. He will be sorely missed.

February 2025 Update (https://www.appledorekent.org)

<u>**Clearing the Ice</u>** - 1 tonne of salt has been delivered to Mannering Corner. Appledore Parish Council (APC) will be re-distributing some of the salt which will give residents the option to collect from salt bins at Heathside and the Village Hall Car Park. This salt is available for all residents to help make the village a safer place during icy periods.</u>

Improving road safety - Thank you to everyone who responded to the "Have Your Say" article seeking residents' opinions on which roads present the highest safety risk. The responses were supportive of APC's proposed improvements to **The Street (Hawthorn / Rec. Ground)**, **The Street (The Narrows)**, **Heathside (Woodchurch Road to Fourwents Junction) and Kenardington Road (Hornes Place / The Wish)**.

The responses also highlighted other potential speed related risks on **School Road** and **Station Road (B2080)**, initial speed data since requested from Kent County for APC consideration.

Hedge maintenance - One of the most common complaints reported to APC is "overgrown hedges" and the risk these present to road and pavement users. This is not a new problem as pointed out by a member of the Appledore Local History Society who kindly offered the following extract from a back issue of the Parish Magazine:

We are very pleased to see that 'cat's eyes' are being installed on the Tenterden Road. Originally invented by north country businessman, (Percy Shaw of Booth Town, Halifax, West Yorkshire), this device is probably the greatest boon known to road users.

There is a simple way in which many of us can help to improve road safety and this is by seeing that hedges, particularly on bends and blind spots, are kept trimmed. A ragged hedge can also be a menace if it encroaches on the footpath, especially in a village which has no street lighting.

Attention to these details would not only contribute to public safety but also scotch the frequent complaints which greet the Parish Council at many of their meetings.

<u>New electric vehicle points</u> - As part of the "Have Your Say" consultation, concerns were raised in relation to APC having to part-fund this new infrastructure. The good news is that Cllr. Kimber has successfully bid for additional funding as well as renegotiated the overall supplier price meaning that APC's contribution to capital costs is currently just $\pounds_{5.00}$.

Timescales for build, and terms of use will be advertised in due course.

Colin Jackman - The Passing of a Legend by his Daughter Nicola

Colin Jackman, my Father, sadly passed away at 11:00pm on New Years Eve. Most of you will know him as PC Jackman who lived and served in Appledore from 1976 to 2022. He latterly resided at Madeira Lodge, Littlestone, where he spent much of his time reminiscing his life as a Local Bobby.

My Father leaves behind his Wife Rosemary and his two Daughters, myself Nicola and my Sister Angela, along with his four Grandchildren Chelsea, Louise, Will and Hannah.

Dad served as a member of Kent Constabulary for 30 years, stationed at Cranbrook, Sevenoaks, Tenterden and other smaller villages, including Appledore and Lydd. He was determined to remain a Constable on the beat, where he would have first-hand contact with the community and where he believed he could make the best contribution.

Without doubt, he loved his life in Appledore, after having initially visited as a child with his parents, he always knew that he wanted to one day become an Appledore resident, but back then, he never expected to routinely win the Miss Appledore competition, dressed in his biker boots, suede skirt and balloons for boobs, or that he had an unfulfilled ambition to play Frank'n'Furter in the Rocky Horror Show.

Many young people owed much to his sincere guidance and encouragement and as some will have experienced, the occasional 'clip around the ear'. He operated an 'open house' style police station. He also ran Youth Clubs, frequented the local pubs, both in and out of uniform, and on occasions served behind the bar as he gathered knowledge on 'his community'.

Dad had the occasional whisky or brandy and enjoyed his homemade wine and beer. He also enjoyed a 'roll-up' cigarette and would share the makings with anyone who couldn't afford their own.

He was a big family man enjoying every opportunity for family gatherings. His favourite group were the Beatles, (he even once visited the Cavern Club in Liverpool). He also enjoyed musicals. His hobbies and interests included, bicycles and motorcycles. He would use motorcycles for holidays with Rosemary, during their pre-parent days, travelling as far afield as Spain. He later owned an old Bedford van, used for touring with the whole family, on similar journeys abroad. Dad also enjoyed running with his beloved dog Bruno. He was an excellent swimmer and played rugby and cricket and the occasional game of cards. He was also an excellent harmonica player.



Dad loved bird watching, there were a few times a year where he would not come home until he had spotted 100+ different types. He was observed by many people hiding out with his Binoculars.

He was a firm but fair Dad, ensuring that we were alerted to the dangers and pitfalls of life. He had a happy and smiling disposition, both at home and at work, he was also a wonderful Grandfather, particularly to Chelsea, with whom he spent a great deal of time on long walks, describing every aspect of the countryside. In summary, he was widely recognised as a really nice guy, who will be greatly missed!

Thanks to everyone for the messages and memories that you have sent to me.



DO YOU OWN, MANAGE OR KNOW OF SPRUCE TREES IN YOUR LOCAL AREA?

If so, they could be at risk of infestation by the highly destructive tree pest *lps typographus*.



Pests and diseases are a continual threat to the health of trees and woodlands. The eight-toothed spruce bark beetle (*Ips typographus*) is a serious pest of spruce trees, and we need your help to deal with it.

If this pest becomes established in England, it will have a major impact on our environment and wood-based industries. By actively managing woodlands, we can increase their resilience, protect them against future threats and prevent this and other pests from spreading further afield.



Recently windblown, snapped, stressed, dying and sawn trees are particularly susceptible to infestation. The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and the Forestry Commission encourage proactive management of spruce to remove or reduce the risk of beetle establishment. <u>Watch our video guide</u> for more information.

Ips typographus was first identified in Kent in 2018, with further outbreaks found in the South East in 2021, 2022, 2023 & 2024, also in 2024 breeding populations were found in East Anglia. An extensive surveillance programme is in place to locate and eradicate all *Ips typographus* establishments.



Control measures exist in the *Ips typographus* Demarcated Area (DMA) for spruce to be inspected and authorised before any forestry operations. If you are in the DMA you need to:

- 1. Monitor your spruce and remove stressed, dead and dying material wherever possible.
- 2. For any planting, movement, felling or other forest operations on spruce, all landowner or managers must seek authorisation from the Forestry Commission.
- 3. Report any suspect findings to TreeAlert.
- 4. Conduct swift destruction of any spruce timber that is left in situ, either by burning or chipping, especially in the *lps typographus* flight season (April – September).

All Landowners or managers looking to stack timber in situ to season (dry out) must also seek authorisation first from the Forestry Commission before adopting any approach of timber stacking.

Guidance and information on support can be found on the GOV.UK *lps typographus* webpage. Grants are available through the <u>Tree Health</u> <u>Pilot scheme</u> to manage or fell your spruce trees, restock your woodland and maintain your newly planted trees.

The Ramblers Walk 21st February 2025

It's ramble day again and today has probably been the warmest day so far this year with temperatures reaching 14 degrees. This month we meet at the rec for an onward journey to Woodchurch where we park in the village hall car park. 

The Book Club

Our book for last month was "The List of Suspicious Things" by Jennie Godfrey. This debut novel is set in West Yorkshire, where the author was raised, and it has achieved No. 1 Sunday Times best seller status.

It is challenging to say that everyone enjoyed the book, given its background during the unsettling period of the Yorkshire Ripper murders. However, it is an impressive first novel and an absorbing read. Initially, the plot was somewhat elusive, requiring a few chapters to become fully engaging. The story vividly captures the tumultuous essence of the 1970s, a time marked by horrendous predacious behaviour and pervasive hate, which we all found quite disturbing.

The protagonist, Miv, navigates numerous complex issues including the murders, domestic abuse, suicide, and racism. These challenges permeate her home life and school environment. Miv's domestic situation is grim, with a mute mother and a non-maternal aunt caring for her. In an attempt to understand her world and gain some control, Miv, along with her best friend Sharon, decides to investigate the murders themselves.

Their investigation leads the girls to uncover more about their community, build friendships, and learn harsh lessons about life as secrets are revealed. The story demonstrates that not everything is as it seems; some individuals are inherently malicious, while others possess an incredible capacity for kindness. The novel is wonderfully crafted and stands apart from typical mysteries, with an ending that is simply shocking.

Our next read is from the celebrated author of The Nightingale and The Four Winds by Kristin Hannah " The Women". The Women, is about a young woman coming of age during the turbulent 1960's in America, who joins the Army Nurse Corps and serves in Vietnam.

This is the story of one woman gone to war, but it shines a light on all women who put themselves in harm's way and whose sacrifice and commitment to their country has too often been forgotten. A novel about deep friendships and bold patriotism and we look forward to engaging with the heroine and seeing her developing courage and idealism grow throughout the book.

Hello all

I was asked a few months ago to put something in the magazine about gardening and so I will give it a go this month!!

March is a very busy month to get your garden right for the year ahead and one of the things you should do this month is to prune your wisteria. If you haven't already done it one of the main things is to cut out last year's new growth, so if you didn't cut them back to 7 buds during the summer, you now need to cut back to 2 buds from the main framework. Basically you're trying to create fruiting spurs as you do with Apple trees. Don't let your Wisteria get overcrowded – 'more is less and less is more'

You should also finish pruning your roses now. I like to do mine before Christmas then you're not paddling about on the soil, but yet again, don't let your roses get overcrowded. You only end up with a lot of disease in them because there's no airflow.

It's time to cut back your ornamental grasses, before those new shoots appear. Also cut back your dogwoods to ground level, alternatively leave two or three stems which later in the year will produce flowers, but if you want that winter colour you want new fresh growth each year. Try not to get excited about sowing tomato seeds - not until the end of the month, or even better, April.

This is also your last opportunity this year to cut back those footpath hedges hard, before the new growth starts. It might look drastic but by the end of April it should be fine unless you've got a conifer which you cannot cut back into old wood. The public footpaths in this village are a disgrace with overhanging hedges. It's not fair on young mothers with push chairs, or people in wheelchairs. If someone gets scratched by that bramble the homeowner is liable and it's not worth the hassle, and there are plenty of solicitors out there who are quite willing to take it on a 'no win no fee'!!
